OUR ORDERS NAVY BOATS TO CONTINUE WORK

Secretary Sends Word Not to Abandon Attempts to Reach Crow-of-Submarine-on-Bottom of Atlantic.

(By the Associated Press.) U. S. SUBMARINE HANG, NEW JERSEY, Oct. 30. (Special.) Secretary of the Navy today announced that the efforts to find the crew of the submarine H-8, which was lost in the North Atlantic, will continue.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 30. (AP)—Irish republicans today attempted to attack General Richard Mulcahy, former minister of defense in the Irish Free State, as he stepped from the Independence hall with a party of 375 men to the International union headquarters of which he is a member. Police intervention averted the general from being arrested.

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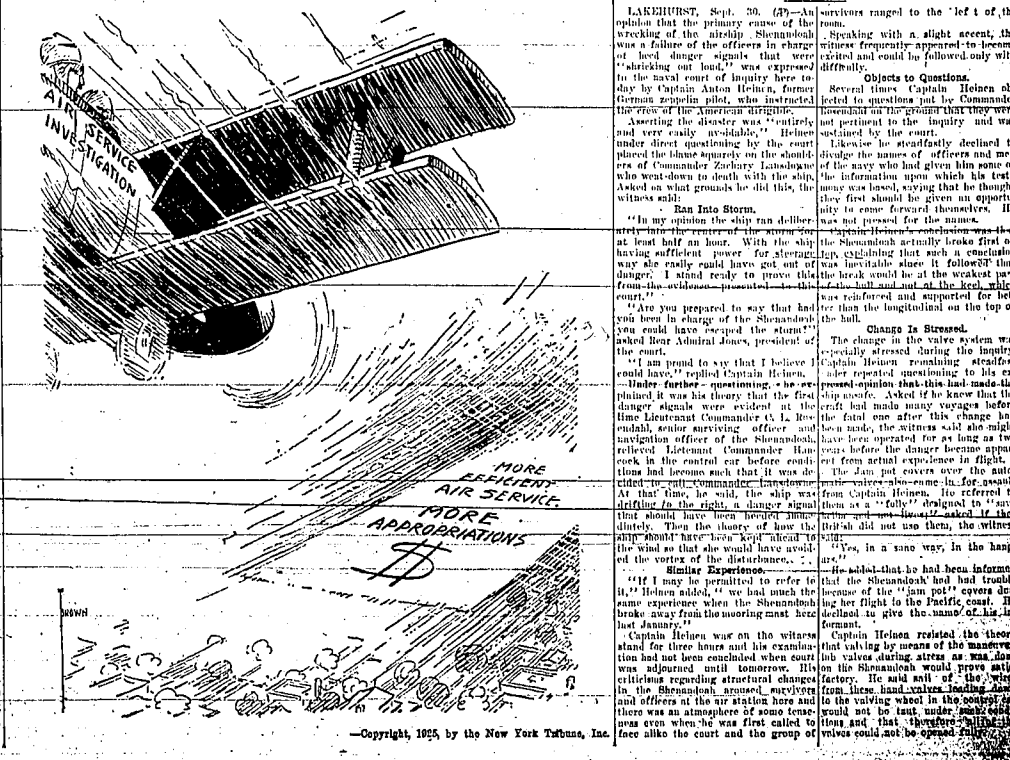

Officers Being Reached in Morocco War Against Rebels

FEZ, French Morocco, Sept. 29. (AP)—Three French columns, assigned to the mission of straightening out the front north of Rifane, on the eastern wing of the Moroccan front, are making good progress against Abd-el-Krim's forces.

Abd-el-Krim has concentrated virtually all his regular troops, numbering between 20,000 and 30,000 in front of the French. If the French advance north of Rifane continues the Rifian chiefs will soon be in a position to threaten the Spanish and the French moving up from the south.

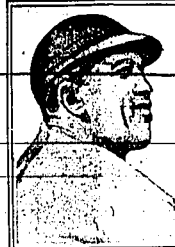

EXPERT AVOIDS PROPOSED TEST

Handwriting Specialist, State Witness in Embezzlement Trial; Works With Caution.

Charles S. Kingsley of Boise, handwriting expert, appearing as witness for the state here Wednesday during the fifth day of the trial of Jay J. Lookie, who is charged with embezzlement of \$12,000 from the Idaho Power company, declined to undergo an experiment proposed by Frank L. Stephens of Lewiston counsel during cross-examination.

Mr. Stephens presented some 20 sheets of paper each bearing a specimen of Kingsley's handwriting, some of which were genuine signatures, and the others were spurious. Mr. Kingsley declined to make the attempt, explaining that his conclusions would be reached only after careful examination involving conditions and processes that were not available in the courtroom.

Tells of Altercations

Mr. Kingsley, who mentioned the witness stand throughout the preceding day, resumed testimony Wednesday with regard to altercations alleged to have been made in receipts for power company expenditures. The expert testified that the receipts were altered by Lookie in order to make them appear to be for a greater amount than was actually the case, in order to receive from the company's central office at Boise greater sums to reimburse the local office and that he diverted the excess sums to his own use.

A number of checks drawn by the central office to reimburse the local office were identified by F. E. Dowson, division chief clerk, just before the evening recess.

Other checks called by the state during Wednesday's trial were those of the power company which were altered by Lookie and which were returned to the power company during the five-year period that Lookie was employed as bookkeeper at the power company's office here.

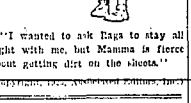

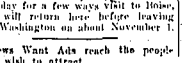
