

FIVE ODDS OF SURVIVAL CREW ARE RECOVERED After Week of Rescue Work on Sunken S-51, Storm Forces Temporary Suspension of Work to Raise Seaboard.

(By the Associated Press.) U. S. SUBMARINE BASE, NEW LONDON, Conn., Oct. 3.—After a week of search for the crew of the sunken S-51, the recovery of the bodies of five of the 43 men who were down with their ship, fleet Admiral W. H. Clegg returned to the base here today. A long and arduous search was directed to reach-gauge proportions for the suspension of diving operations at present, and Admiral Clegg ordered the entire fleet to quit, none of the vessels going to Newport and others coming in here. Recognition of the search for the bodies, details upon which were given.

Engineers Found. Only one body was found today, that of Paul D. Berk, of Chambersville, Pa., an engineer. Divers were ordered to take the torpedo from the wreck when it was found, but conditions made it unsafe to continue. The divers expressed their willingness to make further attempts, but, following the search, the officers decided against it.

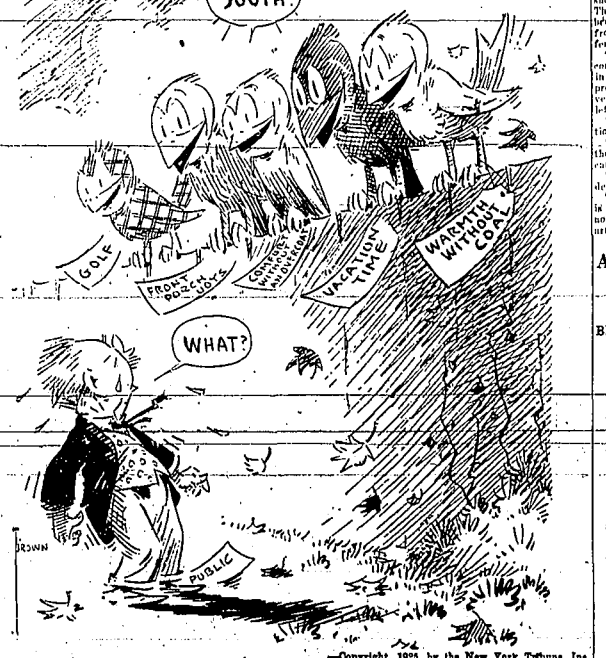
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DECKS CLEARED FOR BIG SERIES TO START SOON

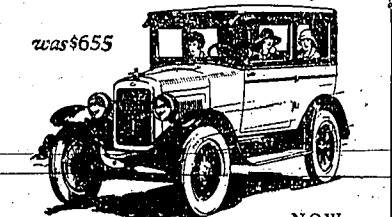

STRESS TOURIST PARK'S VALUE

Effort to Be Made to Secure Funds to Complete Work for Accommodation of Guests.

Appeal to appreciation of the value to the community of a modern tourist park with accommodations of from 500 to 700 cars each year is to be made in connection with a drive that is to be launched Monday by the Park corporation through the tourist park committee of Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce for the sale of stock in the park corporation.
