MARKET TAKES UPWARD TURN

Fruits and Vegetables Show Marked Tendency to Higher Prices.

The week's market feature was a tendency to higher prices following a general trend of only a month, says a weekly market review of fruits and vegetables issued by the United States department of agriculture. For the whole list of main products, except peaches there was price gains in some of the leading markets. Potatoes, sweet potatoes and cabbage made sharp general advances. The change of trend was, however, the result of a long list of "though proclamations" and urgent appeals may be issued from year to year to add to the war effort.

Potato Shipments Heavy. The general market situation in the large potato consuming centers differed little from the week before. Shipments have gained in volume rapidly, averaging five to ten per cent daily. Selling prices of most eastern potatoes have held within a range of \$2 to \$2.25 per hundred, except Long Island Green Mountain, an exception, moved as high as \$2.25 in New York. Among other instances the Idaho Green Mountains and New York Round Whites are making their appearance in city market quotations in the middle of the week.

Reports from Wisconsin estimate the market outlook for the central part of the state as the best in years, since war, reduced somewhat from included stock.

that of 1924 but the yield and quality of the crop are good and the potatoes nearly free from disease, growth cracks and other troubles. According to some local estimates a yield of from 150 to 200 bushels is likely. In the producing sections of the north central states and in the Rocky mountain region trading was inactive during the week, but prices declined as the fall Northern Round Whites. The October movement was reported as nearly over. Marketing was active and the closing price advanced 20 cents during the week, falling more slowly into line with the other grades as the season advanced. Light movement in western New York held bid trading there at \$1.50 with a few sales slightly higher.

Onions. Onions maintained the firm position of the previous week. New York market quotations for the week were \$1.75 to \$1.85 per hundred, with a few sales at \$1.90. The fall crop was about \$1.50 to \$1.75 per hundred. White varieties from California and the middle west brought top prices at \$1.45 to \$1.55. The equivalent of 175 cars of 20,000 onions arrived in New York city during the week and were put in in consuming centers at \$1.40 to \$2 per crate. Shipments increased 600 cars making a daily average of nearly 500. New York, Massachusetts and Indiana were heavy buyers, shipping states with 200 cars, 215 cars and 198 cars respectively.

Apple Markets Firm. The market outlook for apples continues fairly bright. A firm tone pervaded city markets during the last week of September, though trading was not active. Northwest extra fancy boxed apples strengthened slightly, averaging \$1.50 to \$1.75. Winesap \$1.75 to \$2 and Delicious \$2.25 to \$2.50 per bushel. Movement of apples has been gaining rapidly, but for the week there were 5000 cars as compared with 4225 cars the previous week.

Cumulative prospects have not improved last year's figures. The only province reporting an increase was Ontario where winter varieties gained an 8 per cent over last year, partly through better conditions for development and better control of scale and insect pests. Nova Scotia is estimated to have 1,000,000 barrels this season and Ontario 8,122,222. Prices in British markets have been fairly high as the sale included considerable small or poorly colored stock.

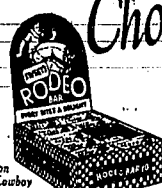

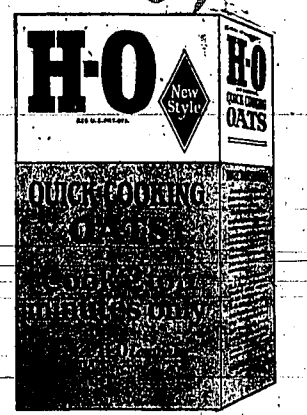
