DISMISSED BROWN SEEKS COURT'S HELP IN FIGHT

Episcopal Convicted of Heresy, Appeals to U. S. Tribunal in Effort to Avoid Sentence to Be Given Monday.

(By the Associated Press.) NEW ORLEANS, La., Oct. 10.—Ordered by the presiding bishop of the Protestant Episcopal church here Monday to receive sentence after conviction of heresy, Bishop William Montgomery Brown today sought intervention from the United States court.

The court was partially successful, Judge Louis H. Harris, United States court and assistant bishop of the diocese, enjoined the house of bishops, but signed an order requiring the presiding bishop, the right here to receive sentence.

"This court cannot inquire into the merits of your ecclesiastical controversies," the court judge said, "but I can only inquire if the body which acted had authority under the constitution and canons of the church to take action. I can only cite the parties against whom you are proceeding to show cause why they should not be held liable for the same."
