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SUES FOR \$7000 FOR CROP LOSS

H. I. Swaim of Hollister Institutes Action Claiming Failure to Receive Share Water

Suit for damages in the sum of \$7000 on account of loss of crops resulting from alleged failure to receive proportional share of available irrigation water during the irrigation season of 1924, for the lands under the Salmon River canal system was instituted in district court here this morning.

Swaim, through Messrs. Martin, Cameron and Hays, Boise attorneys, filed a writ of habeas corpus against Murray Buchanan, H. E. Wheeler and A. E. Robinson, directors of the Salmon River Board of Irrigation, through Messrs. Martin, Cameron and Hays, Boise attorneys, to require production in court of records from irrigation water supply, and the records that Swaim has been since 1911, the owner of 229 acres of land on which desert water was made available prior to that time when water right for the land was purchased from the Salmon River Land and Water Company. Claim is made that a proportional share in the available water supply for the project, which it is claimed, was withheld in 1924.
