## PENNSYLVANIA DEFEATS YALE IN HARD GAME

Old Football Enemies Meet After Thirty-Two Year Separation; Score Ends 16 to 13; Brilliant Playing.

NEW-HAVEN, Conn., Oct. 17 (AP)—After 32 years of separation, Yale returned to an old foe today and Pennsylvania won, 16 to 13. It was a brilliant victory over a team that had been undefeated in three seasons. Al Krenz, Pennsylvania's left half, proved himself to be one of the best a half-backs has ever seen. Pennsylvania was the first to score, gaining the ball in the first period through a penalty on its own 30-yard line. Krenz smashed down the Yale right tackle for seven yards. Then distinctly Clarence Fields picked up the attack and kicked the ball 27 yards into the nose of Yale and the ball was six yards from the Yale posts.

Yale's Danon hurried into the next play to hit Rogers, but Krenz struck along three yards more from which point Leitch crossed the line.

### ALUMNI COMMITTEE TO GIVE CONSIDERATION TO GIFT CONTROVERSY

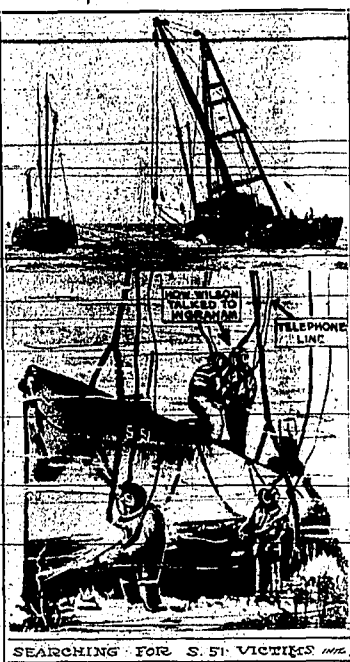

## ARMY DEFEATS NOTRE DAME 11

### Knute Rockne's Football Team Goes Down Before Eleven at Stadium—First Since 1923.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 17 (AP)—Notre Dame today defeated Knute Rockne's pessimistic prediction in a precipitous plunge from its lofty gridiron throne before a colorful throng of 65,000 at Yankee stadium.

Battered into submission by a powerful Army football machine, the Fighting Irish left the second of the first passengers to land, said that the rescue work was hampered in a number of instances. 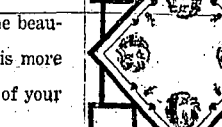
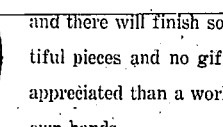

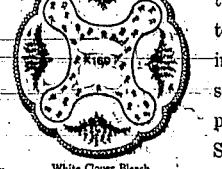

# AFFIRMS DECREE OF FORECLOSURE OF WATER RIGHT

United States Court of Appeals Hands Down Important Opinion in Reference to Salmon River Project.

The United States circuit court of appeals for the Tenth circuit today (10th) October 12, copies of which were received here Saturday, has affirmed a decree entered in the fall of last year by Judge F. S. Dietrich in United States district court in Boise in the case of Charles Salvo and others, appellants, against the Commonwealth Trust company of Pittsburgh, holding that the corporate entity is entitled to foreclose water contracts for lands on the Salmon river project.

Salmon river landholders against whom foreclosure proceedings were instituted, who appealed to the federal courts in these actions, include Charles Salvo, were Frank Gable, Stephen G. A. E. Caldwell, R. S. Kunkel, J. R. Hildahl, Michael Dean, C. L. Salvo, G. A. Salvo, W. H. Skinner, L. V. Hoan, Wesley J. Washburn and J. S. Keel.

In its opinion the circuit court disposed of the questions raised by the appellants—that other settlers must be brought in as indispensable to adjudication of the various claims; that the contract was for a specific quantity of water and that no recovery by the plaintiffs should be based upon the duty of water, and that no interest should be allowed to the plaintiffs upon recovery, except from the date of the entry of the decree of foreclosure.

The circuit court also disposed of the contention of the plaintiff corporation as cross-appellee, that when the state board of land commissioners determined the area of the project, 25,000 acres, for which water rights should be sold, there was no basis for jurisdiction of the courts to make determination of that question. On this question the circuit court held that "the courts are not deprived of the right to construe the limitations contained within the decrees of the state board of land commissioners and the construction company and the state," and cited a decision of the supreme court in referring to similar contracts with settlers, that upheld the power of the district court in allowing more than the quantity of water stipulated in the contract, upon the ground that the Idaho statute requires that the amount of water allowed shall never be in excess of what is used for beneficial purposes, and the statute forbids the use by an owner of more water than good husbandry requires.

plaintiff and the South case. In the pleading herein the plaintiffs accept the notion of the state board and the existence of the interest whereby there was a reduction of the project to 25,000 acres of irrigable lands, and have shown that the entire acreage of the decrees appealed from, appellants' interest in the project, is in the hands of the district court shares representing 1.57 shares for each irrigable acre in the entire project. The plaintiffs, it is contended by appellants, thus without regard to the claims of other persons in the project, have the same proportionate share and interest in the water rights of the project as they would have had if there were no other contracts outstanding for more than 25,000 irrigable acres. In the South case the complaint was construed as disregarding the allegations fixing the price of the water right at \$100 per acre on the theory that the fee claimed was to be determined by distributing the total net output for the water with interest over all of the irrigated lands at a rate average basis upon that theory the allegations of the complaint were considered as involving the determination of the total output and of the total acre irrigated, and in view of the comprehensiveness of these questions the supreme court said: "Every contract holder has an interest in them and will be affected by their determination however made. It is, of course, to him, not merely whether his tract be held to have been reduced and to be chargeable with part of the general output, but also whether and to what extent other lands are in the same situation. In this and other respects what is determined in respect of other holders is of direct concern to him. In short, the interests of the contract holders are so related that an effective and just determination of the question can only be had in a proceeding to which all are parties." No such allegations are found in the present complaint and the decree herein, as between the parties before the court, has determined their rights without injuriously affecting the rights of others not before the court.

Trial in the "hard cider" cases has been completed for the present term of district court here, according to indications from the office of the attorney for Joe Martine, defendant in the fifth of these actions, stated that Martine probably would plead guilty to technical violation of the liquor law, and it was learned that the prosecution probably would dismiss charges against V. Three of the four defendants brought to trial were found guilty by jury and judgment in these cases will be pronounced Monday by Judge W. A. Harwick. They are Victor Genuisa, Peter Minue and James H. Stillwell. The jury in the case of A. W. Schiffgen, defendant in the fourth of the hard cider

cases brought to trial, failed to agree on a verdict.

Each of these cases was brought before the district court on appeal from judgment on conviction in the probate court.

Evidence in each case was similar, tending to show that samples of cider taken from the stills from the village of Martine had contained from four to six per cent alcohol.

Judge Balrock on Saturday expressed members of the jury until Monday, October 20.

Several suits are to be tried by the court this week.

# Babson's Annual Statement on Crop Outlook Optimistic

Noted Statistician Tells Why Conditions on Farm This Fall Should Put Heart in the Merchants.

BALTIMORE, Md., Oct. 17.—When the news of the harvest of the year is announced, the annual statement on the crop situation is a matter of interest to the merchant and the farmer alike. **Watching Crop Reports**

When it was a young man working in Wall street 25 years ago, he would read the crop reports with the most important financial and business news of the month. The entire Washington telegraph system was held up at noon on the day of the reports that the crop report was in. He could be found to every city, town and hamlet. Stock prices rose and fell in accordance with the simple rule, "if the crop was better than expected, the price would go up, and if it was worse than expected, the price would go down."

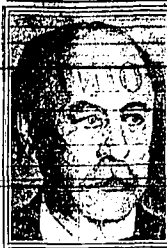
Today crop reports are issued without arousing hardly any interest on the part of business men. Instead of these reports being referred to in great headlines on the front page of our newspapers, as was the case 25 years ago, they now appear in an insignificant position on an inside page. Yet the reports are greater and more profitable than ever before. What is the reason for this remarkable lack of interest? The reason is that crops have become so stabilized during the past few years and the reports are so uniformly and consistently good that they cease to be of interest as formerly.

The diversification of crops and the use of more scientific methods, crop failures in the old days have been almost eliminated. Although individual farmers do better or do worse at different seasons, an entire state usually averages up about the same each year and the country as a whole does better each year as time goes on. There may be crop failures in one crop in one section, but never in all crops or all sections.

**World Crop Conditions**

Instead of the farmer being the one who is interested in the crop situation, it is the merchant who is interested in the world crop conditions. Last seasons of the country approximated what they raised the previous year, and generally this abundance is a little greater rather than a little less than that raised the previous year. This means that the prosperity of the farmer is not so dependent upon the volume raised as upon the price of the product. Furthermore, the price today depends upon world crop conditions rather than upon local conditions. To illustrate, the price which the Dakota wheat grower receives depends not on the crop conditions in Dakota as on the crop conditions in Europe and South America. World crop conditions rather

supply of gold for currency purposes, is \$200,000,000 greater than the entire foreign war debt to the United States; it exceeds total merchandise imported and exported last year by \$6,000,000,000. It would require three years of record building, such as witnessed in 1924 and 1925, to equal this \$1,000,000,000. I might say many other things to show what these crops mean to America, but let me say in conclusion that they would pay nearly five times all our annual expenses of government, including interest on the bonded debt. They represent five times the value of all our shipping and the value of our year's crop would almost purchase the country's entire railway system, or any other great business.

General business is well on its upward turn. It now registers 11 per cent above normal by the February test. The feeling is distinctly better in most sections of the country. Again, Wall Street in Davy Jones's locker is in improved condition. Let us all wait so that we may now hold them—let us not again become careless, let us be frugal and disciplined and thereby make these conditions and conditions which make business sound.

The old custom has to have in the modern fast day, which was a day devoted to prayer for guidance in connection with the political and state of the world. This was followed in the fall by Thanksgiving—Thanksgiving is not a holiday and thanksgiving. The fast day has completely gone by, while Thanksgiving is now observed largely as a matter of form. Statistics, however, clearly show that we now ought to observe Thanksgiving day more than ever before, as the bountifulness of our crops is so great. Truly God is very good to us—much better than we deserve.

**IDAHO'S CROPS  
GROW RECORD**

Situation Combines Bumper Production With Prospect of Better Prices.

As the season draws to a close, it is apparent that Idaho's crop production will be very much better than 1924 and can now rise to the record production of 1923, says the Idaho October crop report.

WHEAT—A preliminary estimate is made of a yield of 133 bushels of spring wheat per acre and of a total spring wheat production, including durum of 281,575,000 bushels.

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POTATOES—The prospects for potatoes show no appreciable change since September 1. The indicated crop in round numbers remains at 344,000,000 bushels.

FRUITS—The forecasts of apples, peaches, pears and grapes show little change in the last month.

Foreign Wheat Prospects—The wheat crop in 28 foreign countries of the northern hemisphere reported by "Dette" is estimated to be 5,153,000,000 bushels, compared with 5,758,000,000 bushels for the same countries last year.

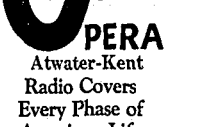

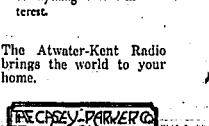
