RUSSIA CAPTURES BULGARIAN ARMY

Ministry of National Defense Declares Nation Not to Submit to Outrages at Hands of Invaders.

(By the Associated Press.) SOFIA, Oct. 24.—Bulgaria will repel by force of arms any further invasion of her territory. Mindful of her signature of the Neutrality Treaty, Bulgaria will fight with the few thousand men left in a standing army.

Word comes that the Greeks have captured Bulgarian territory to a depth of seven miles on the border of Thrace and that Petchik, only a few miles to the west of Thessalonica, where the first clash occurred, has been under a heavy bombardment.

Belgrade, the capital of Yugoslavia, thus far has shown a friendly attitude, for which Bulgarian statesmen and people are duly appreciative.

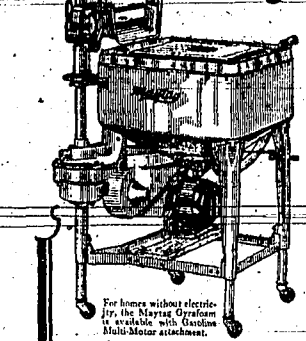

WASHINGTON, D. C. (Special to The News)—According to articles received from the National Navy Day committee at Washington, D. C., the Hon. Burton L. 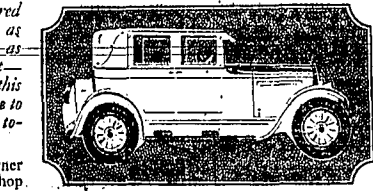

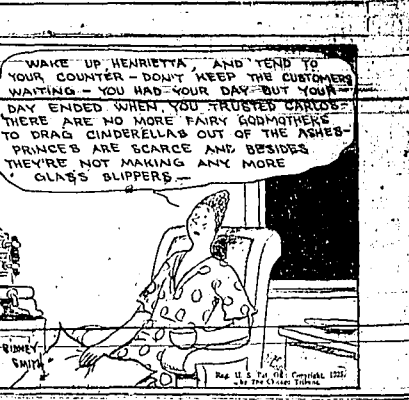

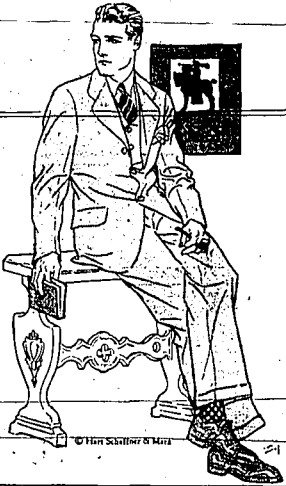
