

# 18 KILLED IN TRAIN WRECK; FIFTY INJURED

### Invisible Defect in Steel Rail Given As Cause for Smashup of Flier Near Victoria, Mississippi.

(By The Associated Press.) MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 27.—The death list as a result of the fatal train wreck at Victoria, Miss., early today of the Sunnyside, rail train, and San Francisco railroad passenger train, stopped at 10. A total of 18 persons were in hospital, 18 reported in a critical condition.

Of the injured 37 are white and 17 negroes. Hospital records indicated that the condition of eight of the white injured was critical. The recovery of five of the negroes injured also was regarded as doubtful.

MEASURES WERE TAKEN TO PREVENT A REPEAT OF THE ACCIDENT. A steel rail defect in a 90 pound steel rail found to be responsible for a loss of eight lives and injury to more than fifty other persons when the Sunnyside, St. Louis-Southwestern-San Francisco train, one of the fastest and best equipped trains operating in the south, crashed at Victoria, Miss., 35 miles south of Memphis and dished down a 25-foot embankment.

Four full-size, a half car, a combination engine coach and smoker with the baggage, express and mail cars dished down the embankment and into the ravine, telescoped and pounded by the impact into a mass of tangled wreckage.

Twenty wrecking crews still were clearing away the debris.

# NEW RECORDS MADE BY PLANE

Army Lieutenant Smashes All Speed Marks With Sea-plane Over Short Course.

NAVY STORE PARK, BALTIMORE, Md., Oct. 27. (AP)—Another land speed record was broken today by a Curtiss biplane piloted by James H. Doolittle of the United States Army.

Mr. Doolittle later today captured his "black-Curtiss" record across a three kilometer course in the fastest time ever recorded, 23.77 minutes, 25.73 miles per hour. The mark will become the official world record for maximum sustained speed when recognized by the Federation Aeronautique Internationale.

It was made in a special speed trial which Lieutenant Doolittle entered alone.

Condition Not Ideal

The "black-Curtiss" plane made its premier mark under conditions that were by no means ideal, with a quarter mile wind raking the course. With the same Curtiss biplane he yesterday set a record of 200 kilometers per hour in 59.06 seconds—average speed of 235.572 miles per hour.

Mr. Doolittle, under the Federation Aeronautique Internationale regulations, took the three kilometer course in 1:00.000 minutes. His official record was computed as the average of four consecutive flights over the distance, two in each direction, to eliminate wind advantage or disadvantage.

Set a Standard

The supersonic Napier 54, British racing airplane, wrecked here in a trial flight, piloted by Captain Henry Doolittle, today set a new world record of 256.72 miles per hour at Southampton shortly before his airplane to this country.

Lieutenant Doolittle set a new world record in a supersonic airplane record of 573 miles per hour for the Schneider distance of 350 kilometers, 234.772 for 100 kilometers, 200 for 50 kilometers and 245.713 for maximum speed, all made yesterday and today.

# FRENCH CABINET RECOGNIZING CRISIS FACING NATION

M. Painleve and His Colleagues Quits As Result of Opposition to Caillaux's Financial Policy.

(By The Associated Press.) PARIS, Oct. 27.—M. Painleve's ministry, which was constituted April 16, last, and took up the reins of government after the resignation of the Herriot cabinet, ended its career today.

The fall of the ministry was due to M. Caillaux's financial policy, his resignation being precipitated by the cabinet's refusal to accept the new cabinet, conferring this afternoon with most of the persons usually consulted in a cabinet crisis and dealing chiefly on the financial situation in his talks.

Mr. Caillaux was the first to be received by M. Doumergue after the cabinet's resignation. The minister of finance, however, was not summoned for the purpose of consulting with him regarding the new ministry; he was received at his own request, talking with him a few minutes before the cabinet's resignation.

The president of senate and chamber M. De Zelves and M. Herriot, and the chairman of the finance committee of the senate and chamber were later called before the president and questioned by him regarding the financial situation. It was stated that the situation would be cleared quickly.

The president will be called. M. Doumergue, president of the council, will meet tomorrow morning after which it is expected that a cabinet crisis will be formed to form the new group. The general impression is that the cabinet will be replaced by a new group.

The new cabinet will likely have the collaboration of active support of M. Doumergue. M. Doumergue will be asked to remain minister of foreign affairs.

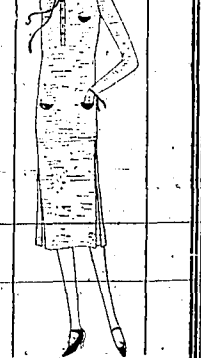

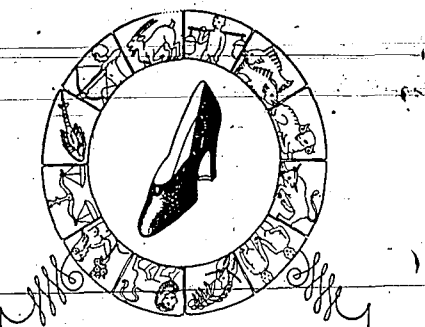
