List of Standardized Institutions is Announced at Philadelphia Congress.

Out of the eleven hospitals in Idaho eight or 72.7 per cent have been accredited and appear on the approved list of the American College of Surgeons...

Idaho hospitals on the approved list are: St. Alphonsus hospital, Boise; St. Mary's hospital, Idaho Falls; St. Luke's hospital, Pocatello; St. Anthony's hospital, Pocatello; St. Joseph's hospital, Lewiston; St. Luke's hospital, Boise; St. Mark's hospital, St. Maries.

The hospitals at Wallace and St. Maries, according to the American College of Surgeons, announced they have accepted the requirements...

The first survey of 200 hospitals in the United States and Canada, according to the American College of Surgeons, shows 154 or 77 per cent met the requirements of hospital standardization.

In presenting the report the director general said: "This list of approved hospitals is of special interest. The patient can more intelligently and more safely choose a hospital and a doctor when ill. The young woman with a mild condition to become a nurse is assisted in her selection of a training school. The recent medical graduate seeks for more practical experience work the approved hospital for his internship. Federal, state, municipal and philanthropic organizations frequently consult this list in their selection of institutions when rendering financial assistance. Already the American Railway association has arranged their 11,000 surgeons to select for their patient so far as possible hospitals approved by the American college of surgeons. The United States army, navy, veterans bureau, public health service and national fire and disabled volunteer corps share outposts in this program and the approved hospitals of these groups appear on the list today. The American college of surgeons appreciates the opportunity to better hospital and medical service for the thousands of patients passing through the hospitals of the United States and Canada annually. This program is a step toward the betterment of the social and economic life of our people. The requirements are individual and fundamental. They are applicable to any hospital regardless of size, type or location. Any institution, ethical and sound, meeting the standards is acceptable. The public is therefore asking why certain hospitals are not on the list."

The hospitals whose names appear on the approved list today are those recognized as fulfilling the fundamental requirements for good service in the patient, as assumed through (a) efficient staff organization; (b) adequate diagnostic and therapeutic facilities; (c) trained personnel; (d) complete case records; (e) periodic check-up of medical staff; (f) efficient work of the hospital.

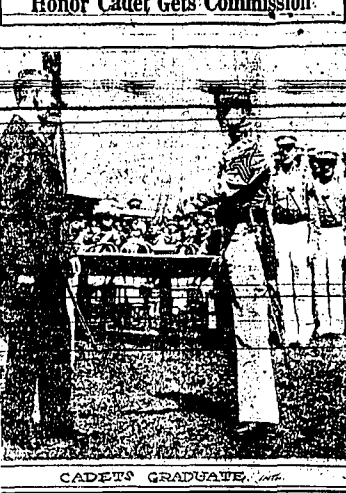

HEAVY SELLING STOPS ADVANCE

Grain Prices Undergo Slump as Result of Profit-Taking Following Early Increase.

CHICAGO, Oct. 28. (AP)—Heavy selling in the wheat market late today wiped out most of an earlier sharp advance in prices. The temporary high was due more to a speculative purchasing by speculators than to a genuine increase in demand.

On wheat's upward swing, commission houses and elevator operators were leading Chicago traders were the chief buyers of December delivery. Meanwhile, eastern interests were heavy purchasers of May and with the market for the time being almost free of offerings. With the wheat market values appeared until after a jump of 3 cents a bushel. Then profit-taking set in. With the wheat market, however, and adequate support for prices was lacking.

Indications that only a difference of a couple of cents prevented shipments of wheat and that most of the wheat in Chicago was a factor in bringing about the late setback in prices here. Speculators also were active in selling, on the fact that the Liverpool market was showing an advance.

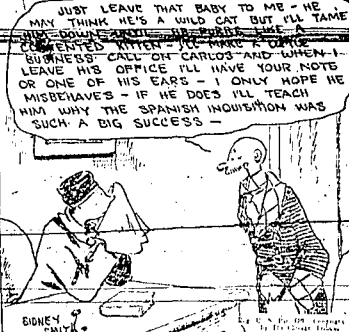
