

CANDIDATES IN POLITICS WAIT TO STATE THEIR POSITIONS TODAY

Many State, City and Federal Offices Will Be Filled by Voters at Polls; to Name Governor in New Jersey.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2 (AP)—Thirteen states tonight elect candidates for city, federal, borough and town offices, and the voters will elect the governor in New Jersey.

Major Smith in Detroit is seeking reelection on Tuesday. He is charged with being a Ku Klux Klan member. In Louisville William P. Baker, the democratic nominee, withdrew from the mayoralty contest upon a challenge from the republican who tested the constitutionality of Mr. Baker's record.

Anderson Shot by Detective

Pal of Super-Criminal Pays Penalty With His Life in Fight With Sleuth.

MUSKOGEE, Mich., Nov. 2 (AP)—The incredible haul of the law has been the result of the capture of George "Dutch" Anderson, the super-criminal, Gerald Chapman, and the man whose face shines from thousands of "wax" stencils in jail offices and jails across the continent.

### TEN FOOTBALL TEAMS LEADING

Eastern Elevens Remain Undefeated After Hard List of Games Saturday.

**NEW YORK, Nov. 2 (AP).**—Ten eastern football elevens remain undefeated, having been limited from the highlights of their respective leagues. Leading the remarkable list is Hartford, the visit of the Navy to the west and the development of power by institutions of the northeast.

Only one, Syracuse, retains an undefeated goal line, Cornell having permitted Harvard to score Saturday while Bucknell and New York University went down before Holy Cross and Fordham respectively.

Of the ten remaining at the head of the list, four will become entangled in encounters this week and another two must come forth victorious. The meeting between Dartmouth and Cornell at Ithaca, N. Y., undoubtedly will be the center of interest, although Holy Cross and Fordham stage a sparkling encounter at the college stadium in the first of the 1925-26 "three" meetings with all signs pointing to a tiger contest.

Harvard and Princeton, both defeated in this season, will clash at Palmer stadium in the first of the 1925-26 "three" meetings with all signs pointing to a tiger contest.

## REVIEWS IDAHO STATE FINANCES

### Department of Commerce Announces Statistics on Revenues, Expenditures and Debt

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—The payments for operation and maintenance of the general departments of Idaho for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1924, amounted to \$3,942,209, or \$8.21 per capita, according to a summary of financial statistics of the state for the fiscal year, announced by the department of commerce.

The total expenditures for 1924, including the 1923-24 comparative period for maintenance operation of general departments was \$7,760,450, or \$16.72 per capita. The interest on debt amounted to \$4,299,989 and outlays for permanent improvements \$1,968,241. The total payments, therefore, for expenses of general departments, interest and outlays were \$6,154,149. The totals include all payments for the year, whether made from current revenues or from the proceeds of land sales.

Of the governmental cost reported above, \$2,814,892 was for highway repairs. This was \$5,262,171 more than the total payments of the year, exclusive of the payments for permanent improvements. Property taxes represented 43.1 per cent of the total revenue for 1924, 41.8 per cent for 1923 and 39.7 per cent for 1922. The increase in the amount of special taxes collected was \$2,208,142, from \$107,422 in 1922 to \$1,035,284 in 1924. A decrease of 14.5 per cent in 1924 over 1923 was due to a change in the method of collecting special taxes.

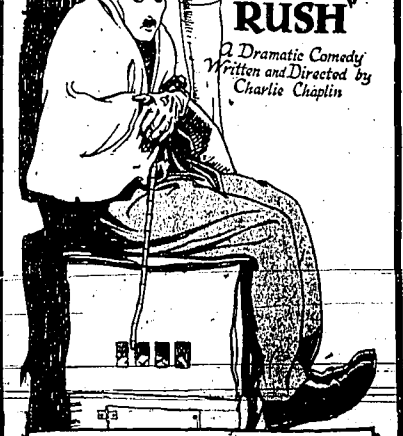
