TWO FACTORS IN DEATH OF GIRL

Poison Alone Not Responsible for Madge Oberholzer Death State Witnesses Say.

NOBLESVILLE, Ind., Nov. 3 (AP)—Three medical experts testified for the state today in the murder trial of a Stephenson and Earl Greany, which followed injuries received in an alleged attack, contributed to the death of Madge Oberholzer—Just—April 14.

Johnston, former grand juror of the Indiana Six Six team and his two bodyguards, are charged with the first degree murder for alleged withholding of medical aid and they also learned life girl had taken poison. Another court charges murder in connection with poisoning her to Haunmond and attacking her.

Dr. Virgil Moon, pathologist of the Indiana university school of medicine, Dr. J. M. Marshall, Indianapolis physician, and Dr. R. N. Harger, chemist at the Indiana university school of medicine, testified as expert witnesses. Vigorous efforts by the defense to break down their testimony developed little of a sensational nature.

Ed Humann, defense counsel, had the witness present a picture of the sort Miss Oberholzer swallowed to that the jury might note how readily the tablets were dissolved in water.

The defense pressed hard for expert knowledge as to the necessity of giving evidence after the first few days of an illness such as that of Miss Oberholzer, but the physician withheld the treatment, and they said, the pain was greatly minimized after the first few days, but she died.

Defense counsel previously had developed that Miss Oberholzer was given medicine and pills for the day she slipped on March 25—the day she slipped a first witness charging Stephenson and his aide with having abducted and attacked her.

NOBLESVILLE, Ind., Nov. 3 (AP)—The poison which Madge Oberholzer took in a Haunmond hotel was not alone responsible for her death, Dr. Virgil Moon, pathologist, testified in the trial of D. C. Stephenson, Earl Greany and Earl Kleck, for first degree murder in connection with the death.

Dr. Moon answered two hypothetical questions put by the state, which alleged malfeasance, following abduction, contributed to her death. He testified she died after she disappeared from her home.

He testified gave his opinion that the complications which caused her death, and that neither in itself would have proved fatal.

He testified that the circumstances alleged by the state in the case, and acted directly upon the opinion of Dr. Moon, caused her death.

Complications Caused.

He testified that the complications, death resulted from complications rather than from the direct effects of self-administered poison.

Answering another hypothetical question about the manner in which poisoning which he testified might have been caused from the girl's stomach, he testified that the poison was almost certain in the absence of the complications set forth.

Dr. Moon testified that a post mortem examination of which he based conclusions to which he testified regarding the nature of the poisoning, both that by her own hand and that which she said resulted from infection of the throat.

Hours Scramble.

Mrs. Josephine Luvosa, residing near the Stephenson home, and Mrs. Della Haulley, a bodyguard, told their stories about the place on March 17. Mrs. Luvosa was awakened after midnight on the morning of March 17, by the "terrible screams" of a woman and by howling dogs which she said she knew by the name of Stephenson. Haulley told of seeing a man known as "Shanty" washing a car on the back porch of the Stephenson estate about 6 o'clock that morning, and of seeing a man whom she had heard called Earl Greany, entering a tray to the garage, with what appeared to be food on it.

The state alleged that Miss Oberholzer was returned from Haunmond by automobile the night of March 16 and kept prisoner in the Stephenson garage over night and until 11 a. m. the next day.

TRADE MARK IS UPHELD

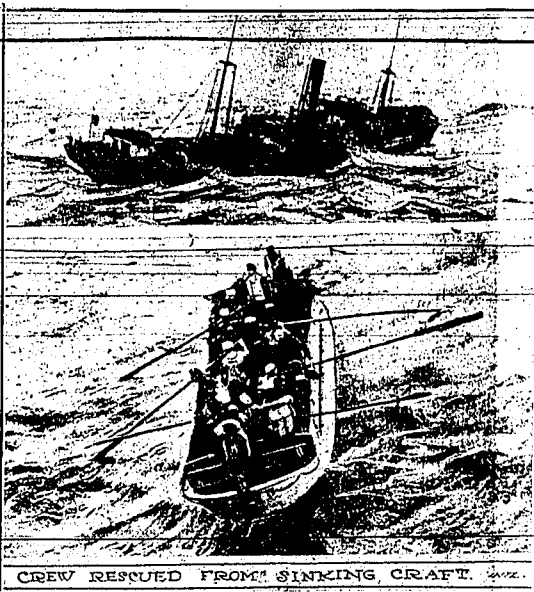

MOVIE MERGER CHARGE DENIED

Film Company Accused of Conspiracy to Develop Monopoly of Industry by Agents.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—Charges of conspiracy to develop a monopoly in the motion picture industry were denied in a brief filed with the federal trade commission by the Famous Players-Lasky corporation.

SEVEN OF 22 OWE BOND

ST. SHOALS BOARD FAIL TO AGREE RAILROAD MEN CONFER ON WAGE

Commission Appointed by President Ends Labors Without Reaching Unanimous Decision

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—The Marine Shallows commission appointed by President Coolidge to solve the problem of disposition of the government's gigantic power project in Alaska, practically ended its efforts yesterday in disagreement.

The commission, which met in the White House, failed to reach a unanimous decision on the project, and the majority and a single report would be filed.

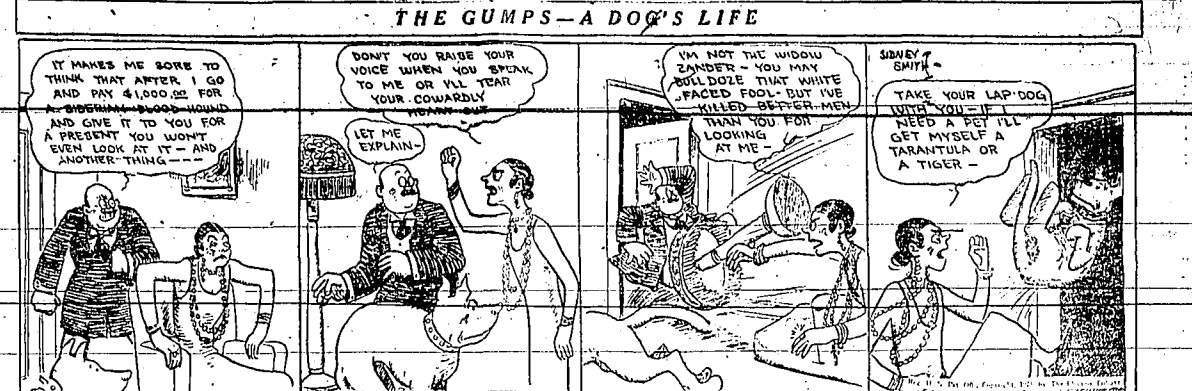
