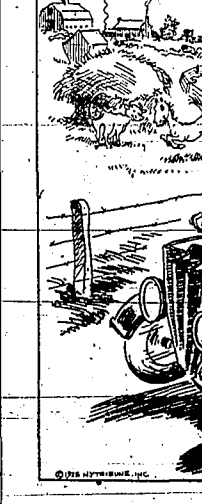

# GOVERNOR WILL TAKE STEPS TO MODIFY DRY ACT

### Successful Candidates for Chief Executive of New Jersey Would Repeal Part of Dry Law Now in Force.

MOORE, N. J., Nov. 4. (AP)—Success in his candidacy for chief executive of New Jersey as an avowed "wet," A. Harry Moore, democrat, and commissioner of Jersey liquor is expected to have congress today the Volstead act.

Moore yesterday defeated State Senator Arthur Whitney, republican, who declared for enforcement of the Volstead act and the strict enforcement act.

Moore, with virtually complete returns tabulated had a plurality of 52,522. The vote was Moore 418,229; Whitney 406,777.

When the returns were in Moore said:

"I propose immediately after my inauguration to initiate a conference with congress to modify the Volstead act so as to permit the manufacture and sale of light wines and beers."

### Six Months Campaign

The campaign extended over six months. The state national league endorsed Senator Whitney.

Moore's election in a state which last year gave President Coolidge a plurality of 270,000 was seen as increasing the prestige of the Prohibition league, head of the Idaho county democratic organization and a vice chairman of the national democratic committee. It was in Russian territory that Commissioner Moore piled up the enormous plurality.

The rest of the state gave Whitney a plurality of almost 60,000. Whitney, an anti-union candidate against a candidate favored by Senator Edge, could not issue of his liquor versus "Cockleberry" after being nominated.

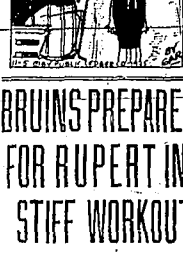

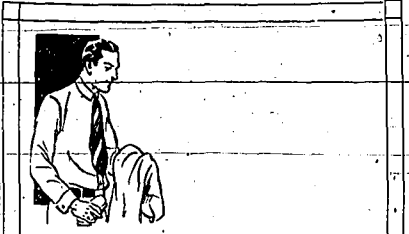
