While not giving definite endorsement to the measure in its present form, President Coolidge looked with favor on the decision on the part of the publicans and democrats of the committee. He was told of the committee's action by Representative William G. Bardenheier, who will be the republican leader at the next session and who, while differing with the committee member in the main with the committee members.

The committee, working on such a measure for the first time in years without party lines, adjourned today before considering revision of the excise tax schedule on Monday. 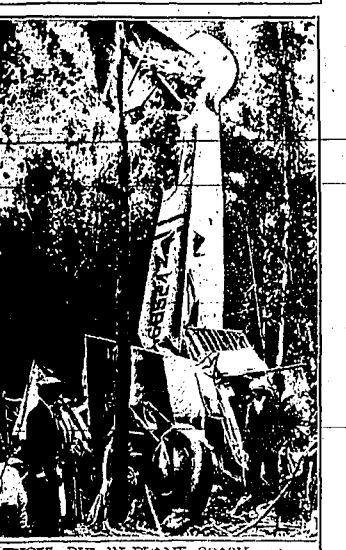

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Nov. 7.—Out of the mire and mud of Illinois' \$200,000 memorial stadium, Illinois' Grange today defeated Chicago, 13 to 6, while 70,000 spectators sat through a driving rain, drenched to the skin to pay tribute to Red Grange, in one of the most remarkable demonstrations ever given in athletic.

The average thousand wanted in vain for the availability of Tennessee's championship stream to break loose on the slippery, muddy gridiron and race across the chalk line to give them the ball they were seeking, but the goal post was unable to break away from him. He was simply unable to keep his feet from slipping.

Interference a Merit.

Grange's interference today was his best because neither Britton or Haggerty, slipping and sliding as the mud, could get started in time to spill the Maroon tankards and give Grange to get in behind them and bash out one of his famous oak back kicks.

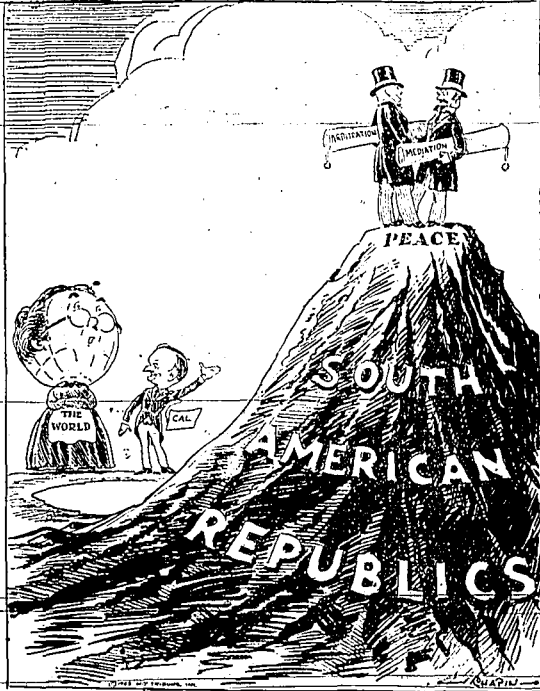

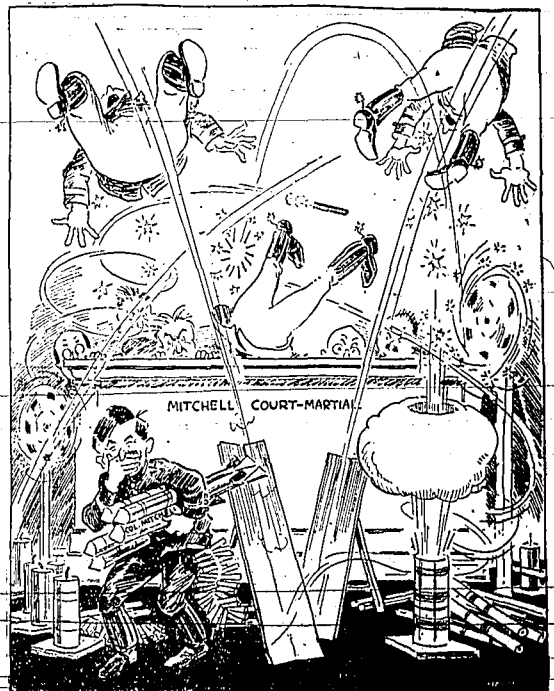

The wall at the side of the fireplace will represent the state in the light of the province of learning in the universities and schools and on the left as the province of the sick and help in its hospitals and prisons. The opposite wall will represent the idea of equality before the law in which will be represented the virtues of the state. The wall on the right is represented by the seven principal points of the law, which stand as judges before the processes of human beings.

These three prominent phases include the whole first plane of the decoration and is divided into three groups. They represent the liberty of political freedom, the religious and moral liberty of the electorate or political freedom.

Opposite these panels will be all among groups representing the virtues of the state, symbolizing the virtues of citizenship—courage, magnanimity, perseverance, vision, respectability, honesty, righteousness and understanding.

The ceiling proper represents the virtues of the state in the form of the sun in the center of the ceiling, which brings the rains and produces abundant crops. Opposite this panel and below it is the ceiling of the state, representing the virtues of the state in the person of the state. Between these panels is a circular panel in which a figure representing the state is shown in the center of the ceiling.

PARIS, Nov. 7 (AP)—La France, known as the "trouserless daily," is being revived and will again be directed by its picturesque editor, M. Maurice Durand.

The paper was a great success in its early days in employing women's rights, and the beautiful M. Durand not only conducted a bitter editorial but also led the militant suffragettes dressed in capote known and wearing jewels.

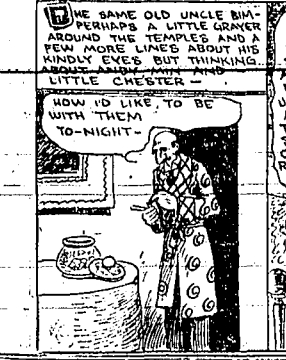

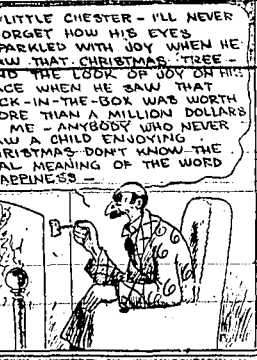

**FIRST MODERN APARTMENT IN TOKYO RENTED BEFORE READY**

TOKYO, Nov. 7. (AP)—Residents of Tokyo are to have their first experience with life in a modern, American apartment house. The first such building ever constructed here will soon be ready for occupancy.

Mr. S. Morimoto of the Imperial University has supervised the work of construction, with the assistance of his wife, and will direct the management.

The building is on the American style throughout. It is four stories high, fire proofed, has a concrete and steel frame, and contains 42 apartments ranging from two to four rooms.

More than 25 persons have filed applications for the apartments. As the government advanced part of the 50,000 yen needed for the building cost, it was reported that not more than one-third of the apartments may be taken.

The building is equipped with electric, gas, water, heating, and other modern conveniences. The work and ceilings are finished with foreign materials and have the finish of the floors of other countries are of polished wood.

On the first floor of the building are public rooms, including dining room, reception room, banquet hall, and stores. In the basement and laundry, drying, storage and refrigerating rooms, the heating plant and garage.

There are accommodations for servants, who may be had by the hour or by the day at a nominal fee. Foreign style food will be served in the restaurant which will be open to the public. Servants may be had from the restaurant at any apartment.

The apartments were built as an experiment by the Culture Diffusion Foundation, of which Mr. Morimoto is director, to show the practicability of modern Western apartments in Japan.

**VARIETY OF CORKS AFFECTS LONDON'S CHAMPAGNE MARKET**

LONDON, Nov. 7. (AP)—Good champagne bottle corks are collected by waiters in large restaurants here as eagerly as are tips. The corks are worth money and figure strangely in the quotation on the champagne market.

Wine merchants establish a cork clearing house that is known to all eye wine waiters. It is designed to house the cork market. Before prohibition there were 1,300 licensed suppliers of alcoholic drinks.

Walters in all the large restaurants here are to receive a 10 percent daily quotation on the clearing house rate, the cork prices varying from 10 to 15 cents a dozen.

At times when sales of any brand show signs of falling off, the price of its corks rises, as an incentive to waiters to sell the surplus of this particular kind. Waiters everywhere here now collect champagne bottle corks as eagerly as they do tips.

**TAX ON FOREIGN FINANCE**

PARIS, Nov. 7. (AP)—A tax on foreign finance is the most up to date thing in French economic legislation.

Money and securities will be returned to their owners at a charge of 5 per cent of their value. Jewelry, except anything having no intrinsic value, is redeemable on the same terms. The 5 per cent value clause is inserted to kill a very promising publicity field in the matter of lost property. For every other article, now or nearly new, two francs will be charged for everything else, one franc.

**NON-INFLAMMABLE BOARD FROM SAWDUST AND WASTE**

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 7. (AP)—A group of lumber men here have become interested in the possibilities of the product after a demonstration proved that the synthetic board was as strong as a stone that would cut through steel. Sawdust and other mill waste are treated with chemicals and made into a non-inflammable material, pressed into boards of any size.

Lumber men behind the project believe that it will make possible fire-proof houses of wood. The cost of synthetic boards was estimated at 315 per thousand square feet for boards one-quarter of an inch thick.

California is one of the great growing grounds for walnuts at present, the industry increasing its wealth to the extent of more than \$15,000,000 a year. The California walnut industry was started by a Danish immigrant, a man named Jensen, who introduced the common English walnut into that part of the world.
