## ILLINOIS WINS FROM CHICAGO IN HARD GAME

Red Grange Gets Great Ovation on Champaign Field; Muddy Gridiron Prevents Every Effort.

(By the Associated Press.)

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Nov. 7.—Out of the mire and mud of Illinois' \$200,000 memorial stadium, Illinois' Grange today defeated Chicago, 13 to 6, while 70,000 spectators sat through a driving rain, drenched to the skin to pay tribute to Red Grange, in one of the most remarkable demonstrations ever given in athletic.

The average thousand wanted in vain for the availability of Tennessee's championship stream to break loose on the slippery, muddy gridiron and race across the chalk line to give them the ball they were seeking, but the goaling ghost was unable to break away from him. He was simply unable to keep his feet from slipping.

Interference a Merit.

Grange's interference today was his best because neither Britton or Haggerty, slipping and sliding in the mud, could get started in time to spill the Maroon tankards and give Grange to get in behind them and bash out one of his famous oak back kicks.

Interference fended by the time his shock troops were ready, the Wheaton line slipped or fell into the pools of water, while the Maroons piled on top of them.

Grange's outstanding offensive achievement was a 25-yard return of a kickoff.

Stars on Defense.

It was on the defense that he shined, in addition to running the Illinois' footballers to his quarterback position.

Once he stopped punning Maroons so fearfully that the Maroon players tumbled four yards from a touchdown.

After the Chicago touchdown Grange snatched House's attempted pass for the extra point.

His best defensive play when he spotted Wesley, Chicago end, ten yards and brought him down after the Maroon punter had scooped a punt into the goal.

The rain-soaked gridiron was not favorable conditions. The field was a quagmire with pools of water dotting its Franklin field, over which Grange ran to glory in the mud a week ago, was a one-day phenomenon compared to the footing provided today.

Use Oil Cloth.

The rain-soaked spectators tried to protect themselves with almost every conceivable kind of covering. Wearing long strips of white oilcloth with holes cut through the middle for their heads, they resembled a conclave of robbers and model fishermen. They wrapped strips of both around their heads.

Beautifully clothed women who came here to see Grange ran, sat undismayed and watched the colors in their hats.

The inspired Maroons presented a lively battle that outlasted Grange until the war was injured and taken out in the second period.

The Maroons had a decided advantage because of the weight and power of their driving backfield, but Illinois played the smarter game.

Interference.





# PARISIAN SIDELIGHTS

### Trouserless daily being revived in Paris; John D. Junior, drives four-in-hand in France; Capital turns to cyatars.

PARIS, Nov. 7 (AP)—La France, known as the "trouserless daily," is being revived and will again be directed by its picturesque editor, M. Maurice Durand.

The paper was a great success in its early days in employing women's rights, and the beautiful M. Durand not only conducted a bitter editorial but also led the militant suffragettes dressed in capote known and wearing jewels.

Feminine France owes much to the blonde hair of the woman who, in the success of La France seemed to justify her, and she has day after day appeared and the war ended hopes for its revival.

Influential Paris newspaper writers are welcoming the resuscitation of the paper, warning existing M. Durand that the first woman to put grace and elegance into the feminist movement and to show that conquest and culture, which are not incompatible with suffragism.

John D. Rockefeller Jr. drove a four-horse coach at a gala dinner some days ago. Mr. Rockefeller is taking the greater part of his vacation this year in Versailles, which he does on a lease for visits to that part of the notable chateau region around Paris lying within the scope of the "Paris motor tour."

He also has been inspecting with considerable interest the remains now being dug up in the chateau of Versailles, in which a considerable part of the king's collection of last year is being deposited under the direction of Wells H. Brinley.

Artists colony at Taos find Indians best picture type

TAOS, N. M., Nov. 7 (AP)—All the artists in the Taos Indian appeals to members of the famous Taos artists' colony as having the best picture type in the world.

The picturesque village in which the Indian is found and the Indian himself with his statuesque physique are the subjects of the bustle in a picturesque environment, which they live in to summer and winter. The lure of the nation-Spanish life around the plain of Taos pueblo and adjoining villages is strong. An endless variety of subjects are here available—the mountains, canyons and mesas, and above all the marvelous coloring, which is to find its equal nowhere else in the country.

The Taos group is said to be among the first band of artists to receive a large order for pictures as an organization. Their members were commissioned to paint three murals for the Missouri state capitol building as a result of the commission, the peaks of the new Missouri capitol may be expected to be painted in the near future.

The Taos Society of Artists, the number of the society, John Sweeney, is confining himself to the painting of Taos Indian subjects. The Taosians are a stalwart race, every one a striking figure, given to staid, or houses in white robes at night. 





The building is on the American style throughout. It is four stories high, fire proofed, has a concrete and steel frame, forced concrete and contains 42 apartments ranging from two to four rooms.

More than 25 persons have filed applications for the apartments. As the government advanced part of the 50,000 yen which the building cost, it was reported that not more than one-third of the apartments may be footleasers.

The building is equipped with electric, gas, water heating system, electricity, gas, telephone and other modern conveniences. The work and ceilings are finished with foreign materials and have the finish of the floors of other countries are of polished wood.

On the first floor of the building are public rooms, including dining room, reception room, banquet hall and stores. In the basement and laundry and drying rooms, storage and refrigerating rooms, the heating plant and garage. There are accommodations for servants, who may be had by the hour or by the day at a nominal fee. Foreign style food will be served in the restaurant which will be open to the public. Servants may be had from the restaurant at any apartment.

The apartments were built as an experiment by the Culture Diffusion Foundation, of which Mr. Morimoto is director, to show the practicability of modern American apartments in Japan.

## VARIETY OF CORKS AFFECTS LONDON'S CHAMPAGNE MARKET

LONDON, Nov. 7. (AP)—Good champagne bottle corks are collected by waiters in large restaurants here as eagerly as are tips. The corks are worth money and figure strangely in the quotations on the champagne market.

Wine merchants establish a cork clearing house that is known to all eye wine waiters. It is designed to house the cork market. Before prohibition there were 1,300 corks in the market.

Waiters in all the large restaurants here are given a list of corks to be given to the cork clearing house. The list of corks is changed weekly according to the brand of the wine and its popularity.

At times when sales of any brand show signs of falling off the price of its corks rises, as an incentive to waiters to be diligent in the sale of this particular kind. Waiters everywhere here now collect champagne bottle corks as eagerly as they do tips.

## NON-INFLAMMABLE BOARD FROM SAWDUST AND WASTE

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 7. (AP)—A synthetic board, non-inflammable and resisting heat and cold, may soon be manufactured from sawdust.

A group of lumber men here became interested in the possibilities of the product. After a demonstration proved that the synthetic board was as strong as a stone that would cut through steel, Sawdust and other mill waste are treated with chemicals and made into a board that is as great as into boards of any size.

Lumber men behind the project believe that it will make possible fire-proof houses of wood. The cost of synthetic boards was estimated at \$15 per thousand square feet for boards one-quarter of an inch thick.

## TO ABOLISH DEATH PENALTY

INDIANAPOLIS, N. S. W., Nov. 7. (AP)—A bill to abolish the death penalty will be presented to the next session of the legislature by the state cabinet.

The measure would substitute imprisonment for the death penalty in all cases provided murderers, the sentence varying in severity in accordance with the circumstances of the crime.

## BRITISH SPIRITS TO U. S. DROP

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7. (AP)—British spirits for medicinal purposes entering the United States legally amounted to only 100 gallons between January and May. At this rate no more than 500 gallons will be sent from England for the entire year. Before prohibition was effective in the United States, they sent more than 1,200,000 gallons annually.

## Walnuts a Valuable Food

Walnuts, the scientists claim, are not only a substantial article of food, but they are an excellent substitute for meat. Walnuts contain far less water than other potatoes, beefsteak, or wheat flour, while the percentage of protein and fat is far in excess. There is only just over one per cent of fat in wheat flour and 32 in beefsteak as compared with 44 per cent in walnuts. California is one of the great growing grounds for walnuts at present, the industry increasing its wealth to the extent of more than \$15,000,000 a year. The California walnut industry was started by a Danish immigrant, a man named Hansen, who introduced the common English walnut into that part of the world.

# Canadian Whiskey Mostly Denatured Alcohol, Is Claim

## Flood From Upper Country Almost Entirely Dammed After Five Years; Dry Agents Have Situation in Hand.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7. (AP)—The flood of Canadian whiskey which spilled over the border during the first years of prohibition, has largely been dammed up and the three-year-old "moonshine" and "cut" whiskey with Canadian label, reports from St. Paul, Detroit, Cleveland and Chicago indicate, prohibition authorities in the St. Paul area say that 55 per cent of the liquor sold there is retailed alcohol. Rum running over the Minnesota line, they say, has been "well in hand" for two and a half years.

Even the anti-prohibitionists admit little Canadian liquor is available. What there is comes in by automobile, generally run at night on moonlight trips from the border to the Twin Cities. The alcohol used in manufacturing take liquor comes in from the east in false consignments and many large seizures have been made.

## 15,000 Blind Pigs

There are 15,000 "blind pigs" in Detroit, estimates Frank H. Crow, commissioner of police, which would indicate a large and steadily flowing supply of alcoholic drinks.
