COMMUNISTS TO HAVE SCHOOLS IN MANY CITIES

Leaders of Party in Minneapolis Young America Doctrines of Moscow.

(By the Associated Press.)
MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 18.—Communist schools, teaching theory of communism and Leninism, are being organized in a number of cities in the United States, according to leaders declared tonight.

A. Hathaway, northeast organizer of the workers' party, established the school here under direction of the central executive committee in Chicago. The school opens tomorrow to run for 20 weeks.

"Young workers," the junior course, is being organized with the objective for distribution of the ideas, records, aimed to offset American education work in the public schools. "We want education for the young," declared Mr. Hathaway tonight. "We are teaching our young people that the country is the United States is the backbone of the class and that the workers must promote the needed change."

In New York and Chicago, he said, schools are in operation to teach the doctrine for the communist school in various parts of the country. The movement is affiliated with the third international of Moscow, he said. The courses consist of English to aid foreign workers especially; the communist theory, history, and the union, advanced economics and Leninism.

Mr. Hathaway said he does not expect any interference with their plans to distribute communist literature in the public schools as this has been done without trouble.

A special publication, "The Young Worker," is being issued from Chicago headquarters to counter with the anti-education work movement, Hathaway said.

While Hathaway did not have specific information as to just what cities schools are being or have been established in, he said, classes will be organized in Milwaukee Thursday night, other schools will be started in every leading American city."

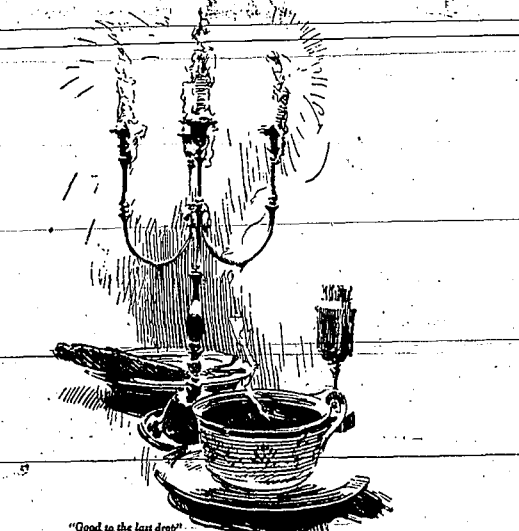

UP TO THE SCHOOLS.

"Let the schools do it." That declares Will C. Wood, superintendent of public instruction of California, in the public's present attitude of busi-

ness shifting. "The schools," he says, "in the hands of the public, are the only hope of the nation. They have had turned over to them the old clothes and shoes of the older institutions."

Parents expect the schools to do for their children's character. "The government expects the schools to teach respect for the law and order," says Wood.

Industry expects the schools to train workmen in all trades, formerly trained by long apprenticeship. Commerce expects the schools to train young men and women to fill positions formerly reached only through long experience in commerce.

City competition and modern methods of living have forced the schools to take up the work of teaching sanitation, health education and hygiene.

And everywhere, it seems, experts are being called to solve the problem of financing the right and proper schools. It is a large order and only the most diligent and inspired educators are very hopeful that it can be filled.

"The public, according to Mr. Wood, after putting this heavy burden on the schools, has been magnificently in the support of them. It will have to give, sooner or later, and only money, but more thought and more cooperation. The sooner it gives the more it will get, the better for the public."

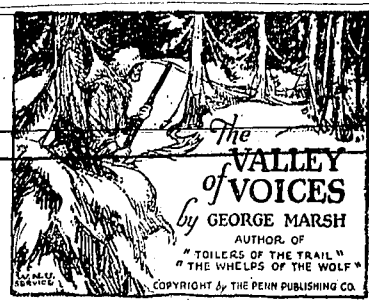

FORMULA AGREED UPON FOR CHINA AT CONFERENCE

Restoration of Tariff Autonomy to Nation and the Abolition of the Likin Worked Out at Peking.

(By the Associated Press.)
PEKING, Nov. 18.—A formula dealing with the restoration of tariff autonomy to China and the abolition of the likin, and in other respects, was agreed upon unanimously and characterized by Dr. C. T. Wang, leader of the Chinese delegation as completely satisfactory to the Chinese government.

The nature of the formula was not revealed. It will be laid before a meeting of all the delegates November 20.

Dr. Wang's satisfaction with the agreement is considered especially significant in view of the Chinese declaration in regard to China's desire on the subject of autonomy of her tariff.

It is also agreed to establish a joint office at Peking to discuss the question of the membership, the reconstruction of the cabinet and the election of a president.

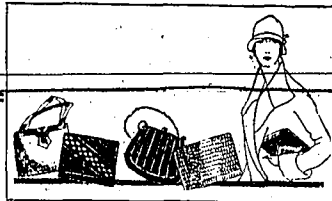

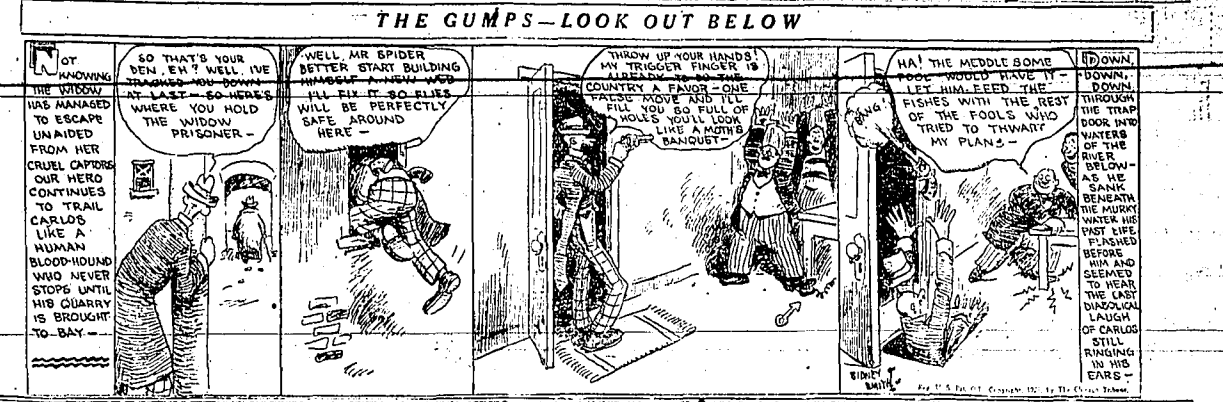
