OUR PROMISE TO BUSINESS WORLD

Commerce of United States Need Fear no Interference From Administration, President Says in Address.

(By the Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—President Coolidge tonight held out a promise to business that it need fear no interference from the administration, if it confines itself to legitimate activities.

Carrying out his thought that government should not "reach out to interfere in the sphere of the individual," the president said: "When government comes unduly and to the influence of business, the tendency is to develop an administrative character, to become narrow and selfish in its outlook and results in oligarchy."

Applauded Often. Repeatedly during his address, the president was applauded, his audience giving evidence of approval of his attitude toward business, his appeal for continued government economy and efficiency in its general financial administration to the world court.

Citing George Washington as a leader who did not hesitate to meet peril, on the frontier of the republic, he provided a precedent for support for world court adherence, declared: "What we must remember is that we must care our dangers; we must not court our enemies; we must not neglect our duties; we must not neglect our work."

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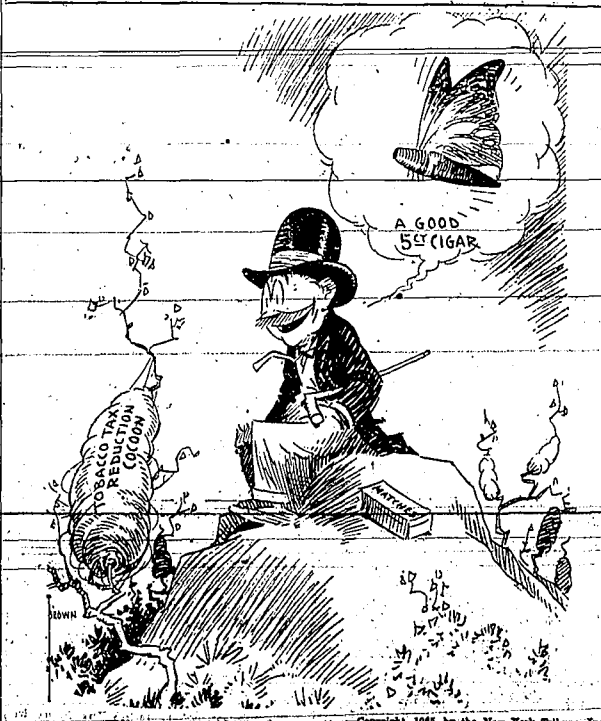
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ITALIANS GET AMERICAN LOAN

Hundred Million Dollars to Insure Restoration of Gold Standard in Italy Arranged.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19. (AP)—Italians of the House of the Kingdom of Italy, creating a gold reserve for emergency stabilization purposes, was announced by J. P. Morgan and Company tonight. Morgan has been a national bank leader since 1914, and will receive the honor for public subscription tomorrow.

An interesting sequel to the recent agreement of the Italian government with the United States, the loan which America's financial assistance for the restoration of Italy to a gold basis. A definite fiscal and financial policy has been outlined by the government, calling for a complete stabilization program as a vital part of the program. It is expected that among the first steps to be taken will be a revaluation of the lira.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19. (AP)—A loan of \$100,000,000 to the Italian government insuring financial support on the restoration of the gold standard by the Italian government, was announced tonight by a group of American bankers headed by J. P. Morgan and Company.

Negotiations for the financing actually were concluded today and formal ratification of the loan was tentatively scheduled for next Friday, and a nationwide banking syndicate. The issue will take the form of bonds being placed within 30 to 60 days and which the investor may earn 7 per cent. With actual terms have not been made public it is expected that the bonds will bear a 7 per cent interest and priced slightly below par.

The opening of America's private credit resources to Italy under the plan has the agreement reached at Washington last week to lend the Italian government to the United States, J. P. Morgan, Italian finance minister and head of the debt funding commission, came to New York this week and conducted the negotiations on behalf of the government.

BRUINS LOSE TO DUMB BELLS

GOODING AND ELLIOTT IN HARD FIGHT

Twin Falls Unable to Stop Charging Back and Score Ends 12 to 6; Rally in Last Quarter Threatens.

Twin Falls went down to defeat before the seventh Gooding aggregation Thursday afternoon in a hard fought contest featured by the beautiful run of Tom's early in the third quarter and the line plunging of Rosenbaum, Lefty Gooding and the Bruin back line crowd a thrill early in the last quarter when they opened up center attack for a short time, and once before the Bruin back, Kelly and Berg, accounted for 14 yards in their plays but the going was tight in mid-field and threw the Bruins for large yards and forced them to kick.
