Highway District Authorizes Improvement Work Involving \$11,325 Expenditure; Duffy Reed Gets Awards.

Contracts for four road improvement projects involving construction of five and a half miles of gravel road and a total expenditure of \$11,325 were awarded to Duffy Reed of Twin Falls by Twin Falls Highway district commissioners at a meeting here Saturday evening. On three of these projects, duplicate tenders had been made by adjacent landholders, and one instance the landholders affected have agreed to do the necessary grading for two miles of road building. The commissioners at this meeting also decided to issue their annual call for bids for construction of two additional miles of gravel road. In addition the commissioners entered into contract with R. C. Calles, Hansen, to grade and gravel by force account one mile of road on gravel road, to point a mile south of Hansen to form a connection between hard surfaced roads. The contract is to be completed by January 1st next for road excavation and gravel. The estimated cost for this work is \$1,000.

Contracts awarded Saturday provided for improvement of the following roads: 1. Gravel on one and a half miles of road extending east from the Kingsley street, north of Twin Falls, near Lakeview boulevard to the greenhouse. Situation Favoring French in Syria is Indicated in Moves

Reinforcements Have Broken Spirit of Revolting Druse Tribes in Region of Beirut, Say Dispatches.

BEIRUT, Syria, Nov. 21. (AP)—Definitive turn of the situation in addition Lebanon in favor of the French is indicated by the most recent developments. French reinforcements appear to have broken the spirit of the revolt. The tribes in this region and have removed the danger of the Druses reaching Sidon. This success was followed today by another reported in a French communiqué, in which two Druse attacks on the town of Rashayeh, thirty miles west of Damascus, were repulsed with heavy Druse losses.

Druse sources, however, report an setback for the French. They say that a recruiting force of sixty men under a French officer was ambushed north of Rashayeh Thursday and that only 15 survivors escaped. They also state that the French suffered high casualties yesterday gave evidence that no more arms are to be loaned to the native Christians and that the arms already given will be withdrawn.

Paper to Publish a List of Americans Given Decorations

List Carefully Prepared in Effort to Determine Extent of Foreign Propaganda.

NEW YORK, Nov. 21. (AP)—The Brooklyn Eagle tomorrow will print a list of 2,253 Americans who have received from the French government the decoration of the Legion of Honor. The Eagle will say the list was carefully prepared "in an effort to ascertain to what extent foreign propaganda in this country has taken in the form of foreign 'decorations to American citizens'."

United States Senator George W. Norris of Nebraska, has written to Secretary of State Kellogg for a copy of the list.

On the list are such names as General John J. Pershing, Francis Ziegfeld, Admiral Benson, Mary Gaskin, David H. Brown, General Taylor, and many other prominent names. The name of Woodrow Wilson does not appear.

NEW CRYSTAL ON SKY CHARTS

Director of Observatory at Chicago Announces New Body in Skies; Near the earth.

LAKA, CHICAGO, Nov. 21. (AP)—Confirmation of the appearance of an entirely new object, different from that observed a few days ago, was announced today by Prof. Edwin H. Frost, director of Yerkes observatory of the University of Chicago.

Professor Frost said the comet was reported on November 14 by Leslie C. Polak and Professor P. E. Ross. It is moving very rapidly toward the south-east at a rate of nearly four degrees a day. The comet is estimated to be 51 miles from the earth.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21. (AP)—Despite a reduction in rates treasury receipts from taxation on incomes for 1924, revenue is \$24,483,680 higher than for previous year.

The total receipts from taxes on incomes for 1924 are \$680,131,185 or a gain of 2.3 per cent over taxes received on the previous year. The increase is due to the fact that the rate of tax on incomes over \$10,000 was reduced from 10 per cent to 8 per cent, and the rate of tax on incomes over \$5,000 was reduced from 5 per cent to 4 per cent.

GREEK THEATER

BUILT IN U. S.

Show Place at Jacksonville, Illinois, Declared to Have Many Favorable Features.

JACKSONVILLE, Ill., Nov. 21 (AP)—A Greek theater has been opened in Jacksonville that is described as more perfect in its character formation and necessities than many of the open air theaters built by the ancient Greeks.

Its walls form a perfect circle, the theater from the first Institute of Chicago designed it, devoted its construction, and also the first performance in it, organized by the Jacksonville orchestra.

Half a year ago there was a huge round water reservoir where the theater now stands. When the water had been drawn from all walks of life in play in the Central Institute, the necessity for a large playhouse presented itself. The old reservoir was transformed. The south side of the bowl was partially knocked out to make place for the entrance and stage. Circular seating levels were made of concrete, sufficient to seat 3,000 people. The stage was raised to three levels, to accommodate instantaneous changes of scene without curtains. This is accomplished by turning the light of the stage and shining a bright light in the faces of the audience. The theater is owned by the city. The Chicago band which plays in it is the Jacksonville Community Band. The audience has paid what ever there is any money in the treasury, but when there is no money they pay nothing. Their has concert netted them eighty cents each for the performance.

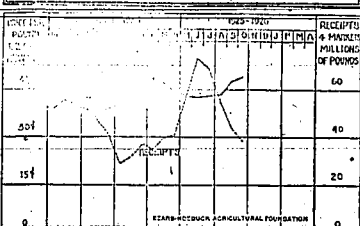

Butter Market Takes Leap; Bigger Gains Are Expected



The butter market, which has followed an upward trend since 1925, is now for about last week level, according to a report just issued by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

While the bulk of the winter advance has already been made, further gains are probable, November is usually the low point in accounts when prices reach their peak. Prospects favor a good winter market, continues the report made by the Bureau, and elsewhere. "They feel it is abundant, and high butter prices as compared with last year will stimulate production. Last year's production was estimated to result in a decrease of 8 per cent in production during November and December under the year previous, whereas in the preceding two months, production had been only 10 per cent larger.

The storage situation is in healthy shape with stocks about equal to the five-year average. Weakness in English markets on the eve of the British Empire exhibition in the southern hemisphere suggests the possibility of a further rise in the near future. The fact that butter prices now stand at about one cent higher than a year ago is indicative of higher production and a moderate expansion program is under way. In the higher and lower markets for the east and west dairy belts."

ARCTIC WRECK CAUSE OF TEST

Latest Effort of Amundsen to
Float Vessel Across Coast Due
to Finding of Casks.

SEATTLE, Nov. 21 (AP)—Arctic navigators returning here from their summer ventures into the North by way of Bering Strait reveal that the wreck of the *Jeannette* originated the inspiration for the latest attempt of Captain Knud Amundsen to float a vessel across, or near, the North Pole. Considered by Dr. George Washington De Long, U. S. N., the *Jeannette* sailed into the Arctic through Bering Strait in 1879, and after sailing Wrangell Island was wrecked in 1881, she crumpled and sank June 13, 1881, after 2 months in the "dark."

Part of her crew perished in struggling over the ice in the mouth of the Lena river, in Siberia, and more died in trying to find a human habitation. One of the survivors was Chief Egli near George W. Melville, who later became an admiral.

Three years after the crumpling wreck of the *Jeannette* were found on the coast of Greenland, giving evidence they had passed across the Arctic ocean.

First Drift.
Amundsen's first drifting vessel was in the open to make the westward passage of the Arctic above North America. He completed the voyage in 1906. Next, in the *Fram*, he went to the other end of the earth discovering the "South Pole" here in 1911.

The explorer again started for the North in 1925, this time in the *Maud*, propelled by engine and sails. While way he made two attempts to reach the Pole by air. In the summer of 1923, a plane, which had carried with him, wrecked its landing gear in trying to rise at Wainwright.

On May 21, 1925, Amundsen and five others jumped off in two planes from the Spitzbergen islands to fly over the Pole. The six returned June 13 to one of the ships, the other having been wrecked 150 miles from the pole.

Amundsen, now 57, is preparing to reach the North Pole in a dirigible.

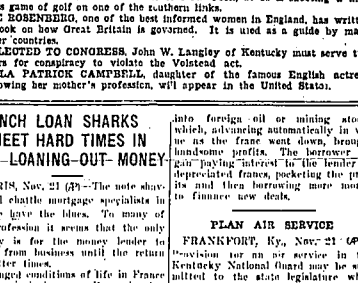

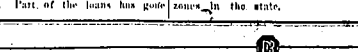

CHINESE WIFE'S LOVE A LEGEND

Great Wall of China Crumpled
Where Husband of Woman
Was Crushed.

CHINWANGTAO, Nov. 21 (AP)—Where the Peking Mukden railway pierces the Great Wall of China at Chihai-kwan is a temple erected to the memory of a pious wife whose husband perished in the building of the structure.

Chih Huangti, the emperor who ruled all China, came to the throne in 216 B. C. It was Chih who built the Great Wall to keep the country together.

A woman from the south, so the legend runs, brought cotton-wadded clothes for her man, who had been impressed by the emperor to help build the wall. She was told that her husband had died, and that she could not have his body because it had been hurled between the brick fortifications of the wall and crumpled there under tons of rubble and earth.

Wall Collapses

The woman persuaded a comrade of her husband to save her the stretch of wall where the body of her husband lay. Three days and three nights thereafter she waited up and down that length, until the compassion of the divine power was excited by her tears, and that part of the wall collapsed.

The scandal came to the ears of the emperor, who recognized, amidst his jealousy, that the conduct of the woman had been most ostentatious. To legalize the matter, he directed that she be admitted to his household. First, however, he granted her prayer that she be permitted to select the bones of her husband for more delicate burial.

The woman gathered up her husband's bones and walked to the end of the wall, abutting on the sea, from which, before the guards could stop her, she cast the bones into the sea and herself after them.

The image of the pious wife, in imperial robes, stands in the temple near the spot where the breach in the wall is now perpetual.

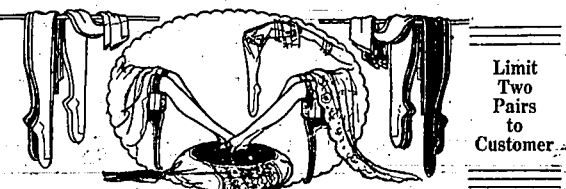
