BOISE, Idaho, Dec. 3.—Like a great black bear, dormant during the winter months, Idaho emerged from the slumber of inactivity and the details of the post war reconstruction era Thursday and basked in the sun of the Boise meeting of the first All-Idaho Commerce Congress...

Idaho rallying—the ice coming back—the keynote of the opening address of John A. Russell, Idaho farmer, was carried on and on through the day's proceedings. Spoken of every fundamental industry of the state, and the speaker urged the state to take a cautious attitude against a bubble boom, all with hope for a sound and steady growth of the state.

Executive officers were chosen. They are, B. E. Shepherd, of Jerome, acting in reclamation work in the state, president and A. A. Harner, secretary of Boise chamber of commerce, secretary.

Resolutions on educational, military, financial, state organization and political resolutions were passed by a committee of three, including committee Perry W. Mitchell, of Newport, R. A. Russell, Parma, and W. Black, of Idaho Falls, were members.

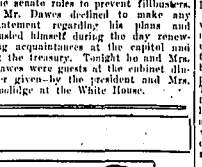

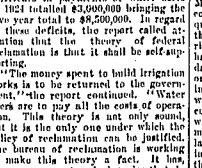

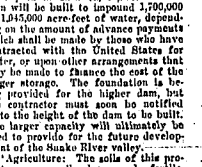

Commissioner Not in Favor of a New King Hill Contract

Dr. Elwood Mead, Reclamation Official, Declares Shallow Soil Area Should Be Eliminated from Irrigation.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3. (AP)—The contract for operating and maintaining the King Hill reclamation project in Idaho, which expires December 31, should not be renewed, Dr. Elwood Mead, Commissioner of Reclamation, declared in his annual report, made public today to Secretary Work.

The project, which will be described as "unsuitable for permanent agriculture" should be eliminated, the commissioner declared. He also stated that the project should be abandoned for the remaining area.

Division of large land holdings and the elimination of shallow soil areas, he added, would bring about an improvement in the financial condition of the project. He said that better cultivation should be practiced and more good livestock kept on the land. He also stated that the project should be abandoned for the remaining area.

Recent water shortage probably jobs of the project were said by the commissioner to require adjustment so that the project will be paid for by the farmer.



# BORAH ASSAILED FOR STAND MADE ON WORLD COURT

## Former Member of Democratic National Committee Flays Group of Irreconcilables Who Oppose U. S. Membership.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Dec. 3. (AP)—House S. Cummings, who resigned recently from the democratic national committee, speaking here tonight at a mass meeting in the interest of the United States adherence to the world court, centered his arguments in an attack on the group of irreconcilable Republicans in the United States senate. He charged them with being largely responsible for the failure of this country to join the court and asserted their pride of opinion is more important to them than the peace of the world.

Led by Senator Borah, this little group stands between the United States and its great destiny. Who would not rather take the unanimous judgment of Roosevelt and Taft and Wilson and Harding and Coolidge and Root and Hughes than all the Borahs that can ever be named and paralyze the activities of a government?

"Senators wonder why the senate is unpopular. It is because the rules of the senate which permits a minority to stop the whole machinery of government with sterile debate, endless discussion, filibuster, pig-sticking and reservations—reservations—reservations."

"If the Ten Commandments ever came before the committee on foreign relations here in Washington," House S. Cummings said, "I think Mr. Borah will have at least ten reservations ready to meet the emergency and I tremble to think what would happen to the lord's prayer if it were submitted to the United States senate for ratification."

tion. Before the government took over this project the canal system consisted, to a large extent, of small ditches and siphons. The deterioration of these small ditches caused excessive water deliveries lower for several years. This shortage of water greatly reduced the crop yields, which, together with the subsequent fall in the prices of agricultural products, burdened the settlers with private debts. The project has a relatively long canal and lateral system for the average served, which makes a high operation and maintenance cost per acre. ## Grand Jury Declares Seattle Mayor Should Suffer Impeachment

Evidence Sufficient to Justify Removal from Office Returned Against Official.

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 3 (AP)—Evidence sufficient to justify the removal of Mayor Brown from office, either by impeachment proceedings or recall, was reported by the King County grand jury today. Sheriff Matt Starbuck was held responsible for the laxity of law enforcement outside the city, and County Auditor E. P. Ferguson was indicted for mismanagement in office.

Mayor Brown appeared before the grand jury several times to disprove his administration. Testimony concerning alleged conditions in the city was given by the Rev. Andrew Bailey, who made a "trip below the line" in disguise. The grand jury made a brief arraignment of the mayor's office. Ferguson violated a statute which prohibits county officials using county employees for private gain, the indictment alleges. The charges against Ferguson resulted from the distribution of a book to prospective brides for which work the auditor is said to have received compensation that he did not turn over to the county.

## BORAH IS DISAPPROVED

NEW YORK, Dec. 3 (AP)—The New York state chamber of commerce today unanimously adopted a resolution disapproving the Borah bill introduced at the last session of congress, designed to create an anti-trust and division of the interstate commerce commission. The Borah measure the resolution asserted fell within the class of "dangerous legislation" and would be opposed by representatives of the trade organization if it appeared on the floor of congress.
