# PROPOSAL FOR STREET WASTE CANS REJECTED

### City Council Votes Unanimously Against Plan for Receptacles Following Protest of Women's Clubs Against Ads.

In view of protests lodged by the Twentieth Century club and the Business and Professional Women's club, Twin Falls city council voted Monday evening to reject a proposal which would a corporation solicit permission to install and maintain a number of metal receptacles for street waste.

The proposal was introduced by a waste paper and other refuse on principle throughout the city. The vote was unanimous although B. Smith, commissioner of streets, in discussion advanced the opinion that the proposal would not have been presented if the need for such receptacles and this particular proposal had been thoroughly understood. He suggested to the corporation's representative a permit interview with the members of the women's organizations.

Declining to comply with the women's viewpoint, as he perceived it, Mayor E. L. Ashburn suggested that the objection had been stated by reason of the proposal—that the receptacles should bear advertising matter.

Commissioner W. T. Leslie suggested that the matter was of no great consequence since the city itself could install receptacles if required at a small expense.

The corporation proposed installation of the receptacles at no cost to the city. Cost of the installation, it was stated, would approximate \$1200, and cost of maintenance about \$1200 a month. The corporation's revenues would be derived from the sale of advertising space on the receptacles.

**Land Sale Considered.**

The city, under the commission form of government, cannot sell a tract of about 12 acres which it owns in the vicinity of the water purification plant without favorable view at an election to which question of proposed sale would be submitted. In view of this fact, which was developed in discussion of the application made by J. A. Hendricks, prospective purchaser, for a pipe to be set on this property, it was decided to submit the question as to whether the property should be sold should be submitted at the next regular election of city commissioners.

Commissioner J. B. Keel stated his opinion that the present market value of this property, about \$4000 an acre, is about \$100 under its actual value.

Twin Falls municipal water purification plant is operating satisfactorily, City Clerk J. L. May was directed to advise Burns and Meltonough, Kansas City, in reply to proposal that that concern send its representative here to propose extension of the plant to provide for an independent source of water supply and installation of a stand well to supplement the reserve supply of clear water. These extensions had been suggested by this concern when it installed the plant here several years ago.

Draining of Blue Lake toward independent recently awarded to J. A. Young, will be completed today, the council was advised by Mr. Young and the street commissioner. Street improvement on Third avenue north and Fifth avenue north will be completed within the next few weeks provided weather conditions continue favorable. Mr. Young stated.

# DUNLAP AGAIN FOUND GUILTY

### Second Trial Results in Verdict of Voluntary Manslaughter—First, Second Degree Murder.

Henry J. Dunlap of Murtaugh, tried for a second time here on charge of murder in connection with the fatal shooting of his business partner, Chester A. Russell, on April 30, 1922, is guilty of voluntary manslaughter, according to a verdict returned by a jury at trial court here Sunday morning.

W. A. Hallock announced that judgment would be pronounced Monday, under Idaho law voluntary manslaughter is punishable by imprisonment in the state prison not to exceed 10 years.

At the former trial Dunlap was found guilty of second degree murder and was sentenced to serve from 10 to 20 years in the state prison. The state supreme court ordered a new trial in consideration of Dunlap's appeal.

The jury Sunday morning, according to members of the jury, reached agreement on its verdict within four hours after receiving the case at 11:35 o'clock Saturday night.

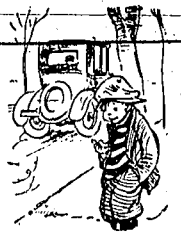
