GETS MESSAGE GETS MESSAGE House Takes Up Consideration of Tax Bill While Senate Roelieves Flood of Measures Dammed by Adjournment.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—(Congressional) President Coolidge's annual recommendations for legislation today did not get down to business. The house took up the \$225,000,000 tax reduction bill, providing for more than three times what the senate received a flood of bills after the opening day yesterday by early adjournment out of respect to senators who have died during the recess.

Bills Introduced. A number of bills designed to carry out part of the annual recommendations of the chief executives were introduced during the day and still others will follow. The president gave approval to the proposal of the tax reduction bill, which the house expects to pass next week.

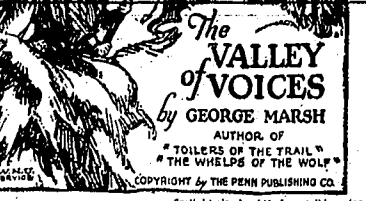

OFFER INTEREST IN MILLNER DAM

Twin Falls and North Side Canal Companies Promise Reservoir District Terms.

Under terms of a proposed agreement that was approved by unanimous vote of the directors of the North Side Canal company and Twin Falls Canal Company at a joint meeting here Tuesday afternoon, the reservoir district No. 2 would be permitted to divert 1600 second feet of storage water of the American Falls reservoir to lands in the vicinity of Shoshone and Gauding through a headgate at 2200 feet on condition that the district pays to the company a pro rata share in the cost of the dam and of maintenance, operation and operation charges.

The district's share in the cost of the dam would be \$125,000, the total cost being about \$1,750,000.

The district's pro rata share in the cost of the dam and annual maintenance expense is computed as sixteen eighths (1/4) of the total, approximately \$100,000. The district also has a pro rata share in the cost of the dam and of maintenance, operation and operation charges which are joint owners of the dam and the district.

The proposed agreement provides also that the district shall share pro rata in necessary replacement costs and that the proposed arrangements shall not interfere with the present management, operation and conduct of the dam and that it shall impose no additional burden on the dam.

The proposed agreement is to be submitted to the directors of the company for their approval, and accepted. Its terms are to be embodied in a contract.

ITALY APPROVES DEBT AGREEMENT

Italian Senate Ratifies Commission's Work in Washington for Funding Obligation.

ROME, Dec. 8. (AP)—The war debt entered into between the United States and Italy was ratified today by the Italian senate. The loan arranged with the Morgan company of \$100,000,000 was also ratified.

In the opinion of Count Volpi, the finance minister, who headed the mission to Washington for the funding of the debt, the two measures represent so far as Italy was concerned, "the real end of the war."

Senator Tittoni said there had been no real clash of opinions in the negotiations, but simply a great commonality of views between the two nations. He said that Italy is a nation with natural resources and of marvelous industrial ability and a nation whose soil was less fertile, but whose people had an abiding faith in themselves and their future.

Senator Wollebong, a former minister of finance, voiced a caution against the unlimited influence of American money; he recommended the strictest control by the government of all proposed loans for public or semi-public enterprises in Italy. He advised that the Morgan loan be invested in profitable industries, instead of merely for a gold reserve.

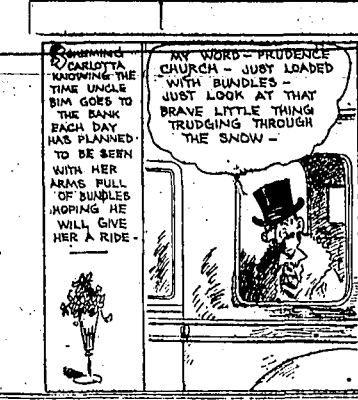
