OPPOSITION TO BILLS SHOWS UP

Tax Reduction Measure Undergoes Five Hour Debate in House; Has Warm Defenders On Both Sides of Floor.

(By the Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Opposition to provision of the tax reduction bill developed again today during another five hours of debate on the measure in the house, but its friends in both parties fought off the resistance.

Members of the ways and means committee, which has had so far as to sign final taxes by \$25,000,000 next year, again acted through the day's discussion with words of approval.

Pointing to the non-partisan manner in which it was handled, four committee members urged its approval, although disagreeing personally, with some of its provisions.

Burlap Rate Attacked. The fifteen per cent recommendation in the measure against the burlap tax rates were the largest of attacks by Representative Freer, Republican, Wisconsin, and Leavitt, Republican, New York, both of whom appealed to the democrats for support to increase these levies.

Mr. LaGuardia declared he would vote against the measure unless it was amended to exempt three times the amount of burlap from the ways and means committee by the republicans but spring as an insurgent, approved his remarks to a review of the bill's provisions, some of which he confirmed.

Commenting on the bipartisan character of Representative Bachrach of New Jersey, a republican member of the committee declared that the measure was vital to the welfare of the government and the people to be considered from a business standpoint.

Representative Oldfield of Arkansas, a democratic committee member, outlined the non-partisan spirit with which the bill was drawn and emphasized that it was the result of a compromise between the two parties for taxpayers having small incomes and cut off more than \$100,000,000 in tax revenue.

INTERURBAN CAR IS HELD RESPONSIBLE FOR DEATH OF WOMAN

WAR DEPARTMENT IS GIVEN BLAME

More Army Air Service Troubles Heard at Mitchell Court Martial During the Day.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—More army air service trouble was heard today before the Mitchell court martial and much blame for them was laid at the door of the war department and upon the administration's economic program.

The court placed a blame on the presentation of cumulative evidence and refused to hear the prosecution's proposed examination of Major General Charles T. Mencher, former army air chief, who had been brought across the continent from San Francisco to tell about organization of the service.

Tables Turned. At the court's direction, Colonel Sherman Marchand, trial judge advocate, cut short his questioning of General Mencher. Instead, he questioned, however, Representative Frank H. Holt, of Illinois, chief of the defense counsel, turned the tables on the prosecution and the general a witness for the defense.

Recalling the testimony given yesterday by Howard L. Hath of Los Angeles, that had weathered during the period with bombing raids during the last year, he commanded a brigade of infantry, nearby, what the weather conditions had been at that time, he general replied that they had been "very wet," and the defense counsel asked if he had acted another squad work and near the ground in which Mr. Hath was serving, for "excellent work," receiving an affirmative answer. One Time Bookkeeper Who Married Heiress Gets Double Revenge

Millionaire Father of Girl Is Found to Accept Help from Poor Son-in-Law.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 10.—(AP)—Howe V. Strout, the one-time bookkeeper, married the daughter of J. H. Elliott, millionaire banker of Knoxville, Tenn., and the fortune of her family was cast aside upon his own resources, made millions and 12 years later came back to the rescue of his father-in-law's bank. The story that is stirring the town of Knoxville is that Elliott, banking his money not in the best interests of his father-in-law Phillips bank, but in the interests of his own son of the most phenomenal "millionaire" in his history. Two months ago he sold his stock in the Phillips bank to the group of banks and banks of New York for \$25,000,000 and retired from business. Returning Knoxville in December last month ago, Mr. Phillips, now worth about \$40,000,000, said Mr. Strout saved the fortune of the Elliott family that but a short time ago had depended on his only son-in-law.

STATES DEMAND RIGHT TO TAX

President Coolidge and Congress Petitioned to Abandon Federal Inheritance Levy.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—President Coolidge and congress were petitioned today to abandon immediately any form of federal inheritance tax and to "find a way to return to the 48 states dominion over their own affairs."

The petition, drawn by unofficial representatives of the legislatures of 36 states, declared that freedom of business and property is being gradually but vitally limited by and through certain legislative policies of congress.

Speakers and authors of the legislative resolutions of Alabama, Arkansas, Illinois, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, North and South Carolina, Rhode Island and Texas attended the conference.

(By the Associated Press.) SALT LAKE, Dec. 10.—Seyboldt, sentenced to die a firing squad on January 15, 1925, for the murder of a policeman in October 1923, spent this evening in the cell making a woman's bed for himself. This man, the criminal justice department said, looked the work of a professional killer.

Seyboldt expressed a hope along the lines of the Associated Press tonight that he might see his father and mother, who live at DeWitt, Utah, before he dies, but he stated that he badly thought that they would come here. He wrote from his father, mother, and two brothers, who the warden of the penitentiary carried to him the news that the state board of pardons had denied his appeal for clemency. He also gave the name a letter from his father.

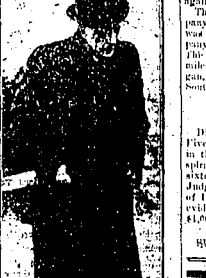

# KNOTTY LEGAL ISSUES TANGLE LIQUOR CASES

United States Commissioner is Presented With Puzzling Questions In Connection With Raid On Nevada Still.

A tangle of knotty legal questions involved in the cases of 11 men and one woman taken in custody about a month ago by federal prohibition agents and deputy sheriffs of this county in connection with raids on two big moonshine whiskey stills in Three Creek and Cottonwood canyons in the hills of northern Nevada, is to be presented for decision by U. S. Commissioner of Nevada, at Las Vegas, today in connection with the arrest of the accused persons under five warrants issued by the United States district court in Nevada and dated Thursday.

The accused persons were brought here by the arresting officers and lodged in the Twin Falls county jail. Two of them, Maxon A. Wilson, Mrs. Maxon A. Wilson, alleged owners of the Cottonwood canyon plant, were released by order of the district court under writ of habeas corpus before complaint had been lodged against them. They were arrested here Thursday by Deputy Marshal Monroe under bench warrants issued by the federal court in Nevada.

District court here declined in habeas corpus proceedings, in order to release of accused persons subsequent to filing of charges of violation of the federal prohibition enforcement act, that they are still held prisoners in the county jail. The three are: A. Hudson, alleged owner of the Three Creek plant, and his alleged associates in the enterprise, John Ward, O. C. Christianson and Milton Hillebrand; and T. J. Shiro, Claude Peterson and E. W. Taylor, alleged associates of the Wilsons in the Cottonwood plant.

Walter Brown, T. G. Jones and E. S. Whitner, arrested in connection with the raid on the Three Creek Canyon plant, on arrangement here before Commissioner of Nevada, "Citizens' Union," which subsequently were approved by the United States commissioner in Reno, Nevada.

Legal questions involved in the hearing here today are:

1. Whether in view of their removal under arrest from Nevada where the offense charged are alleged to have been committed, the accused persons who are detained in the county jail are to be considered fugitives and as such to be held under the bench warrants issued by the court in Nevada.
2. Whether the accused persons are entitled to preliminary hearing in this state or in Nevada, and whether the commissioner here or the commissioner in Nevada has jurisdiction to admit

## APPEALS DISMISSED IN THREE CRIMINAL CASES

## Mercury Fails To Rise Above Freezing Point

Forecast for today - Cloudy probably rain in parts - portion; normal temperature.

Temperature Thursday for the first time this season, did not rise above the frost line, but attained a maximum mark for the day at 31 above, which was 23 degrees under Wednesday's high mark. Low was 24 above, representing an advance of four points as compared with the preceding day's minimum. Light rain and sleet that fell and froze during the night covered sidewalks and pavements with an ice glare that was held responsible for a number of minor automobile accidents and for much inconvenience to pedestrians.

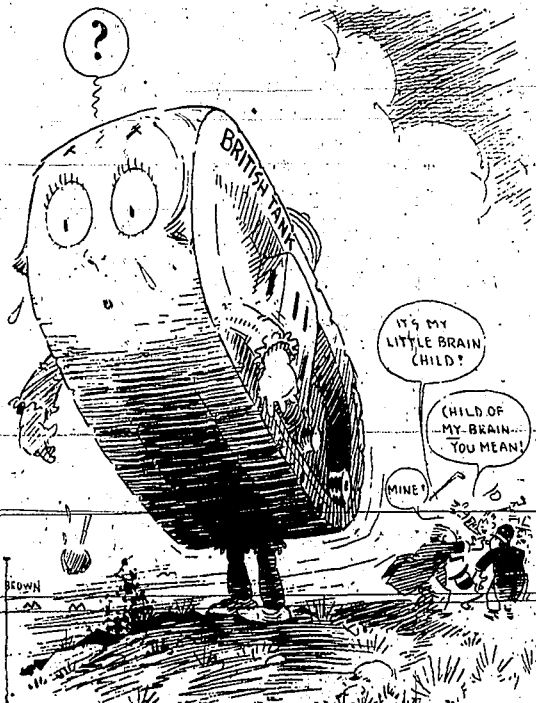

# LARGE RANCH TO BE A TOWNSITE

## California Property with 24 Miles of Beach Frontage to Be Cut Up in Lots.

SANTA MONICA, Dec. 10. (AP)—Passing of the late frontier in the southern California coast district is heralded in the announcement that the Malibu ranch, a huge estate of 18,000 acres, is to be subdivided into home sites.

The ranch has approximately 24 miles of frontage on the Pacific ocean and is the only original Spanish land grant of a century and a quarter ago to remain intact.

Briefs marked the history of the Malibu since 1804, when the king of Spain's first grant to the Pacific coast was made. At present more than a score of cowboys ride the range of mountains and beach, caring for 5,000 head of cattle, ranging the vast tract.

To whom the king of Spain granted the land in 1804 probably will remain a mystery, for the original grant, which has been lost, had authentic records of the land.

It is indicated that the ranch was sold to Don Jose Bartolomeo Ferrer by the Spanish governor of California.

Mr. Ferrer ruled his acreage with an iron hand, frequently driving off his visitors. He died in 1825, leaving the ranch to his widow and two sons, all of whom died in the same year.

Paragraphs in California's history, declared indelible to the posterity of San Francisco, mention the name of the "more or less, or any sum they claim." Directing the payment of \$300,000 to his two daughters, born Monday, November 30.

Four families from Ohio, Ind. followed in 1849 and they built a log church on the present site of St. Anthony's. Services were held in the log church until 1853 when it was destroyed by fire.

# CHINATOWN WILL SOON BE UPSET

## Plans Under Way Threaten Old Time Plaza and District in Los Angeles City.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 10. (AP)—Los Angeles' Chinatown and celebrated plaza, each rich in colorful history of the early days, are facing destruction at the hand of progress moves on Wednesday.

The two are within the 40 blocks where \$50,000,000 will be spent on a city center and modern railroad terminal, the plan for which calls for demolition of virtually all buildings now standing and reconstruction so as to conform in architectural design.

It was on the plaza that the Mexican governor, Felipe de Arce founded "El Pueblo de Nuestra Señora la Reyna de Los Angeles," September 4, 1781. It was the scene of the marriage of Pio Pico, California's famous Mexican governor.

Here it was that the official document was signed making Los Angeles, instead of Monterey, the capital of the state in 1819. A log stock center, situated from the plaza that still had been discovered in northern California. Two days later the dusty throat of Chinatown Plaza was choked with swarth speakers and only 12 persons were left here.

Life about the plaza has not always been happy. Eighteen Chinese were hanged here in 1871 during a race uprising.

Chinatowners adjoining the plaza on East Ferguson's Alley, Apollonia and Marchessault streets, whose young Chinese trade with tourists and old timers sit idly puffing at long stemmed pipes.

Ten years ago it required to complete the reconstruction program, but already demands are being made to save the plaza. It appears certain, however, that the tourists and undegraded chambers, to which the Chinese settlers fled at any suspicion of treatment of the movement of 1911, must outlast to stand slowly the secrets they have hoarded for decades.
