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MOVIES SEEKING SCENARIO MEN

Story Published in Book Form or in Magazines Has Best Chance Say Editors.

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—(AP)—The potential scenario writer should first sell his story for publication, cinematic scenario editors of eight leading motion picture companies.

A story published in book form or in a magazine, has an advantage over the selected script, in their opinion. To the author, it means added revenue and a wider distribution. To the producer, it means more public interest, with a resultant box office drawing power and protection from plagiarists.

The story is the business of scenario writers and distributors of America, in ascertaining the editorial viewpoint, ascertaining that although more than 10,000 persons annually are submitting manuscripts, only three or four ever reach the silver screen. As a result, the producers are compelled to depend principally upon highly talented writers. Therefore, the stage play and the magazine scenario editors are constantly seeking new writing talent. In showing the need of original matter, one editor called attention to the production program of 600 features a year by the studios.

"From what sources can we draw this material," he asked. "If we get ten good stories from the studios each year it is a big average. The studio is true of the books published, of short stories, if there are fifty stories, it is a big average. The studios want seventy pieces of spoken and written literature which could be converted into really great and original motion pictures. With a program calling for 600 features, the remainder are taken from half-up motion pictures and perhaps the language of some makes and the original story.

Screen writing is as difficult as stage writing, the editors agreed, and it requires hard, untiring effort for success.

THREE FOUND MURDERED.

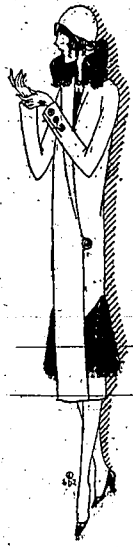
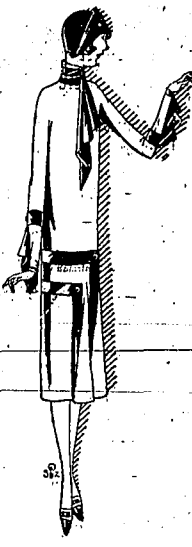

HUGO NOVEL TO BE PUBLISHED

Book Written Ten Years Before "Les Miserables" Appeared Will Be Given Public.

PARIS, Dec. 12 (AP)—The manuscript of a novel written by Victor Hugo ten years before "Les Miserables" appeared, has been discovered and soon will be given to the public.

The report is the idea of Victor Hugo, who for forty years has been active in promoting literature in his great country.

Both the fact that the manuscript is in existence, and the plan to publish it, have been kept secret hitherto, as far as the public is concerned.

Announcement of the discovery and proposed publication of the manuscript was made by American Braille Press for War and Civilization, which, through the matter, is a desire to promote interest in the past of French blind readers in the past of Victor Hugo.

The following statement was made by a representative of the press:

It could be interesting to know that Victor Hugo, the literary creator, Gustave Simon, the scholar and bibliographer, still has and that after years of research he has discovered the manuscript of "Les Miserables," a novel written by Victor Hugo ten years before the appearance of "Les Miserables" or more than three-quarters of a century ago.

Except for the last two chapters, "Les Miserables" was ready for publication when Victor Hugo wrote them, but he did not draw all thoughts of finalizing the novel from his mind. The manuscript was three, and the story was the same.

It had caused changes in Hugo's mind and had led to his story, so that while "Les Miserables" has the basic theme of "Les Miserables," there are essential differences in the two works. The earlier novel, it is said, will be called "Les Misérables."

There is some of what is usually called the love interest, and Colette, one of the famous figures, does not appear. In other respects, "Les Misérables" was almost an entirely new story.

YACHTS FEAR DARRIN ISLE

Sailors Dread Wind Swept San Nicolas Off Coast of Southern California; Cause Wrecks

SAN PEDRO, Dec. 12 (AP)—Desolate and wind-swept San Nicolas, one of a chain of islands lying off the coast of southern California, has become a spot shunned by most yachtsmen.

Out-fine mariners who gather on the docks of this harbor city to swap yarns seldom fail to speak of barren San Nicolas. It is inhabited only by a man named MacArthur and his wife, who care for 2,000 sheep owned by a cattle company which leases the island from the government.

Howling offshore winds and great seas, against which little progress can be made by small craft, often are encountered by those who try to reach the island.

Should the mariner overcome the elements, another obstacle has to be overcome before a landing can be made. Virtually impassable kelp beds surround the island and extend from a quarter of a mile to three miles offshore. They may be negotiated only by extremely small craft.

Twice a year a boat visits San Nicolas to load sheep, and the members of her crew are the only persons seen by the MacArthurs for months at a time. They have been on the island nearly three years. Until ninety-five years ago Indians inhabited the island. Priests of the Santa Barbara mission left it after being abandoned on the island in 1830, for 50 years. When the Mexican government removed the Indians, the MacArthurs took possession of the island, and it was abandoned.

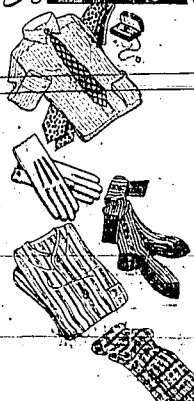

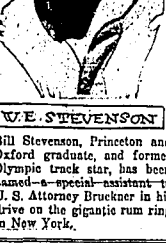

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 12. (AP)—The eleven western states will speak with one voice in congress at the coming session regarding continuance of federal aid for highways. For the first time in history the west is organized in the common cause of good roads. It is definitely committed to urge adequate and continued federal aid through the Western Road association which was formed during the All Western Road Show in San Francisco.

Leading proponents of highway development in all of the western states comprise the membership. At the head of the new organization is Carl E. McNary, field secretary of the Automobile Club of Southern California, who was elected president of the association, president of the California Highway Commission, is vice president, and P. H. Curtis, business manager of the Western Highway Builders, was chosen secretary and treasurer.

The executive committee includes C. W. Doby, chairman of the Oregon State Highway Commission; Preston G. Peterson, chairman of the Utah State Highway Commission; Howard M. Holman, state highway engineer of Montana, and Edward H. Baran, president of the Western Construction Builders' Association.

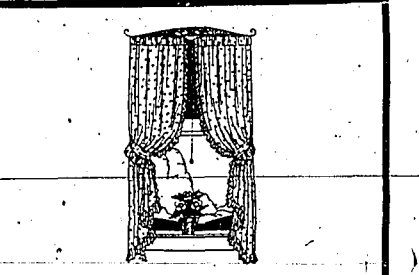

DUNLAP BEGINS TO SERVE TERM

Murtaugh Man, Convicted of Manslaughter, Leaves for Penitentiary.

Harry J. Dunlap of Murtaugh, found guilty at a recent trial in district court here, last week of voluntary manslaughter in connection with the fatal shooting of his brother-in-law, Greater A. STANDARD OIL GROUP DIVIDENDS AMOUNT TO HUGE FIGURE IS CLAIMED

NEW YORK, Dec. 12 (AP)—The New York Herald Tribune tomorrow will say that total dividend payments made by the companies of the Standard Oil group during 1925 established a new high record for that time, amounting to \$23,000,000.

This figure represents an increase of \$3,117,512 over 1924 and compares with payments of \$21,882,488 in 1924, the first year after the Standard Oil split.

Contributions in the first quarter of this year totaled \$12,104,108. This is the largest quarterly payment on record with the exception of the last quarter of 1912 when \$11,000,000 was paid as extra dividends by four eastern pipe line companies and the first quarter of 1914 when the Standard Oil company of New Jersey distributed a special dividend of \$4,233,332 liquidating funds by former subsidiaries.

MENNONITES ON WAY TO CANADA

Farming Conditions in Mexico Not to Liking of Sect Members; Get Little Cooperation.

WINNEPEG, Man., Dec. 12 (AP)—Peak address of departure of Mennonites from Mexico were received here today. In 1922 and 1923 these people disposed of large farm holdings in western Canada, largely in the province of the southern prairie. Many have returned this fall, reporting extreme hardship following very failures. They blame lack of cooperation by the government of Mexico.

Longing for religious freedom was given as the reason for desertion of some of the finest farming country in the province of Manitoba and Saskatchewan. Mennonites sold these lands and departed by thousands. They were opposed to war and insist on having their own school and churches. They lived in thirty communities in Canada. They were known as hard workers but often came into conflict of the dominion and provincial governments over at times at school.

The district, a sect from Russia, acquired in western Canada have religious beliefs similar to those of the Mennonites. They have their own schools, but with Canadian teachers. They live in their own communities and are non-political.

Donkubing, living in large farm communities in western Canada, and religiously orthodox with the no churches over schools, are also from Russia.

FAVOR WORLD COURT

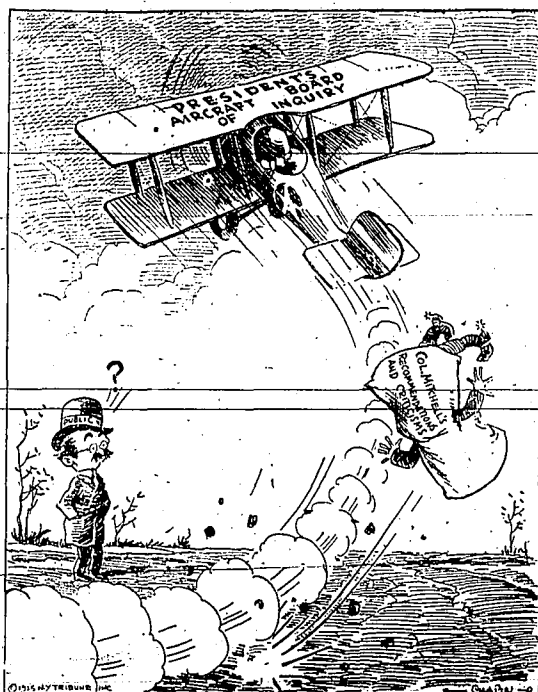

President's Message Gets Favorable Business View

Coolidge's Stand Has Impressed Commercial World, Declares Babson in Survey of Situation.

BABSON PARK, Dec. 12.—Judging by the signs of relief that went up through all business interests when Congress adjourned last March, one may reasonably wonder whether the new session just begun will serve as a check on a trend to business. This question was put to Roger W. Babson, who through his long life has been a publicist in close touch with the business world. His answer is unambiguously that as far as business is concerned, the next Congress will be favorable and all the business interests are satisfied with the president's message.

Business Confidence.
"Not only the administration," says Mr. Babson, "but more and more of the members of the two houses of Congress are beginning to realize that it is encouraging business they do most to help all classes, whether employers or employees, farmers or bankers. The 'black' policy of previous sessions need not be repeated because it was merely a fight over the division of wealth already produced. It did not help in producing more. The plans of the present administration are sound because they result in greater and more economical production and this creates more wealth to divide. The government today is putting its energy into saving the people's money and encouraging every body who is really producing. Moreover, this plan is proving successful, that radical elements in congress will have a hard time to raise interest among their constituents in any serious change from this policy. This," continued Mr. Babson, "explains why business men are looking forward to this session of congress with confidence."

Stock Market Has Discounted Favorable Congress.
"Investors, on the other hand, who are now bullish on the stock market because of expected legislation are making a bad mistake. Stock prices usually discount events long before they occur and even before the public at large knows that they are coming. However, from a business standpoint there is every reason to expect excellent transportation service which is a very important point of view of the current demand for quick deliveries and small order buying."

"For the past three administrations the United States shipping venture has been more or less a blank in the school. While there is no intention of canceling, nevertheless there is a very general opinion that the operations of the shipping board may not stand up well under a public investigation. President Coolidge has asked the shipping board to submit a report on the operations of the shipping board during the coming months. 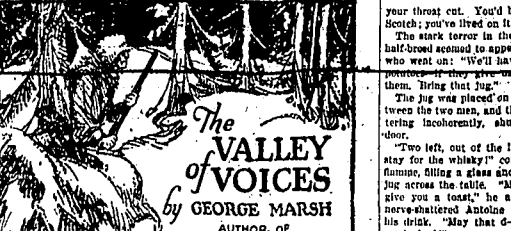

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RARE BIBLES IN KANSAS GALLERY

Baker University Has Works of Art Willied to It by Bishop William A. Quayle.

BALTIMORE, Kansas, Dec. 12. (AP)—Some of the rarest Bibles in existence are contained in a collection to be placed on display here by Baker university.

The collection was willied to the institution by the late Bishop William A. Quayle, of the Methodist Episcopal church, a resident and at one time president of Baker.

More than 225 rare editions, ranging in size from a very minute copy to the Synagogue Roll of Torah, which is made from the skins of 27 animals and is a hundred feet in length, are in the group.

The oldest Bible is a Latin manuscript of 1492, in the Hebrew, Latin, Greek, and Arabic, which is referred to, as a piece of illumination and chronography and added in a very minute script having seen its ascription to British monarchs. This rare volume is a French response after, some hundreds of years, and is in the hundreds of gold, enamel and blue and is made on abbeville parchment.

Another manuscript is of the same century and also is a specimen on unperfumed parchment. The Papyrus has special decorations.

The entire Pentateuch is contained in the Synagogue Roll, which is unrolled without cover. It is the oldest printed Bible in the collection, the Egyptian, came from the press in 1492, and is the first printed Bible. One of the finest sets is a nine-volume Bible, with a curious old commentary, folio size, bound in original vellum and dated 1609. It was once owned by the Caracciolo family and still contains their bookplate.

A Bible bearing the date of 1665 once belonged to Robert Browning, and carries the writer's autograph. In this group also is Southey's Bible and the family Bible of Robert Louis Stevenson.

Looking over the collection the tourist can see the full gamut, for the Bibles are printed in Hebrew, Latin, German, English, Persian, Chinese, Italian, Dutch, Welsh, Spanish, Turkish and a rare Arabic.

LONDON, Dec. 12 (AP)—If the will of the late Queen Mother Alexandra is published, it will be found that she is about to convey, in this understanding in court circles, where it is said that the queen mother's own estate is limited only by her resources. She gave away all her surplus income and for many years she had placed all of her annual allowance of 750,000 pounds in advance to her institutions and charities.

It is generally supposed that King George will be left in all or almost all of his mother's property. Queen Alexandra gave most of her property to other members of the royal family several years ago.

Lady Astor declared recently that British women have lost their political energy since they were enfranchised. Their interest in public affairs has waned, she said, and added that the full force of the vote of English women can be made only through the adoption of a prohibition by one of the parties.

She is attempting to arouse national interest in the liquor problem through a series of lectures in the country districts, and speaks whenever she can get away from her parliamentary duties.

SKETCHES OF BERLIN

BERLIN, Dec. 12 (AP)—The Hohenzollern royal palace beneath the historical royal palace in the heart of Berlin, have been rented as a warehouse by the Prussian government to the wine firm of Lutter and Wegner.

Stripped of its thousands of bottles of rare old wines, champagnes and cognacs by mid-November in November, 1918, the cellars contain few relics of the generations of royal families which drew their liquor supplies from the winding underground passages.
