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DISSOLUTION OF DISTRICT ASKED

Salmon River Directors File Court Action After Canvass of Election Returns.

Official canvass Monday of the recent Salmon River irrigation district election, containing unofficial returns published by The News and stating that the election had voted 170 to 169 in favor of a dissolution of the district court here of an action wherein it is asked that "proceedings for dissolution be examined, approved and confirmed by the court in this petition."

The action was instituted by J. E. Botwell, attorney in behalf of R. A. Carter, H. T. Trout, C. E. Elmer, Ingraham, Bert Kunkel and O. E. Parrott, directors of the district, against the Salmon River Irrigation district.

According to statement of the district secretary and in view of the proceedings, all debts incurred by the district have been paid.

Reason for dissolution of the district are set forth in the petition presented last October to the district's office, a copy of which is contained in the files. According to this petition, the irrigation works in the territory comprehended in the district are deteriorating and the directors are unable to secure loans on their land to fund the maintenance of the same.

Canvass of the vote was made by the district's directors in session on Monday at Hootville. The directors meeting was attended by about 20 persons including both advocates and opponents of the dissolution of the district.

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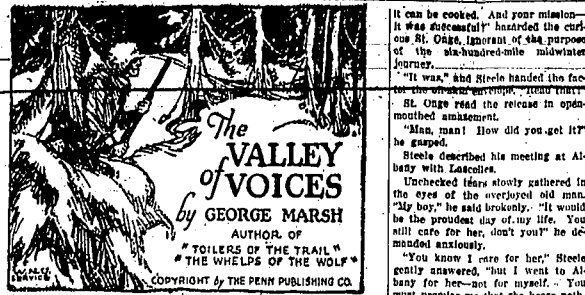

MAYOR FAVORS WORK NOW FOR FOURTH OF JULY

Proposes Immediate Beginning of Plans for Celebration With Features for Entertainment of Everyone.

Christmas time is not too soon to begin planning for Twin Falls' celebration of the Fourth of July, according to Mayor E. L. Ashton, who suggested to members of the council at a regular meeting Monday evening that work should be started forthwith to provide "a fun day for everybody," when the city celebrates the nation's birthday anniversary next year. He proposed a celebration to include a children's program and program of visits for people of all ages, and stated that he would get in touch with the chairman of committees with view to launching of plans for the celebration in the immediate future.

The council, was occupied for only a short time with routine business. The recommendation of E. V. Herz, city engineer, the council approved grading of Blue Lake's boulevard from present main avenue and Kimberly road to junction on Ninth avenue east, under contract awarded to James A. Young and discharge of contractor and his sureties from liability under his bond.

The council voted approval of a lease whereunder John Remmer will continue next year as tenant of 10 acres of arable land owned by the city in the vicinity of the water purification plant. The lease provides for payment of \$225 each rental which is the same amount as was paid this year.

Issuance of permit to W. T. Reed to install a gasoline tank at the curb in front of his place of business on Main avenue north also was approved.

WOMAN LIQUOR SUSPECT FREED

United States Commissioner Dismisses Charges Against Mrs. E. Wixon; Others Held.

Mrs. Ethel Wixon, co-defendant with her husband, Marion A. Wixon, and three other men arrested last month by federal prohibition agents and deputy sheriffs of this county in Cottonwood canyon, Nevada, where a large moonshine plant was seized and destroyed, will not be required to stand trial in federal court on charges of violation of the federal liquor laws. It was decided by United States Commissioner H. E. Powers, at a preliminary hearing here Monday on order to the accused persons to show cause why they should not be removed to Nevada for trial. The commissioner declared the charges against Mrs. Wixon, holding that evidence offered was insufficient to connect her with the alleged offenses, and held Wixon and his co-defendants, C. J. Shire, Claude Pringle and Evan Taylor, under bonds in the sum of \$100 each to appear before Judge F. S. Dietrich in federal district court at Boise on January 18, for hearing in the extradition proceedings. Bond was furnished by Wixon and Shire, Pringle and Taylor were remanded to the custody of the sheriff here.

The story of the raid on the moonshine plant with the discovery of the still and other paraphernalia that had

been partially dismantled but was still warm, was told at the hearing before the commissioner by two of the prohibition agents. They related also the circumstances under which the accused persons were arrested, all of them being in the vicinity of the plant. (Defendant, Wixons, were represented by the attorney.)
