CHANGES MADE IN ESTIMATES OF U. S. CROPS

Revised Figures for Year's Production Issued by Department of Agriculture; Wheat at 77 Per Cent.

(By the Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—Revised estimates of this year's crop production issued today by the department of agriculture showed a number of changes from the preliminary estimates announced last month.

Revisions were reported in the size of the corn, wheat and white potato crops. The total value of the crops was not announced, but the estimated value for December 1, farm crops as given by the department of agriculture place the value of this year's crop at \$1,250,000,000, the wheat crop at \$447,820,340, and the white potato crop at \$405,110,800.

Other estimates of production this year follow: Barley, 218,000,000 bushels; rice, 45,000,000 bushels; buckwheat, 14,447,000 bushels.

Apples Estimated.—Apples, (commercial) 21,000,000 bushels; peaches, 46,250,000 bushels; oranges, (California and Florida) 24,500,000 bushels; cranberries, 17,420,000 bushels; grapes, 242,300 tons; early potatoes, 29,500,000 bushels; winter potatoes, 11,000,000 bushels; tomatoes, 2,188,200 tons; and watermelons, 50,828 cars.

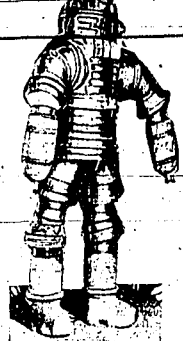

HONOR LEGION MERCY OF GROUP

Men Who Gave Lives in World War Are Honored by California at San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 22.—California's Palace of the Legion of Honor, completed a year ago and dedicated to men of the state who gave their lives in the world war, has become a mecca for art lovers of this region and a new point on the itinerary of all tourists.

Its situation is superb. From one of the highest points in the city it looks down on the Golden Gate. It commands a panorama that stretches far into the bay, reveals the wide expansion of San Francisco bay, the towering Brown hills of Marin county, topped by S. Tamalpais, and, in the other direction, rows of toy houses. The scene might have inspired some of the old masters whose paintings are hung in the palace.

The architectural style is French. The interior of the period of Louis XVI. The Triumphant Arch, surrounded by columns, provides the entrance, and behind it extends the spacious Court of Honor, attended by Ionic columns. White stone and steel were used in the construction.

At its opening the palace housed a collection of French antiques, including the original Louis. Lately the exhibits have featured a notable collection from T. B. Walker of Mississippi. This collection numbers articles by Rembrandt, Turner, Sir Joshua Reynolds, Gainsborough, Corot and other masters.

Other transient exhibits of pictures of bronze come and go, attracting the interest of the local colony. California artists have had a chance to display their work on several occasions.

This is a real feast of the senses. The galleries are connected by paths with fountain, the walls of the courts bearing such objects of miniature copper, silver statues and other examples of medieval art.

In a central room an organ has been installed, and it is a most interesting melody notes penetrate to every part of the buildings. Benches are scattered about, that one may sit before a favorite picture and listen to the music and feel it.

In the Triumphant Arch there are nine pictures and in the museum are displayed at certain times, they are heard far over the city and several miles out at sea.

The palace was presented to the city by the late Adolph H. Spierke and his wife, Alina, and the Spierkes, with the motto, "Honor the dead while serving the living." The museum was built upon the Edison Park on ground provided by the municipality.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 22.—His full name is Paulino Fortunato but they refer to him merely as Paulino because no one alive can correctly pronounce the last part of his name except Gus Wilson, and Gus can do it only because he's been practicing for three solid years.

Paulino is the Spanish party of the first part who laid aside a wood chipper bladegun some three or four years ago and wandered right on into the "ring," cruel world for the purpose of meeting Jack Dempsey.

Paulino didn't do so well. The man who was his earliest manager—Louis Amantia—contracted the notion that before Paulino could get anywhere he'd better become one of those nice, refined fellows, perfectly schooled in the polite characteristics, the polished dig, the one step, the two step, the side-step and all the other fancy stuff.

Paulino, it seems, is a slinger. Trick ring manager found nothing in him except the cramping of his natural fighting, cutting style. But his manager insisted that in all his encounters he would have to conduct himself in a refined, fashionable manner. Three days, used to stop out, all dressed up in nice looking manners and strut his stuff, while he waited for the chance to make a fight.

Paulino sneaked him upon the whistles. The manager would lose his sang froid, his polite attitude and go roaring and tearing into the enemy. But no sooner would he become unconscious than his manager would carry something about "this day, tonight," and force Paulino to act like a nice genteel boxer again.

In due course of time Amantia, who was in some confusion about Paulino and Georges Carpentier, because involved in some way whereby he owed the pugilist some money, was forced to surrender his contract with Paulino to Deschamps, whereupon Francois wondered if he had fallen into a trap which would cause him to fight.

He went Paulino to find to find out what he could do. Paulino wanted to make good for Deschamps. He thought he could accomplish a delight for Deschamps eyes by winning a fight. He nearly died of mortification when he saw Paulino trying to box, so did Gus Wilson, now Jack Dempsey's trainer, who, in those days, was associated with the Deschamps camp.

Why shall I fight? said Deschamps, after Paulino had done a terrible bit of boxing on gentle 12. "Let us speak to him," replied Gus. And so they sought out Paulino and said, "Why do you box—why do you not stop?"

"Well, then, that's what you do here?" said Deschamps. "You will not be a boxer any more because you would die of sorrow watching you. You will slug and win, and I will watch."

"Ah, then?" said Paulino. "You will be delight—more delight than I have. Since that hour Paulino, permitted to fight in his own style—striking, cutting, vicious, with his natural way of attack with both fists serving as his only defense—has knocked out nine men in succession. He has bowled over the heavyweight champions of France, Belgium, England, Ireland and Germany. He has shown he can take a savage beating, he has more than the average amount of speed, splendid courage and a keen brain. If he beats McNee—and I think he will do this quite speedily—there's nothing left for him to conquer except American heavyweights.

Note that Tex Rickard rates him right back of Harry Wills and Gene Tunney. I think Rickard has him placed just about right now. But I do believe that in five or six months, he will be able to improve through the next six months, as he has in the last six, the only thing that will help him from raising ahead of either is the unwillingness of Wills or Tunney to give him a battle."

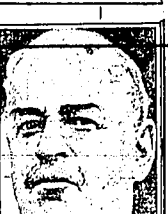

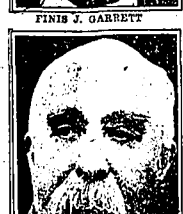

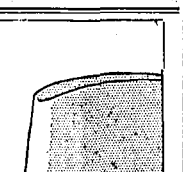

Weather forecast for today—Probably rain or snow normal temperature.

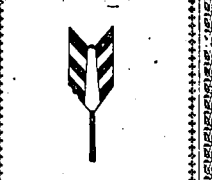
