No Peace Move Yet Made by Moroccans

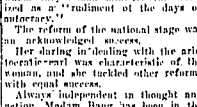

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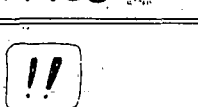

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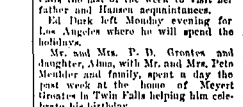

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 (AP)—Modern methods of teaching have revolutionized the ash heap for old-fashioned methods, have sounded the death knell for another ancient and prosperous occupation—bell hanging.

Like the makers of clipper ships and sailing ships, the bell hangers of the past which have come and gone, struck down by the march of progress and change, the bell hanger of today—and his class as a hand—has a manly vocation, not a job.

This city, which has more than thirty years ago, has a constant demand of hundreds of bell-hangers, who find use for less than half a score. Electric chimes are being done, the bells of bell-hanging artists.

Werner, owner of a Day West Shop, outside of which hangs the same sign he placed there years ago when he first opened his business, is one of the few surviving members of the rear guard of bell-hangers. A few ancient chimes hanging in his shop, still echo his vocation. But electrically, he said, has ruined his business.

When Werner, then a young man, first started hanging door bells, the trade was then in its heyday. Father Knickerbocker, first of Huntington bank, then in vogue, demanded a new method of announcement and bell-hanging, by the pulling of a lever or pushing of a button.

For a brief few decades, the jangling bells were everywhere. Bell hangers were proud of their art. For years their ingenious arrangements, elaborate and simple, necessitated to the householders' taste, announced the visitor. Some even played music.

There are more electrically. The public took up the new bells of science, and electric door bells, operated by the means of a button, gradually ousted their clatterer predecessor.

What will be next? I thought Werner said. I don't know. Electrically, can jangle anything. Perhaps, wireless doorbells. Or telephony?

BUILDER FINDS WINTER BETTER

Construction in Cold Season Registers Boom, Contractors Have Reported Lately.

CHICAGO, Dec. 23 (AP)—Jack Frost has been whipped by the building contractor and the increasing volume of contracts being let for winter construction indicate that its advantages are becoming better appreciated.

A survey by J. W. Lynch, vice president of a large contracting firm, disclosed that one of the principal advantages of winter construction was that the more constant employment attracted better workmen, and tended to avoid the peak demand of high wages an scarcity of labor experienced every summer.

"There is little, if any, difference in the amount of time lost between winter seasons and milder seasons work," Lynch said. "Delay due to severe cold and heavy snow does not amount to more than a week's time on a building job; equal days due to rain in the milder season seem to have been overlooked."

"It will be conceded generally that the quality of the work in winter will be unqualifiedly better, but it is urged that the cost will be prohibitive. The cost of heating materials for constructing in a millinery factory is less than one percent and the cost of heat for interior work rarely exceeds one-half of one percent of the building's cost."

"One of the reasons for high wages in the building industry is the tremendous turnover and the contention of various trades that workmen have only seasonal employment, due to the nature of the industry. Furthermore, scarcity of employment in the winter months is a deterrent to potential workers in the winter months, when they are not being employed during all periods of their lives."
