

PRESIDENT IS NOTIFIED OF COURT ACTION

Another Step Along Road Leading to American Membership in World Tribunal Is Taken; Nations to be Informed.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (AP)—Another step along the road leading to American membership in the world court was taken today with the official notification of President Coolidge of the adoption of the resolution to address the treaty with reservations by the senate.

This event was without formality; Edwin L. Duroy, secretary of the American League for Peace and Democracy, a copy of the resolution due to the president and dispatched it to the state department and the senate.

Under the law, Vice President Davis did not have to sign the copy. From the White House the resolution was sent to the state department, which now takes up the task of advising the 48 nations, members of the league, of the president's intention to sign with reservations and of inquiring whether these nations approve of membership on the conditions laid down by the American government.

The refusal of a single state to accept these conditions would operate to prevent the signature of the United States to the protocol and statute now deposited in the headquarters of the league of nations at Geneva.

Opponents of the court were hopeful that the reservation under which the court could entertain no request for an "advisory opinion" on any question in which the United States claimed an interest, without previously obtaining the consent of this country, might operate to prevent an

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 28 (AP)—The Hogenson to Wells extension of the Oregon Short Line comprising a total new trackage of 94.84 miles, is completed, and train service will be established effective February 17. It is announced in an official communication of the Union Pacific railroad released today. The line with station buildings and other incidental facilities has been built at an approximate cost of \$3,600,000 and is designed to provide a direct route between southern Idaho territory and San Francisco and central California.

BUTTER MAKERS MAKE ADVANCE

**Jerome Cooperative Creamery
Grows in Few Years to Com-
manding Position.**

Jerome Cooperative Creamery, established 10 years ago by a group of Jerome dairymen with view to development of possibilities for successful dairying in this region by moving the industry a profitable one, had a three-quarter million dollar business during the past year, according to statement made public here Wednesday.

Growth of the institution is well illustrated by figures showing its annual production of butter during the past five years, as follows:

1921-177,271 lbs. 1922-227,605 lbs.

1923-483,206 lbs. 1924-529,024 lbs., and 1925-1,502,426 lbs.

The Jerome Cooperative Creamery is now handling the product from 1457 patrons. A large number of these patrons belong to dairy marketing associations who in turn market their cream through the creamery. The three associations marketing all of their product at the present time are the Twin Falls County Dairymen's association, Wolf Dell Cream association and the Eden Valley association. Each association is governed by its own board of directors and those in turn are represented on the general creamery board.

Cream gathered by trucks each day is centralized at convenient points where it is loaded in large trucks and transported within a few hours to the creamery plant where it is immediately prepared for shipment.

The associations marketing their cream through the creamery have been able to take advantage of the increase in volume and decrease in manufacturing costs, which has increased volume. This saving on last year's business alone amounted to \$100,000.

Assessing, however, to relieve the same price, the cream cream producers market to Jerome.

Supply California Market.

Not only is the producers' cream factory and manufacturing cooperative but it is also marketed through a cooperative selling organization. All butter that is not used locally is shipped at the rate of one cent per week to the Challenge Cream and Butter association of Los Angeles, San Diego and San Francisco. This cooperative organization handles more than one million pounds of butter in the city of Los Angeles.

The net amount paid producers for cream during the past year by months are as follows: January, \$10,571.70; February, \$10,527.59; March, \$12,402.89; April, \$15,075.51; May, \$19,700.32; June, \$28,402.89; July, \$30,791.09; August, \$34,000.31; September, \$35,027.12; October, \$35,700.32; November, \$38,027.12; December, \$38,027.12.

Net price for the top grade butter after all handling and other expenses were deducted were:

January, 42¢; February, 42¢; March, 46¢; April, 42¢; May, 42¢; June, 46¢; July, 48¢; August, 50¢; September, 52¢; October, 52¢; November, 52¢; and December, 52¢.

Dairymen it is claimed, saved thousands of dollars each month due to this cooperative system of marketing their cream. For instance, prior to the active operation of the Jerome Cooperative creamery and its supporting associations, prices which the dairymen received in this section of Idaho ranged from 2 to 10 cents per pound lower than prices paid at markets a few hundred miles distant.

It is now made known that the cream in this territory are among the highest in the United States.

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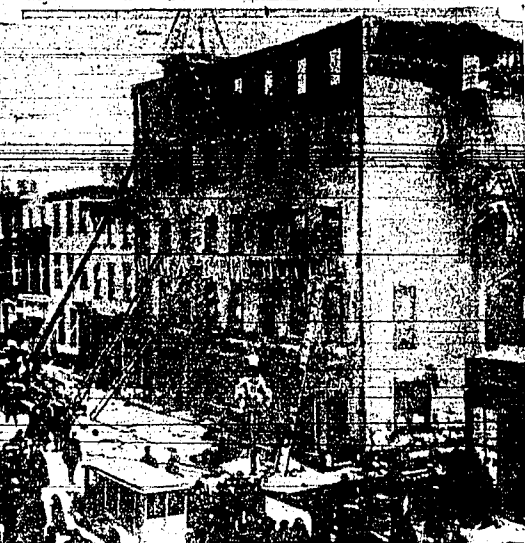
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TWELVE PERISH IN FIRE

KANSAN ASSAILS RATE PROPOSAL

Representative Flays Demand of Western Railroads for Increase Asked.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28. (AP)—Western railroads seeking a five per cent increase in freight rates were assailed in the house today by Representative Hootch, republican, Kansas. He charged that "prosperous roads" were trying to avoid a sharing of excess earnings by over-inflations of their property, by over-maintenance and bookkeeping and by "padding" their rates. He spoke of men for farm and livestock interests of the west complaining testily before the committee at Kansas City this week-end of the "strongest" presentation of the condition from a financial standpoint in America.

Mr. Hootch asserted that the transportation act provides for the grouping of roads for marketing purposes, the weak and the strong, the poor and the prosperous together, rates to be fixed with a view of fair return. "To date only \$4,000,000 has been paid in the consolidation fund, and practically every dollar of that has had a string tied to it, so that not a single dollar has been paid to any working," he said.
