BUTTER MAKERS MAKE ADVANCE

Jerome Cooperative Creamery Grows in Few Years to Commanding Position.

Jerome Cooperative creamery, established 10 years ago by a group of Jerome dairymen with view to development of possibilities for successful dairying in this region by moving the industry a profitable one, had a tremendous year in business during the past year, according to statement made public here Wednesday.

Growth of the institution is well illustrated by figures showing its annual production of butter during the past five years, as follows: 1921-147,271 lbs. 1922-227,005 lbs. 1923-408,207 lbs. 1924-529,604 lbs. and 1925-1,502,436 lbs.

The Jerome Cooperative Creamery is now handling the product from 1457 patrons, a large number of these patrons belong to dairy marketing associations who in turn market their cream through the creamery. The three associations marketing all of their product at the present time, are the Twin Falls County Dairymen's association, Wolf Dell Cream association and the Idaho Dairy Association. The creamery is governed by its own board of directors and those in turn are represented on the general executive board. Cream gathered by trucks each day is centralized at convenient intervals in the creamery, where trucks and transported within a few hours to the creamery plant where it is immediately prepared for shipment.

The associations marketing their cream through the Jerome creamery have been able to increase their volume and decrease its manufacturing cost. The cost of manufacturing costs have been reduced practically 4 cents per pound butter which was due largely to the increased volume. This saving on last year's business alone amounted to \$200,000. Associated with this increase in volume, their cream is supplied to patrons adjacent to Jerome.

Camp California-Market. Not only is the producers' cream being marketed more profitably but it is also marketed through a cooperative selling organization. This cooperative organization, known as the California-Market, is located in Los Angeles, San Diego and San Francisco. This cooperative organization handles more than one-half of the butter sold in the city of Los Angeles.

The net amount paid producers for cream during the past year by months are as follows: January, \$10,571.70; February, \$10,527.59; March, \$12,401.89; April, \$15,076.51; May, \$19,780.51; June, \$38,102.37; July, \$40,791.09; August, \$34,009.31; September, \$29,827.12; October, \$28,725.22; November, \$28,028.17; December, \$27,593.07. Total for year, \$496,723.36. Not prices paid for the top grade butter after all handling and other expenses were deducted were: January, 42¢; February, 44¢; March, 46¢; April, 42¢; May, 42¢; June, 46¢; July, 48¢; August, 50¢; September, 52¢; October, 52¢; November, 52¢; and December, 51¢.
