PACIFIC COAST SHIPPING HIT BY BIG STORM

More Than 1000 Miles of Shore Line Buffeted by Hurricane; at Least One Ship Disabled and Helpless.

(By the Associated Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 7.—A mighty storm with the Pacific coast along more than a thousand miles of its length tonight and last night was held withering and helpless in the tearing and the five-masted schooner Ecola, bound out of Portland for Japan with a cargo of lumber and with a crew of twelve, and the schooner Los Alamos and boys were steering by making desperate attempts to take off the schooner's crew.

Captain Henderson, master of the Ecola, which is without radio apparatus, is waiting the stormers today that he wants to know his crew. At that time he heard that the schooner had been disabled and the crew had been blown overboard.

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### Boat Given of Crew a Rescue at Sea During Storm

Men of Schooner Taken Off Boat Before Boat Went Down 25 Miles North of Miami Says Radio From Captain.

PORT ARTHUR, Tex., Feb. 2. (AP)—This is the story of a rescue at sea of the men of the schooner *Stimmons* by the crew of the *Para*, the company's tug, which was on duty in the Gulf of Mexico today in a rain squall to the Associated Press from Captain Mackwell of the tug.

The rescue came after a long battle with the waves off the Atlantic coast, just as the *Stimmons* started to sink. The entire crew of the tug volunteered to go to the rescue. The wireless message from the tug was as follows:

Distress Signal.

"On January 29, at 2 p. m., 25 miles south of Miami, the tug *Para* picked up the *Stimmons*, a 100-ton schooner, which was in danger of sinking. After three attempts, *Para* was unable to get the *Stimmons* to safety. The *Stimmons* believed he could still float 100 miles out, but as the sea was so rough, it was decided to take the men off the schooner. The schooner was sinking rapidly and the men were being washed overboard. The *Para* was stopped and the crew was taken on board. The entire crew volunteered to go to the rescue.

### Snowfall Lighter In Drainage Area

Snow measurements on the upper Snake river drainage area on January 29, as compared with similar measurements on the corresponding date last year, show a mean depth of 19 inches less snow and 4 inches less water content, according to a report of Joseph Markham, resident superintendent at Jackson Lake, to the Bureau of Reclamation of the department of the interior, which has been received by the Twin Falls Canal company.

Comparison of the same measurements this year with those of previous years, according to reclamation office officials, indicates probability of considerably lighter runoff in Snake river this year than last, although the difference is not regarded as serious.





PRICE HIGHER Traders Give Head to Talk of Domestic Shortage of Grain and Breadstuffs Go Upward.

CHICAGO, Feb. 2 (AP)—With many traders giving head to talk of domestic shortage of grain, prices today in the west of Europe in getting up, and the market reacted higher today and yesterday. Meanwhile wheat business today appeared to be confined to small quantities of wheat, and the buying power in Chicago tended to evaporate on the price bulge. Active support, however, was given to the market today, and a tendency to steady.

Twin Falls County Cooperative Dairymen's association, at an annual meeting here Tuesday adopted resolutions petitioning the state of Idaho to refrain from offering for sale oleomargarine and other butter substitutes and requesting Idaho's representatives in congress to oppose the bill of the National Oleomargarine association to abolish all tax on oleomargarine.

Another resolution adopted by the meeting directed that the county should take immediate action by the people of this community to acquire and preserve favorable sites for development of power and that legislators be requested to procure such legislation as may be necessary for the acquisition and development of such power sites.

This resolution, which was submitted by T. R. Nichols, president of the association, by the resolutions committee declared that no one in Idaho generally is in favor of the oleomargarine tax and that power sites are required for future development before the power tax can be levied on the people to own and operate their own plants.

The third resolution adopted by the meeting declared that the association will join with growers and other farm organizations in the state in opposing the county fair grounds at Filer about the middle of July.

Members of the association at this meeting, which was attended by about 100 persons, heard reports of officers and members of the association including J. D. Smith, manager of the Jerome creamery, secretary of the district, and other speakers who made an address on the selection of the retiring board of directors.

Other candidates nominated for the district were: H. C. Koenig, chairman; H. E. Sandgren, president; H. J. Angles, secretary; C. H. Hemphill, Twin Falls; E. R. Wood, Kimberly; David Koenig, Hansen.

Report of the Jerome Cooperative Creamery manager showed that members of the association had marketed through the association during the past year a total of 1,000 pounds of premium grade cream and 181,725 pounds of No. 1 grade cream, for which they had received \$200,000.25.

The Jerome creamery, during the year made 1,000,000 pounds of butter, much of which was sold in Idaho, the remainder finding a ready market in Los Angeles, San Francisco and other California centers where the reputation of the Jerome creamery's butter has been established.

Harry Nelson, field man for the association, emphasized especially the fact that has been put forth to the dairy farmers to produce premium grade cream.

J. W. Purter, Twin Falls, attorney for the association, was called upon.
