SUPER STATION TO STAY ON AIR

Hoover and Assistants Investigate Charges Against R. A. C. And Decide for Company.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3 (AP)—As a result of a conference today between Secretary Hoover and his assistants in charge of radio regulation and representatives of the Radio Corporation of America, that company's station WJZ at Trenton, N. J., will be allowed for the present to continue use of super-power in broadcasting.

At the conference today in corporation officials declared their willingness to furnish expert service to each other in an endeavor to stop the trouble.

In 400 cases, they said, it has been found possible to make slight changes or adjustments in receiving sets which eliminated all of the owners' complaints.

In view of the importance of the experiment in use of super-power in broadcasting, and the radio company's willingness to rectify the difficulty unaided, the department decided to permit continuation of the high power work.



GOTHENBURG, Sweden, Feb. 3 (AP)—The Swedish American line, to meet increasing demands of passenger and freight traffic between Sweden and the United States has decided to add to its fleet a new motor liner, to be sister ship to the Oryzander, recently placed on the New York-Göteborg service.

PROMPT ACTION ON TAXES


Now that the Senate has come rather tardily to consideration of the income tax measure, nearly everybody wants to see action.

HARMON FIELD GIVEN TO CITY AS PLAYGROUND

Delivery of Deed to Four-Acre Tract Marks Attainment of Effort to Obtain Gift From Foundation.

Deed to the four-acre tract of ground opposite the corner of Fifth and Main streets, which will be known hereafter as Harmon field was received yesterday by the city from the Harmon Foundation as a free gift to this city in perpetuity.

The giving of this piece of land as a recreation ground comes about as a result of efforts under way for nearly two years past, headed by Justice E. Morse and supported by a group of interested citizens organized under the name of the Harmon foundation.

The terms of the gift provided for the use of a small sum of money during the next year for the improvement of the grounds and lesser sums each year for four years. Some \$200,000 was raised and with this condition complied with the deed was placed in the hands of the local sponsors.

Open to All

Title to the land rests in the Park corporation, and if this corporation ever becomes inactive as a corporation the title passes to the City of Twin Falls or to Independent School District Number ten. The city is now endeavoring to obtain the gift that it shall be used for recreation and playground purposes in perpetuity.
