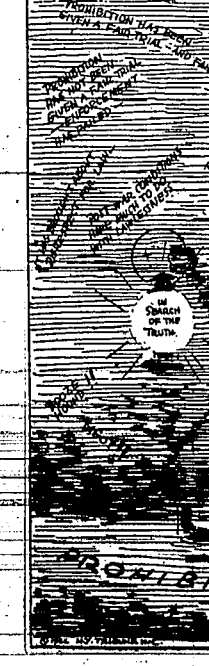

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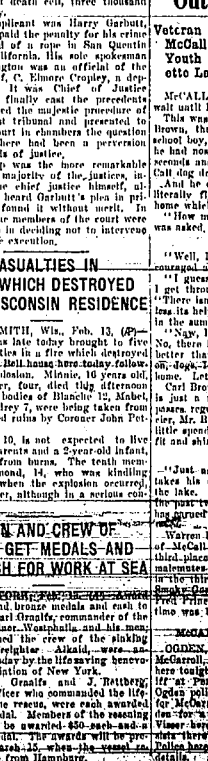

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USE PRICE MOVES FEATURE STOCK SESSION

Professional Traders Attempt to Discount Current News Developments Leads to Sourery for Cover During Day.

NEW YORK, Feb. 13 (AP)—Highly continued price movements developed in the securities markets here today as professional traders attempted to discount current news developments. The return of power to the nation was heralded by a bullish demonstration in the shares of oil and coal mining and distributing companies and railroads serving the midwestern region. Early gains in these shares which ran from one to fifteen points, coincided with sharp reactions in the other part of the list, which were stimulated by the senate passage of the tax reduction bill, announcement of higher gasoline prices in the eastern territory and the raising of the general motors dividend.

The domestic decline of 37 1/2 points in the common stock of these and other manufacturers followed by the institution of price tags under the Clayton Act against the National Food Products corporation, started a flood of selling orders in the last hour which naturally resulted as a sell-out of many of the earlier gains.

Deal in Shorts The stock in Deane and Reynolds was attributed to short selling in spite of the speculative belief that the stock will recover. Its market dividend of \$2.40 by only a small margin last year, was selling "on the fly" with the real value of \$1.80. In an official statement, said: "For several months, the officials of this company have been worried by the rapid rise of the common stock. They have realized that neither the earnings of the company nor the dividends at present paid justified the high price prevailing in the market for its stock. Some of the officials or directors have had no connection with this special movement of the stock and we are sure that the public should know that the company is in a splendid financial condition and is doing a profitable and increasing business along conservative lines."

LEAGUE PROBE IS NOW URGED

Congressional Investigation of Anti-Saloon Organization Proposed in Resolution.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—Investigation of the Anti-Saloon league by a special congressional committee was proposed today in a resolution introduced by Representative Britten, republican, Illinois, who charged the organization with exercising "undue influence" over the internal revenue bureau and with other improper practices.

Proposed by nine declarations, the resolution said the inquiry was requested because the league has attempted to influence federal judicial appointments, has publicly denounced judicial officers and divisions, has attempted to influence the president in appointment of his cabinet, and has "actually exercised its inordinate influence successfully upon the bureau of internal revenue to the extent that appointments under the prohibition amendments have been made only with the sanction and approval of the league."

It also charged that officials of the league or its subsidiaries had been sent to parliamentaries for collecting money under false pretenses and that it had been shown that a justice of a state supreme court and an attorney general of another state had "long been on the payroll of the Anti-Saloon league."

STATE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE TO AID IN INQUIRY

BOLSH, Ill., Feb. 13 (AP)—Cooperation of the state department of public welfare has been asked in the investigation of conditions at the Ada county poor farm, Herbert J. Lemp, of the board of Ada county supervisors, announced today. This claim is based upon the fact that the board of supervisors, which the complaint alleges are given favored treatment.

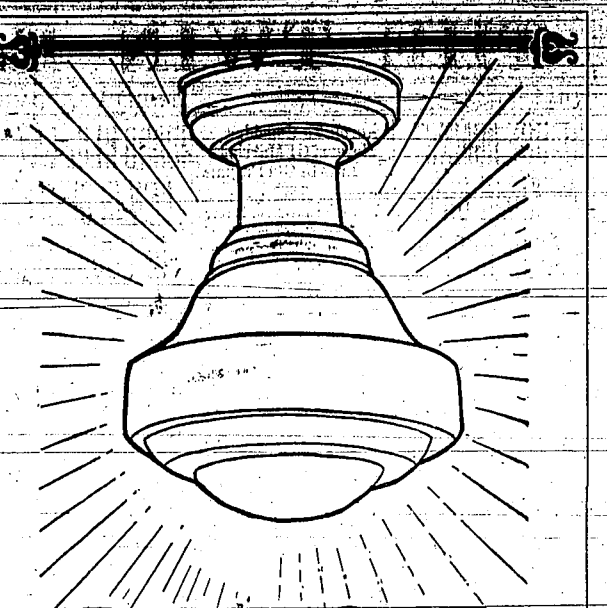

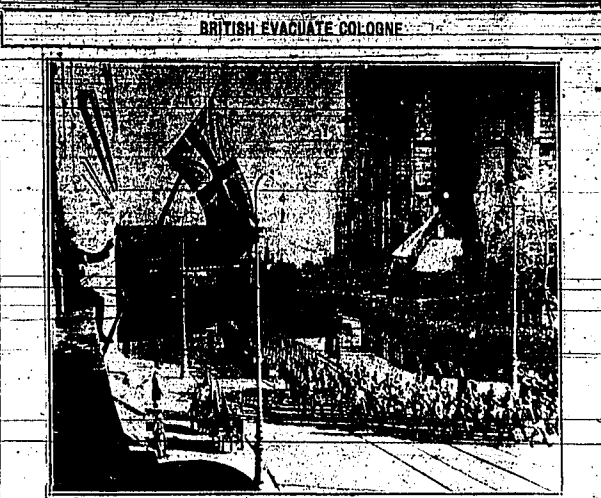
Little hope was given in the past week of basketball in the south central district. Piler did not play a conference game and her undefeated standing was unchallenged.

## CLOSE CATHOLIC SCHOOLS IN CITY

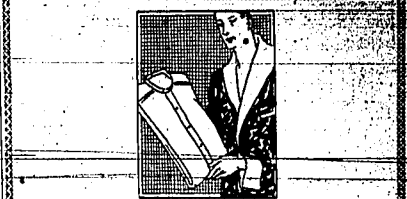
Mexican Department of Interior Authorities Begin Closing Convents at Capital.

Roger W. Babson Calls Attention to an Important Factor Lost Sight of During the Last Few Years.

RABSON PARK, Pa., Feb. 13.—Roger W. Babson, in his exclusive interview today called attention to an important factor in the business situation which has been lost sight of during the past few years. In addition to discussing the economic effects of prohibition, he also has a very interesting review of the situation and the real difficulty with the present situation which is not accomplishing the desired results, Mr. Babson's statement is as follows:

### Purchasing Power

"Both friends and enemies of prohibition must agree that the increased purchasing power of the masses which has been a general result of prohibition, increased wages are not responsible for this increased purchasing power. Higher wages mean higher prices, and do not materially affect the volume of goods purchased. As liquor was everywhere it was impossible to keep our children away from it. Hence, in church, school and home we were constantly warned of its evils and taught to feel it abhorred. Moreover, I believe that business men must not be content with law enforcement and aiding the Anti-Saloon league, but must again set back to discussing the morals of intemperance and revive the work of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, the Sons of Temperance and various other organizations which carried on the fight in the old way. I refer to the necessity of emphasizing these four reasons for not touching the danger zone.

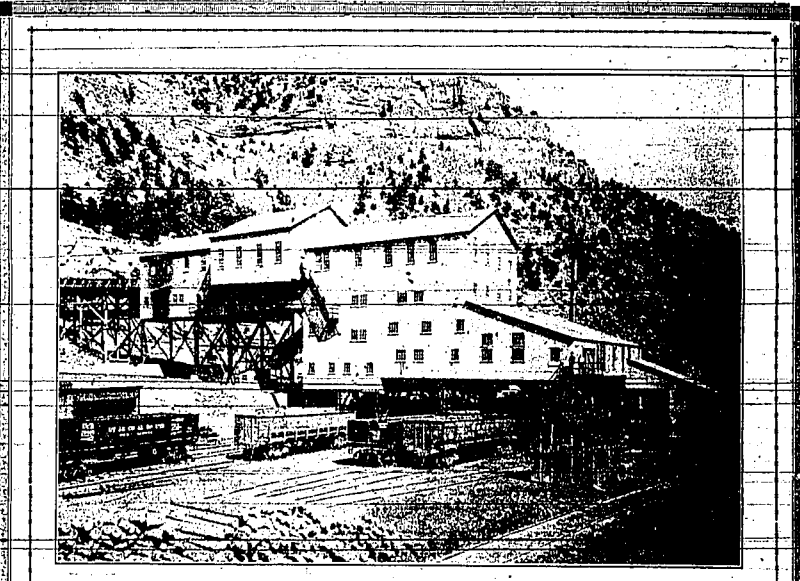

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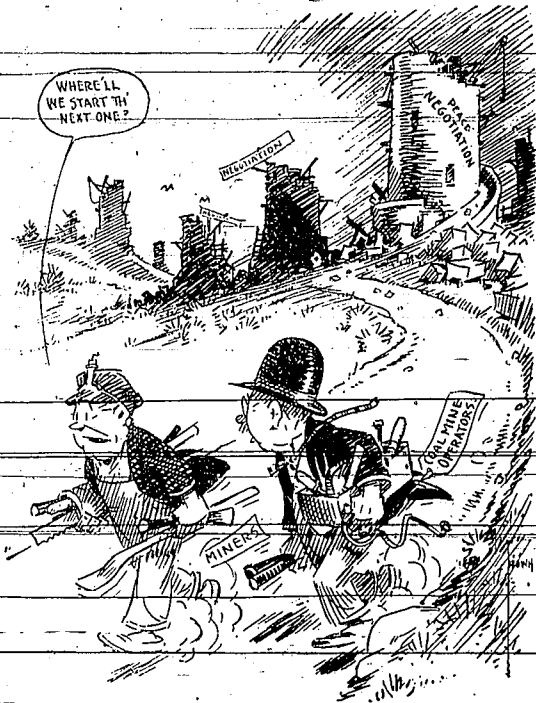
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
