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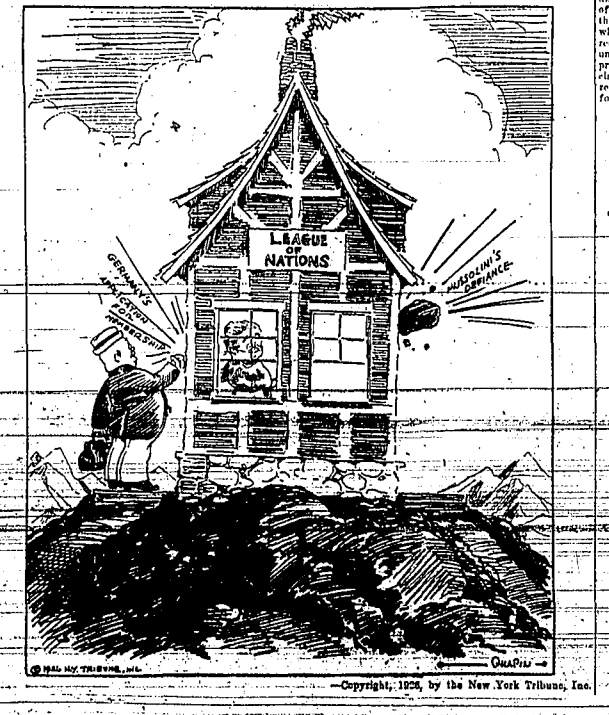

REPORTATION OF DRAFT EVADER IS NOT CONSIDERED

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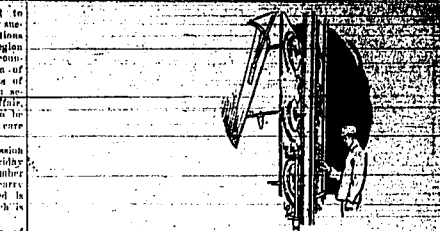

ANSWERS TO INTERROGATORIES FAVOR HANSEN SERVICE MAN AS AGAINST MACHINERY COMPANY

Answers to interrogatories favor Hansen, service man, as against Machinery Company.

Conclusions reached by the jury in trial in district court here in the case of A. H. Averill Machine company versus Hansen, were made public today. Hansen was first in answers to interrogatories, pronounced by the court for guidance in rendering judgment in the case, the jury's response to all of the questions, according to Hansen's attorney, defendant's attorney, being entirely in favor of the defendant, Tolby.

The action was instituted by the company for recovery of approximately \$4200 on account of unpaid promissory notes secured by mortgage on farm lands given in by Tolby and his mother, Mrs. Anna Tolby, in payment for a threshing outfit.

The jury found that while Charles Tolby was acting in the military service during the world war, his mother in May, 1919, was given to understand by a representative of the company that it also consented to sale of the outfit and entered into contract for sale to J. D. Samels of 10 acres of land covered by the mortgage, the unpaid notes would be returned. The jury further found that Mrs. Tolby received four notes each in the sum of \$1500 given to her by Samels and did not understand that she was thereby incurring liability as guarantor of the notes, that the company through its representative, deceived and defrauded Mrs. Tolby in regard to the value of the property was bought the threshing outfit from the company; that in May, 1919, while Mrs. Tolby was in the military service and away from home, such appropriation being without her consent and without authority at law, that the value of the property was \$1500 and that defendant Tolby had not paid the sale to Samels.

This action was the last to be tried by the jury during the present term of court.
