

NEW AGREEMENT SIGNED BY MEN

Final Scene in Coal Strike Entacted in Offices of Anthracite Operator at Scranton.

SCRANTON, Pa., Feb. 18.—The senior agreement that sends back to work tomorrow 158,000 mine workers, due at 12 o'clock Saturday, was signed this morning by all the coal companies in large quantities by tomorrow night. The final scene in the great coal strike was enacted in the offices of the Anthracite operator, G. A. Engle, president of the Gap Anthracite Co.

The operators have made no statement giving their interpretation of the new contract. The six members of the operators' negotiating committee believe it to be a good contract for the entire region which would approach 25 percent or 65,000 tons of the daily average. All the fuel, however, will not be sent to market as many of the companies will be forced to support their own needs in order to supply their customers.

What is sent to market tomorrow will be distributed on a pro-rata basis by the operators.

Large companies reiterated today there would be no increase in the "normal winter price" of anthracite regardless of the present demand. Previous offers of the larger companies had said they would not speak for small individual operators.




TWIN FALLS TO MAKE VISIT TO COAST CENTERS

Plans For 10-Days Excursion
Trip on Special Train Approved by Chamber of Commerce Directors.



Citizen of Twin Falls and the Twin Falls country to have here March 25 or 26, for 10 days trip, will visit San Francisco and Los Angeles, and return by "Special Train." Applications to plan the excursion, which were to have been approved by the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce directors, was announced Thursday evening by Asher B. Wilson, president of the chamber.

Not only have the directors approved the project, Mr. Wilson stated, but they will urge it at a dinner meeting of the chamber of commerce of the chamber to be held at the Hotel on Tuesday or Wednesday evening next week, following which it is expected that committees will be named to work out detailed plans.

The excursion will run over the Oregon Short Line extension from Twin Falls to Wells that was placed in operation last Monday, one of the prime purposes of the excursion being to widen up functioning of this road to and from Twin Falls. It was started Wednesday evening by a veteran member of the band.

The twin falls band will run over the 100 miles of the distance between south Idaho and San Francisco, be nearly 300 miles.

Fare of \$45.47 will be made available for the excursion, according to terms arranged with the railroad, and the amount of money to be paid by each man fare will be approximately \$25.

The excursion will be held entirely in the twin falls band, which was one of the first organizations formed in the early history of the city, playing series of open-air concerts in the twin falls band hall, and continuing to do so for many years, and enthusiastic members of the organization, it will be pointed out, will be deposited in cities where night stops are to be made so that Pullman quarters may be used as headquarters, and houses for the excursions throughout the trip.
