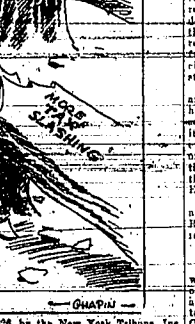

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PLANS CHANGE IN PRINCIPLES

Johns Hopkins University Celebrates Half-Century of Service With Announcement of Important Action.

(The Associated Press.)
Baltimore, Feb. 23.—Johns Hopkins University yesterday celebrated its half-century anniversary with an announcement of an important action in its first principles of graduate instruction and research. "The Annals of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences," the physician, the mathematician, the physicist, the chemist, the biologist, the geologist, the astronomer, the philosopher, the lawyer, the economist, the sociologist, will all follow the purely academic first two years of its present curriculum and devote itself to research and instruction for the remainder.

When the release of President Frank J. Goodnow and the board of trustees has been realized, Johns Hopkins will grant doctor of philosophy and master degrees in the fields of the medical and engineering schools. No date has been set for the change. It is estimated that an additional expenditure of at least \$500,000 will be required to put the plan into full effect and that the university will be required to "re-organize" the university to add to the faculty men of outstanding ability.

Exceeded Hopes.

Fifty years ago, when the university's first president, Daniel Coit Gilman, announced that the university "intended to do the best of its kind in the field of graduate education and research," the results have exceeded the most optimistic hopes of the founder. The university is still "a recent completion of the leading men of science in the United States" and is now "the most advanced university in the world."

Research has enlarged the boundaries of knowledge and has made it possible to solve many of the world's problems. The university has expanded and John Hopkins has among other universities, has advanced the frontiers of knowledge. Fields not associated with research and preparation for it, with the following results:

- Graduate schools which should emphasize freedom of teaching, personal contact between teachers and students and individualization of instruction, have been instituted by methods more appropriate to individual instruction.
- The student preparing for research is required to spend too many years in general education before he begins to concentrate upon productive work.
- The increased number of students has required a more elaborate system of administrative organization within the university.
- The Johns Hopkins plan contemplates that:
- These students will be attracted and selected, as may progress the necessary mental development and equipment for the study of research.
- More intensive training will be given, which students, unhampered and unimpeded, will be able to do.
- Requirements for the two degrees in the graduate schools of the university which ordinarily requires four years of residence and for master, which ordinarily requires three years of residence, will be based on the work accomplished rather than years of residence. Present medical school and engineering school degrees will be maintained, both of these being now on a graduate basis.

A principal object of the expedition of the present Arctic journey would be the establishment of meteorological stations, but Wilkins predicted he will discover harbors useful to whalers. He pointed out that 4500 persons are employed in the Alaskan whaling industry and that in twelve years 450,000 barrels of whale oil has been brought from those regions.

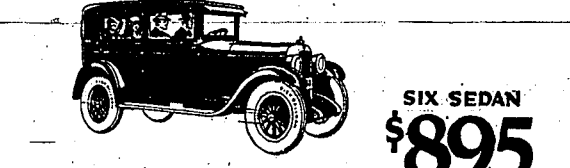
