Measure Reducing Federal Law
less \$387,000,000 Gets Presi-
dent's Approval; Treasury
Statement Made.

(By the Associated Press)
WALNUTTON, Ida., Feb. 26 (AP)—
Coolidge signed the tax reduction bill
today, making it law, although he
fears it may result in a treasury de-
ficit of \$100,000,000 a year hence.

This possibility was advanced to
the executive by his chief economic
adviser, who said it one present in-
dication of government receipts and
expenditures during the coming fiscal
year. The president hopes, however,
nevertheless, that the new law will result
from the cut swelling corporate income

TORNADO WHIPS ARKANSAS AREA SEVEN KILLED

Score Injured and Property Wrecked in Sections of Two Counties; Five Die When Homes Are Demolished.

(By The Associated Press). MPPHOM, Tenn., Feb. 26.—Seven persons killed and approximately a score injured—about half of them fatally—by a tornado which whipped through the southern part of Cleburne county, Ark., Thursday night and crossed the Mississippi river south of Greenville, Mississippi, wrecking property in sections of two counties.

Four white persons and one negro lost their lives when their homes in Cleburne county were demolished, one negro was killed near Greenwood, Miss.



FRUIT GROWERS DEAL DIRECTLY WITH PROBLEMS

Standardization and Inspection
Necessary if Industry Measures Up To Possibilities, Apple Men Are Told.

Standardization and inspection of the industry of fruit, three of the problems of marketing from grower to consumer are essential elements in any program for development of the fruit growing industry. In the Twin Falls meeting, it was decided that, in many ways, it was declared by M. L. Dean, director of the Idaho bureau of plant industry, and Harry Sabin, chief inspector for Idaho, in addressing before a meeting of the apple growers, the apple men held under auspices of the Southern Idaho Horticultural society in the Parish hall here Friday afternoon and evening.

Standardization, it was explained,

is necessary in order that the purchaser may know, with certainty, what he is buying.

Promotion of the identity of the product, Mr. Sabin stated, at the evening session, is one of the prime purposes of inspection regulations and makes it possible for products to be equated and rated, the result being a standard of quality for faithful adherence to standards of quality products, while eliminating waste or protecting against irregular and wrong marketing methods.

Recommending that the district, with fruit the volume of cash sales in any district is proportional to the number of inspection certificates issued in the district,

Mr. Sabin asserted.

In dealing with the fruit situation, the speakers used plain language.

of the list in Idaho in percentage of inci-

ticence, which is computed upon the total number of cases shipped, Mr. Sabin asserted.

One of the leading fruit dealers of the country who distributes annually between \$1,000,000 and \$1,200,000 in payment for Idaho apples, has persistently refused to enter Twin Falls field, Mr. Dean declared, because of common disregard of standardization and inspection regulations in that district.

Show Possibilities

Indicating the possibilities of fruit production, particularly the apple industry in this region, Mr. Dean, who prior to coming to Idaho was associated with an association of Washington apple growers, stated that apples produced in Twin Falls county are not excelled in quality by apples produced in any other district.

It is possible, Mr. Dean continued, for the industry to be developed in the region so as to make it a market for all kinds of apples equal to that sold on the markets for Wenatchee apples, because of higher land values and higher cost of water in the Wenatchee area. It is also possible for Twin Falls growers to make one dollar profit while the Wenatchee grower makes 50 cents.

In his remarks at the afternoon session, Mr. Dean discussed methods of protection against insects and careful treatment of trees that are emerging from two seasons of adversity, a season of extreme cold following a season of winter heat.

On the part of the apple men, Mr. Sabin declared, it is their power to do away with the basis for the objection made by England to the objection made by the Pacific northwest to sending apples to England, "if" the pest should be gained in the early sprouting so that there would be little or no need for late spraying. He quoted the results of an Idaho grower who was spraying his orchard three or four days to late—"You can't get them by spraying their tails."
