

CABLE SHIP HAS DIFFICULT JOB; EXCITING WORK

Transatlantic Line Between Old and New Worlds Kept in Repair at High Cost; Stories Related.

(By the Associated Press.)
NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—(Special to the Associated Press.)—The transatlantic cable from Cape Cod to Brest usually connects the old world with the new.

Fretful with messages of vital importance to man, this slender bridge, 2,200 miles long lies deeply buried in the central masses of the sea. There it whispers its messages of life, love, death and destruction to the unresponsive waves.

When this happens there is much concern in the offices of the French cable company. Invaluable messages, delicate instruments are being broken. Often it is near the middle of the afternoon that the break is located. The cable repair ship, Edouard Jenner is dispatched to the scene.

A maritime oddity, the Jenner is one of the finest cable ships afloat. Huge tanks below decks house 250 miles of deep sea cable. Strapping hooks of all descriptions, weighted to sink them three miles below the surface, are stowed properly away. Buoys to mark the ends of cable when installed are hoisted on deck. Powerful winches fore and aft are ready to reel in or out the heavy strands.

It is heartbreaking work, this reeling in and out of a 200-mile cable. Captain John DeMarleau and crew were warned.

And Jenner steams slowly back and forth, groping about the sea floor. Howling winds and driving rain must be disregarded. Flood lights transform night into day and the work continues.

Often the cable is heated and the business of bringing it to the surface a matter of eight hours work, is long. And often it almost reaches the deck of the ship, only to break again and slide meaning back to the bottom. In the mid and some at the bottom.

It was of such force that the messenger was blown out of the ship and the vessel was so damaged that it feared where it would be stranded. The cable was broken and the messenger was lost.

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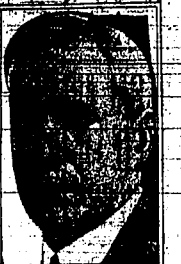

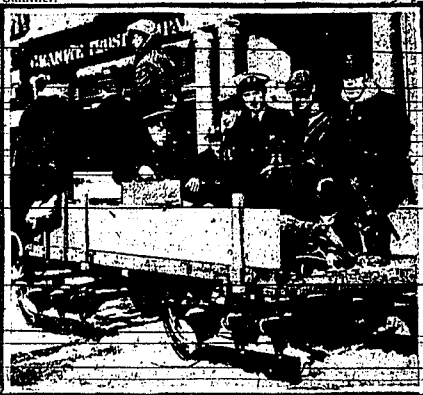

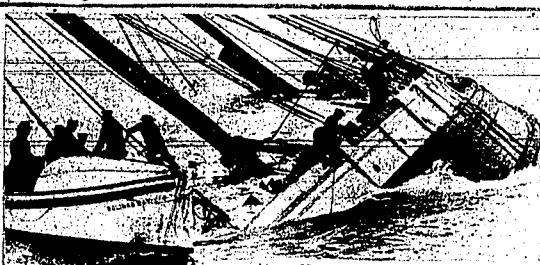
