WORK IN FAVOR OF CLIMATE RECLAMATION

Secretary Suggests That Group be Appointed to Decide Merits of Various Projects Proposed to Congress.

(By the Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 6.—Appointment of a committee to decide on the merits of various reclamation projects was favored by Secretary Work of the interior department today, in a letter sent to Chairman McNary of the senate reclamation committee.

The committee would be composed of the chairman of the senate and house committees on reclamation, the chairman of the committee on appropriation of the senate and house, the director of the budget and the secretary of the interior.

Work's suggestion that Secretary McNary communicate with the senate and house and request the appointment of the special joint committee which he proposed in order to work on a scheme of construction for the purpose of keeping the amount of appropriations for the work within a definite limit, the secretary said.

CONGRESS LOOKS WITH DISFAVOR ON NEW MEXICAN LAW

Clouds of International Dissension Between Mexico and U. S. Clear but Legislators Continue to Wrangle.

(By the Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 6.—The clouds of international dissension over the new Mexican law now appear to be drifting away, but the outlook for peace over the Mexican situation in congress is not so easy.

Without much debate the senate adopted today a resolution asking the state department whether any objection to the Mexican law was being published in detail of the diplomatic exchange between Washington and Mexico City, apparently approaching an amicable conclusion.

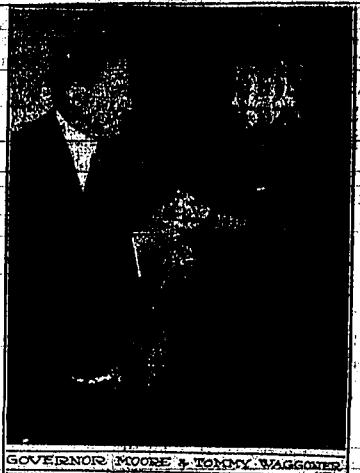

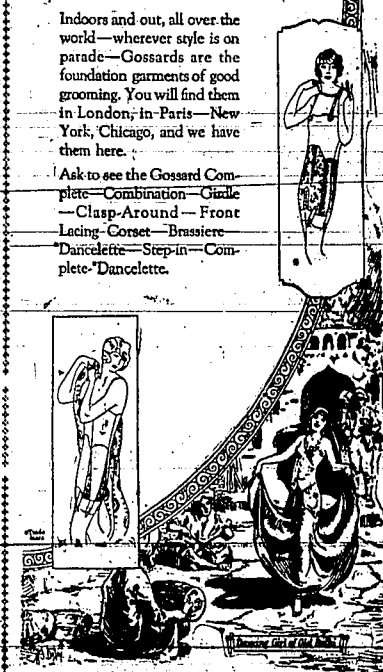

GERMAN CHIEF DOES NOT WANT OWN PHYSICIAN

President Von Hindenburg, Despite His 78 Years, Scorns Suggestion of Employing a Personal Doctor.

BERLIN, March 6.—In spite of his 78 years, President von Hindenburg scorns the suggestion that he employ a personal physician. The American custom, by which a special physician watches carefully over the physical welfare of the chief executive, accompanying him on journeys, merely evokes smiles at the president's palace here.

"I do not even know who the president would summon, if he would become ill," remarked one of the secretaries.

The president underwent a physical examination in April, 1925, just after he had announced he would be a candidate for the presidency. The examining doctor pronounced him to be in excellent condition, and since then, he has not bothered about his health. President Von Hindenburg's recipe for longevity is simplicity and moderation in everything.

The Lewiston Bonanza went through the north central Idaho district territory in impressive fashion last week, winning six games in the three days by an average of more than 21 points per game, the largest margin ever recorded in a district meet. The final game Saturday night between Lewiston and Grerion found the Lewiston team at its height, the Bonanza outfit being handed down, 32 to 7.

More quiet, frenzied by all teams, was swamped by Lewiston in two games, 34-25 and 32-13. Lapwai fell before the Bonanza in the 2nd and 3rd round games, 22-10 and 45-21, while Nez Percé succumbed in the semifinals, 25-15.

In six games Lewiston piled up 220 points to 100 by opponents, the average per game being 28 points against 17 for the opponents. Coach John Brown had three capable substitutes who were used all through the meet to good account, and this reserve lower is expected to carry Lewiston far in the state meet at Boise next week. Lewiston landed three men on the all-district team. They were Willie and Buchartz, forwards, and Kahl guard. White was high point man of the tourney with 72 points, made in five games.

Arrangements have been completed for the panhandle tourney to be held Friday and Saturday at Coeur d'Alene. Eight teams have been invited: Kellogg, St. Maries, Plummer, Shoshone, Rathburn, Sandpoint, Bonanza Ferry, and Coeur d'Alene. 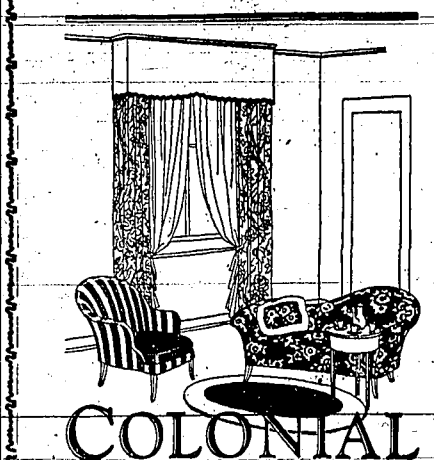

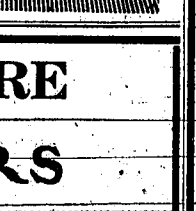

TORRENT POURS THROUGH BREAK IN WATER MAIN

Million Gallons of Water Under High Pressure, Wash Out Tons of Earth and Rock and Menace Switch Track.

One of the most serious breaks in the history of Twin Falls waterworks system occurred at 11:15 a. m. Saturday when a crack in the 14-inch main supply line gave way on the bank of Rock creek canyon near the railroad bridge, pouring more than a million gallons of water in terrific force against the canyon wall from which tons of earth and rock were washed down into the channel. Escape of water through the break emptied the chamber through the break emptied the chamber at the filtration plant in 15 minutes and pressure dropped immediately from 25 pounds to 10 pounds throughout the water system.

Water was shut out of the line as soon as possible, and workers with an acetylene torch began cutting out the broken section of pipe. The work was continuing late at night, slow progress being made on account of accumulation of sand in the pipe.

Supply Comes Through By Pass During the period required for repair of the main supply line, Twin Falls water supply is being diverted through a 10-inch secondary by-pass line across Rock creek canyon at the Shoshone street bridge. Pressure late Saturday afternoon returned to normal at 75 pounds.

Difficulty in connection with repair of the broken supply line is increased in consequence of the washing away of earth and rock on which the line had rested. Harry Rayburn, municipal works superintendent, stated Saturday evening. It is considered probable that construction of a trestle may be necessary to support the water main.

Sections of railroad track which have been washed into the canyon at the break had occurred a few yards farther south, where the water line runs close to a switch track. It was feared by waterworks department employees.

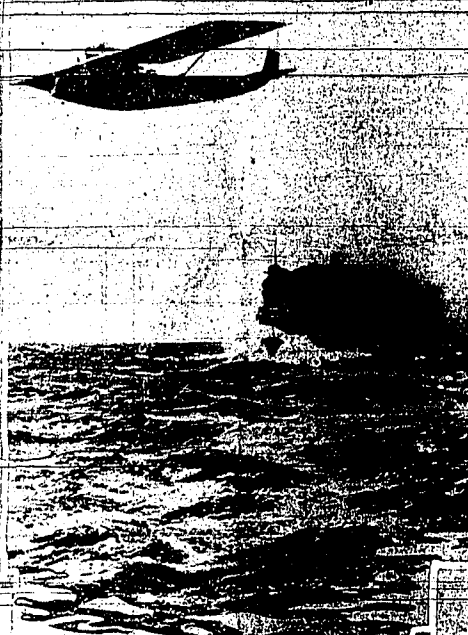

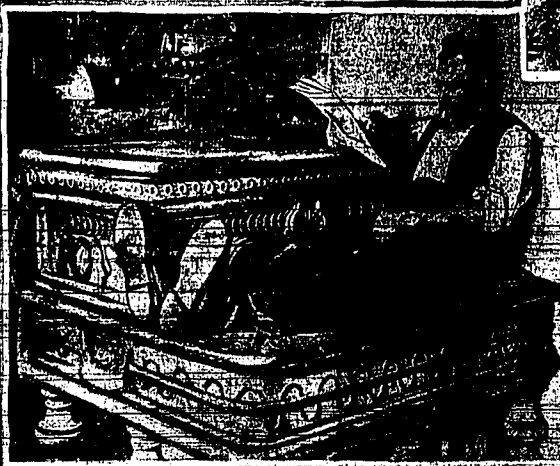

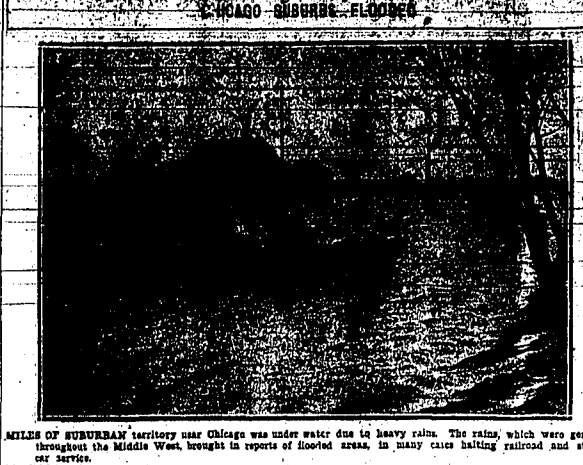

Exiled Imperial Family of Austria-Hungary Making Homes in Foreign Countries; Headline in Paper Startling

PARIS, March 6.—(AP)—The British navy is Paris' the rather startling headline which appeared in the Paris newspapers this week, but the matter was not a division of dreadnaughts which had found means to ascend the river Seine but a flotilla of five motor gunboats returning from patrol duty on the Rhine.

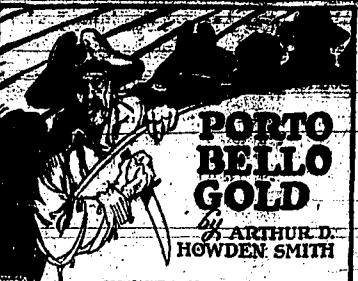

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DEPUTIES MAKE RAPID PROGRESS

Financial Bill in France Gets Action; Expected to be Sent to Upper Body Soon.

PARIS, March 6 (AP)—The number of deputies working against time in an attempt to dispose of the financial restoration bills so they can be sent to the senate tomorrow morning and finally voted before Premier Briand leaves for Geneva tomorrow night, made considerable progress today.

The deputies passed articles taxing salt and increasing the tax on alcohol. However, an amendment proposing the organization of a corporation with 200,000,000 franc capital, with the state owning two-thirds of the stock for the exclusive sale of petroleum and sugar slowed up the work, provoking a long debate. In the course of the Finance Minister, Doumer said the proposal needed further study and pointed out that it was a rather delicate matter to organize a monopoly on a product for which France is entirely dependent upon other countries.

The chamber refused to disjoin the amendment and sent it back to the finance committee but during the debate M. Doumer impressed the deputies with the difficulties in the way of immediate realization of such a plan.

GERMANS PLAN STUDY OF U. S. STORE SYSTEMS

Thirty Department Store Heads Sailing to Inspect Business Methods in Use in Western Hemisphere.

BERLIN, March 6.—Thirty department store owners and managers from various parts of Germany will shortly for the United States to study store management, especially what the Germans call "jazz band advertising."

Although the department store was imported from the United States by Heenan Tietz of Berlin, 25 years ago, the German store owners came to meet over the vigorous advertising campaigns and artistic window playings used by the big stores in America.

The delegation plans to visit New York, Chicago, Philadelphia and Detroit.

Secretaries and other functionaries of the German embassy in Berlin are preparing for an array of accounts, headed by George Trautwein, the special foreign minister.

It has become known here that Trautwein, having recently attended one of his diplomats to "devote more attention to their personal appearances," and not hesitate to consult the smartest tailors, has passed on the word that language is an effective background.

The Russian embassy in Berlin, Prague and Warsaw especially has been designated to furnish the hotel-housing.

The amazement with which a woman automobile driver is being greeted in many women's organizations here, is due to the fact that a person has to drive a car.

The motor vehicle law prescribes a written and oral examination with two trials for all applicants for driver's licenses. Many women and some men who cannot get the difference between a car and a rickshaw, must take a two weeks' course in auto mechanics before their applications will be considered.

Women's clubs which are demanding a modification of the law claim that a mechanic is not necessary a safe thing to see. They point to statistics for 1925 which show that only 2,900 automobiles in Berlin, 143 persons were killed and 4,229 injured in 1,167 traffic accidents, a record which is said to be surpassed by any other city.

Wine growers of St. Martin and Leukerode, in the Rhine valley, have handed together and agreed that every time a federal revenue collector appears in one of these communities he is advised of his rights by the tolling of church bells.

The purpose of the bell ringing is announced in the German newspaper in a continental frame of mind, which, when reinforced by a few glasses of wine may lead them to overlook a few taxable items. In any event, the villagers have agreed to warn each other of the collector's impending visit so that work and a dividend of Ebenkoben hears the chimes of St. Martin he knows who and what is coming.

The tipping problem in German rail-way stations has been simplified by law. The legal rate station conductors may expect in tips is about seven cents for carrying baggage weighing 50 pounds or less from the station to the train or vice versa. For an additional 25 pounds or fraction thereof, a porter is entitled to an extra four cents. If a traveler takes up more than 15 minutes of a porter's time the tip ought to be 50 per cent more.

The law requires porters or employees to explain the legal tipping rate to any traveler who asks the porter how much is expected.

Although the German yearbook contains 338 different titles, it is recognized by the republic in place of the former designates bestowed by the Kaiser, an institution of the "president." But president von Hindenburg does not feel slighted. He is an uncolored class by himself.

Officials and employees are divided into thirteen groups based on position salary and pension allowances. One of the oldest titles is that of "ship skipper" (Schiffsführer), in class 1. It is more than a mere designation. The proper rank of the skipper would be "Herr Fachschiff." Chancellor Luther is the only person in the government pay scale group, but an additional group has been created for the only other single position in the government.

It is still unknown whether the Gold Coast was first discovered by the French or the Portuguese, but the name has been given over by both the people of Europe since a Portuguese expedition took possession of part of the coast in 1482.

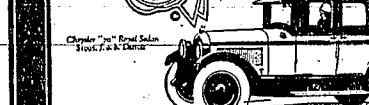

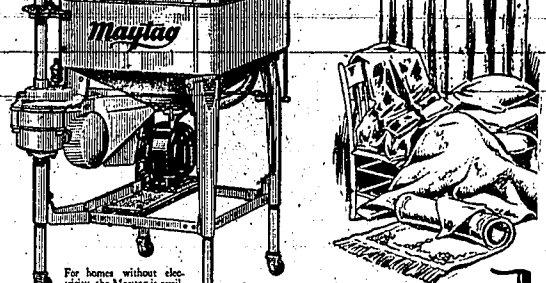

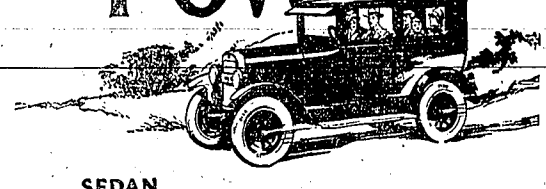
