

POWER COMPANY ASKS COURT FOR RATE INCREASE

Schedules Fixed by Idaho Public Utilities Commission Declared Confiscatory in Federal Court.

(By the Associated Press) Boise, March 8.—Attorneys for the Idaho Power company argued Monday that schedules of rates fixed by Idaho public utilities commission are confiscatory, in the final hearing of its suit against the commission which opened before a special state court in Boise last week.

The court tomorrow will hear arguments in the suit of the investors' syndicate of Minneapolis agents, E. W. Porter, Idaho commissioner of finance and the Nelson-Bicks and the Mutual Power, both of Utah, against A. H. Bennett, attorney general, and other state and county officials.

Rate Declared Confiscatory.— Counsel for the commission contended that rates "are confiscatory" within the jurisdiction of the commission as established by the commission as created by statute could not be subject to interference by the courts unless there was a clear indication that rates established were confiscatory.

Light Per Cent Asked.— The power company maintained that as the Idaho statute gives the utilities commission power to fix rates at reasonable rates, when this is not done the matter becomes a subject of review by the court.

To Probe Foreign Prices.— Washington, March 8.—A tariff commission inquiry into the retail prices of American foreign countries, as compared with the retail prices in the United States, was asked in a House bill today.

In her effort to upset Chicago's present arrangement for taking water from the lake, Wisconsin now has supporting votes in Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and New York.

SALMON BOARDS FOR PURCHASE OF MORE WATER

Proposition Submitted by Meredith Interests Favors With Company and District Directors.

Water supply of the Roseworth irrigation project, estimated at approximately 17,000 acre feet annually, may be purchased for \$100,000 through a canal between the Salmon River and the Roseworth reservoir to supplement the Salmon River project's water supply.

The plan is to purchase water from the Salmon River irrigation district at a joint meeting here Monday evening by F. M. Meredith, who is associated with his brother, E. M. Meredith of Des Moines, former secretary of agriculture, in ownership of the Roseworth project.

In consideration of the Meredith's acceptance of two amendments to the proposition, members of the two boards voted to accept the proposition.

Under Mr. Meredith's proposition bonds of the Salmon River irrigation district would be accepted as payment for the water.

Amendments to the proposal which were accepted by Mr. Meredith provide that the amount of water to be transferred shall be based on records compiled for five years and by the Roseworth board.

Under the plan, the Roseworth board would have records of the coming five years, and that the water shall be measured to the Salmon River settlers at a rate of one-half acre foot for one-half acre of land.

Fun of construction work involved in the project and some other details will be worked out, Mr. Meredith stated. These factors, however, do not detract from the Meredith interests for the water.

Lack of Credentials Keeps Convicted Man Out of Leavenworth

Prisoner Shows up at Gates of Penitentiary, but is Refused Admittance to Institution.

CHICAGO, March 8.—(By The Associated Press) A man who is under sentence to a term of years in the state prison and who would like to get into Leavenworth penitentiary, but is refused admittance to institution.

The man, who is known as "Red" West, was convicted of charges of using the mails in a scheme to defraud in connection with the West-Tand and Operating company, which formerly had offices here. After failing to get a writ of habeas corpus, he was taken to United States Marshal Palmer E. Anderson, who sent him to the penitentiary with a certificate and proper commitment papers.

Instead, according to telegrams, West arrived at Leavenworth about five o'clock today. He was refused admittance to the penitentiary because he did not have the proper papers.

Mr. Anderson said that West is technically a fugitive from justice and his \$5,000 bonds might be forfeited. Marshal Anderson said that he would probably be notified by Leavenworth to hold West until the proper papers are obtained.

NEW MILK INSPECTION PROGRAM

City Council Receives Attorney's Recommendations for Remodeling Ordinance.

Significant work out by Frank L. Stephan, Twin Falls city attorney, to remodeling of Twin Falls dairy and milk inspection ordinance were laid before the city council at its meeting Monday evening. No action was taken in regard to the matter, but it was agreed that definite action would be forthcoming at the meeting next Monday evening.

Proposed Changes.

Proposed amendments would abolish the right of the council to delegate to another board that might be named by it the powers of inspection and regulation of meat and dairies, and would do away with charge of \$1.50 for first inspection fee. License fees for packable milk would remain unchanged. Dairymen selling three gallons or less of milk daily would pay \$1 between three and ten gallons \$5; 10 gallons and more, \$10.

Legless Bowler Makes First Class Showing

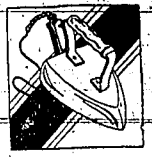

COUNCIL GIVES LANDING FIELD MORAL SUPPORT

City Administration Feels Financial Handicap in Consideration of Move for Modern Traffic Requirement.

Twin Falls city council members are appreciative of the desirability and business necessity of an airplane landing field at Twin Falls, but because of the city's financial limitations, they are unable to see how the municipality can enter upon a project for establishment of a field that might involve financial sacrifice other than for purchase of the site or its maintenance.

They noted first an expression of sentiment as to whether, in the opinion of the councilmen, the city should own the field or whether the project should be left to private interests.

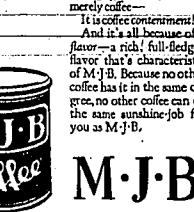
