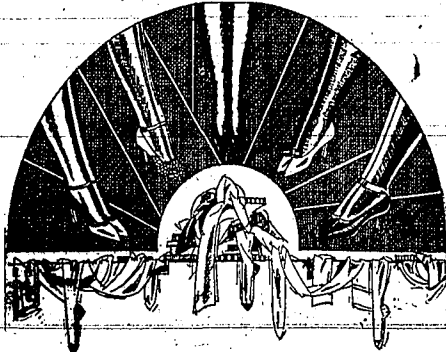

FIVE SIXTHS OF WAY COVERED TO BASEBALL GOAL

Few Hours Work Will Insure Birth in Utah-Idaho League for Twin Falls Organization, Leaders Believe.

The campaign for finances to obtain for Twin Falls a berth in the proposed U. I. baseball season has progressed to a point where additional subscriptions amounting to approximately \$1000, are required to achieve the goal, it was announced Thursday evening following a conference here of leaders in the undertaking.

Progress in the campaign has been encouraging to volunteer workers here, but it has been a matter of fact in promoting organizers of the league to make extensive use of the time in which Twin Falls action on the opportunity to obtain the franchise shall be finally determined.

Volunteer workers in Twin Falls are busy with the financial campaign to obtain for Twin Falls a berth in the proposed U. I. baseball season. SUPREME COURT HEARS DRY LAW CASE ARGUMENT

Government Attorneys Contend
Bootlegger and Customer
Alike Are Guilty Under Eight-
teenth Amendment.

(By the Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, March 11.—Coun-
turers are liable to prosecution with
bootleggers, the government argued in
the supreme court today, if the latter
fail to keep records of their sales
available to the government for in-
spection.

The government's contention was
overthrown in the lower courts but
lawyers who listened to questions
from the bench today got the im-
pression that the supreme court might
take a different view of the issue.
The controversy arose in Philadel-
phia when the government sought to
prosecute Jacob Katz, George B. Pan,
and Herman Fursten for conspiracy
on charges that Katz had sold liquor
to the other men, without keeping a
record of the sales, including their
names and addresses.

Quashes Indictment.

The federal district court of eastern
Pennsylvania quashed the indictment
holding that the section of the Vol-
stead act requiring the keeping of
records of sales related only to per-
sonal holders.

Questions and suggestions from the
bench were frequent during today's
argument with Chief Justice Taft
and Justices Holmes, Vandever,
McKenzie, Sutherland, Sanford and
Stone taking part. Many of them
appeared to emphasize the criminal
status of the prohibition act under
constitutional amendment, including
the point that the government's
offense is possible as the outgrowth
of a single transaction.

May Use All Weapons.

Justice Holmes observed that it
seemed the prohibition act was ad-
apted to permit the use of every
weapon by the prosecution, even to
the extent of poison and entrapment
in enforcing the law and also remark-
ed that defense counsel was attribut-
ing to the law a sportsmanlike char-
acter which it did not possess.

An expression of surprise, however,
was drawn from Justice McKen-
zie that the government should insist, as
he put it, that a bootlegger who
places a gallon jug of whiskey in his
automobile could be prosecuted along
with his customers for conspiracy be-
cause he did not keep a record of the
transaction with a list of the persons
to whom he sold it.

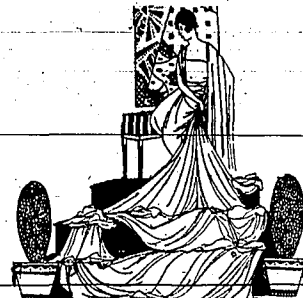

LEYER'S ADVICE SHEDS LIGHT ON LOCAL PROJECT

Building of Hangers and Lighting System not Essential to Establishment of Landing Field, M. L. Templeton Says.

Building of hangers and installation of lighting system are not necessary, but probably not desirable in consideration of any plans for establishment of an airplane landing field at Twin Falls, according to M. L. Templeton, aviation veteran and president of "Tommy" Thompson, well-known exhibition flyer, with Charles F. Wright, secretary, and Arthur L. Stein, former president of Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, recently made an investigation with view to selection of a landing field in this vicinity and recommended acquisition of a tract of 250 acres of state land five miles south of "Tommy" Park for this purpose.

In discussion of the subject with Mr. Wright Thursday, Mr. Templeton referred to the example of Salt Lake where only landing field site was provided by the city, hangers and lighting system being provided by contractors carrying the south and other aviation interests.

Throws Light on Question
Mr. Templeton's advice would seem to clear up some of the questions that developed last Monday when it was suggested that the Twin Falls council that the city acquire title to the proposed landing field. The only objection to the suggestion voiced by council members at that time was with regard to possible expense involved for equipment, improvement of maintenance of the field, illumination of the site. If Mr. Templeton's advice is correct, outlay for maintenance of the proposed landing field would be negligible. Mr. Wright suggested that this work probably could be done by volunteers working little or no expense.

Acquisition of this site, which is without an available supply of irrigation water, it is believed, and negotiations to this end are to be opened with I. H. Nash, state land commissioner, according to understanding reached at the council meeting.

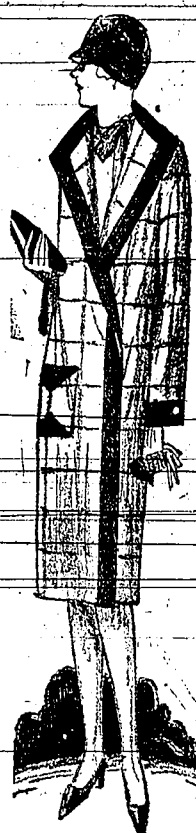

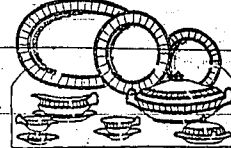

HALT FOR TEA

Dorothy Gish, American Actress, Says Afternoon Hour Is Welcome One.

NEW YORK, March 11.—Five o'clock—the British hour for tea—constitutes the chief difference between American and English methods of motion picture production. So concludes Dorothy Gish, American film actress, who made "Nell Gwyn" for a British company, and soon will go back to make three more pictures, one of which will be "Madame Tenebris."

"When I became known last year that I was going to England to make my first film, every one told me I would find things rather slow," she said. "I soon found, however, that things were done in the studios there with the same rush that characterizes our production."

"For seven weeks we worked twelve hours a day, but no matter what happened at five o'clock we always stopped for tea. Outside of this, I found little difference."

J. D. Williams, former head of the Associated First National Pictures here, now a general manager of British National Pictures—Leda—wishes to make Miss Gish's point. She believes he is largely responsible for the similarity in production methods.

The "seven personality" of the actress is much like her real personality. In appearance, however, Miss Gish is different, for the black wig she wears in most pictures is missing, revealing a mass of blonde hair.

"I have no war wig," she explained, smiling. "I should have said I would look too much like my sister, Lillian, in pictures. Even in real life I meet people who think they are talking to Lillian. This happens so often I sometimes don't correct those mistakes."

Miss Gish has little time for idle hours, but much pleasure in her life. She is the wife of James Gish, who has the leading role in the picture "The Younger Generation," however, she admits.

NEW YORK, March 11.—Retiring in surrendering title in one way or another without being spanked into submission, seems to be a rather common occurrence among the top of the light weight realm.

There was no rearguard light weight class anywhere in the world until 1909 when Al Hansen, an American, who weighed 135, announced that he was champion of the light weight division and challenged any man to fight him who weighed between 125 and 135 pounds.

That made four men in a row who had retired undefeated as champions of the light weight class.

In 1909, George (Kid) Lavigne set up a claim for the vacant throne seat. It was recognized. Lavigne continued as title holder until July 3, 1909, when he lost a 15-round decision to Frank Erne in Buffalo, N. Y.

A short time afterward Hicken retired—undefeated.

About a year or two later, Joe Coit

retired—undefeated.

After Chambers successfully defended title exactly once, winning from Johnny Clark on March 27, 1918, Chambers intended Hicken's example and went into retirement.

A year later Charlie Norton claimed the title, was recognized as the title holder, but retired without defending it.

The title lapsed for several years, but in 1921 Jack McAuliffe made a claim for it. It was soon afterward recognized for the reason that McAuliffe had beaten every man of his weight up to that time. McAuliffe, who had started his career as an amateur, took an all corners at 135 for something like nine years and in 1920, when he had beaten every man in that class, he also retired.

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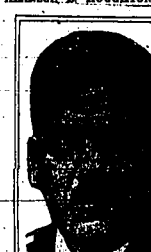

AMBAASSADOR ALANSON B. HOUGHTON has been recalled from England to discuss the coming disarmament conference of the League of Nations. U. S. DISTRICT ATTORNEY A. D. BERNSTEIN, of Cleveland, launched one of the bitterest prohibitions against the sale of whisky.

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touchdown from the 30 yard line count one point, as is now the custom. But make a goal from the 30 yard line count 3 points, and from the 40 yard line count 4 points, and one from the 50 yard line count 5 points.

After a touchdown, it then would be up to the captain of his team to decide just what sort of kick he would make. The captain would make a kick from the 30 yard line, which kick would be made with a fair degree of chance for success and which point would be enough to put his team into the lead.

But if the score happened to be 14 to 12 against his team, the captain could make a gamble by ordering a kick from the 30 yard line, which would add two points and at least tie the score, or he could order it attempted from the 40 yard line, and this try, to score 3 points, and put his team into the lead.

In all cases, the opposition team would, as now, have 20 yards from the kicking point and access to the line on the goal line, in its instance where 20, 40 or 50 yard kicks were made.

Such a rule, whereby a team could elect to try for after-touchdowns from a variety of distances and be rewarded—in success—by more points

These rules the games in football could be avoided if the rule makers for the gridiron sport did a bit of tinkering with the laws that regulate the kicking point and access to the line on the goal line, in its instance where 20, 40 or 50 yard kicks were made.

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for greater distance would not only help destroy the possibility of the game, but would add to the entire affair from the spectator's view. For it would add the spiky element of a kicking game to the game.

In this era, if the score is 14 to 7 in favor of one team, that team, realizing that the opposition must score a touchdown and kick a goal afterward to make it a tie game—which is the worst that can happen to it. And so the leading eleven usually goes on the defensive and by so doing, the game is robbed of at least half the spectacular feature of offensive play.

But if a change were made in the scoring of a goal after touchdown, then all would be different. For the team that was leading, by scoring a touchdown, could reduce the count to 14 to 7 against it, and then could elect to try for a kick from the 30 yard line, score two points—and win the game.

Some objection might be made to allowing as much as three points for a kick from the 40 yard line, or 4 points from midfield. But why? Certainly a kick from the 40 yard line, especially if it is made from an angle, is just about as difficult as a dropkick from the 17 or 20 yard mark. And such an accomplishment counts three points.

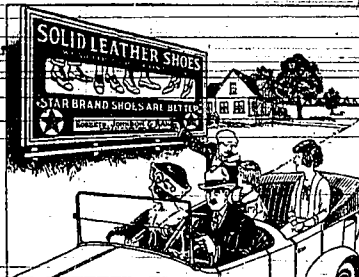

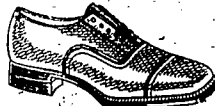

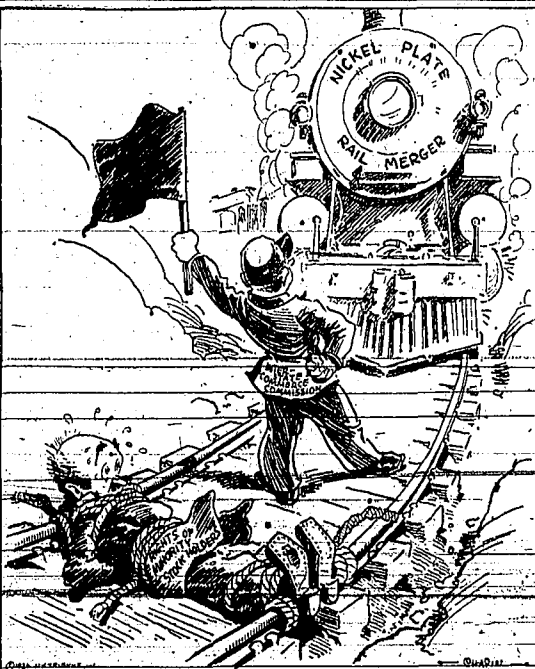

Cowboy Novels and Stories of
Western Frontier Popular
Here as Well as in Eastern
States.

(By the Associated Press)
KIN FRANCISCO, March 11.—If the cowboy novel has any admirers in the mountain or prairie states, there is nothing to indicate it in the correspondence of Joseph Henry Jackson, literary editor of Sunset Magazine.

Contrary to what is sometimes believed, "westerns" are popular in the west just as they are in the east, he finds, but it is the better written western story that makes friends.

Mr. Jackson receives about eight thousand letters yearly concerning books and from them he forms his conclusions as to the literary preferences of western readers. There is a noteworthy absence of appeal for a colored sketch of "wild and woolly" western life.

"Of course," he concludes, "it is only the reader of good books who is sufficiently interested to go to the trouble of writing a critic or an author."

Fiction leads in popularity with readers on the sunset side of the continent—from Alaska to Arizona. The mystery story holds its place next to fiction.

Novels, particularly about dealing with western history.

Jackson thinks the popularity of books in this section is the rank and file classification about as follows:

Fiction, travel, biography, popular science, history, and the "how-to-do-it" books. The last except that there are comparatively few humorous books published.

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BISMARK SHIRT NEWEST THING IN GERMAN STORES

Garment "Scientifically Built for Comfort" Appears in Smart Haberdasheries of Berlin.

BERLIN, March 11 (AP)—The Bismark shirt, advertised as being "scientifically built for comfort," has made its appearance in smart haberdasheries. The right sleeve of the Bismark shirt is about one inch shorter than the left. It takes its name from the Iron Chancellor, who sought introduction of the idea with out avail fifty years ago. Prince Bismark had ordered a dozen custom-made shirts at a Berlin shirt maker. A few days later, Prince Bismark complained to his valet that the sleeves of every one of the shirts were of equal length.

The firm apologized and begged for the return of the garments. However, the company's surprise, however, Bismark personally sent congratulations of the length of the tails. "Writing as most of us do, with my right hand," the Chancellor wrote, "I have been annoyed by the interference of the cuff with the movement of the right hand. The right sleeve in your shirt is shorter than the left, hence the cuff does not creep out from beneath the coat sleeve. The error is a pleasing in disguise. It ought to meet with great approval."

EDUCATION BY MAIL URGED BY OHIO MAN FOR YOUTH OF WORLD

"Education through letters written from one boy to another can be made into a more personal thing than the present-day method," Knudson believes. "If we can only bring geography, sociology and social subjects, which are the backbone of education, into a boy's personal life, he will learn them so much more."

Knudson's plan is to have a group of young people write among the young people of various nations—will result from the scheme, he thinks. In letter writing, boys are encouraged to write about their personal lives, their everyday customs, their viewpoints, their families, schools, and their play.

Infant Mortality High in the "Good Old Days"

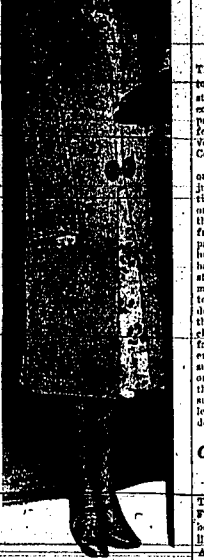
The mothers of Pius II and Dean Cole had each twenty-two children; in one case only ten grew up, in the other only the one. The mother of Philip Doddridge, the original author of the second "Paraphrase," had twenty children, but only Philip and a sister survived their infancy.

Thomas Gray, the poet, was the sole survivor of twelve. Of the fifteen children of the Earl and Countess of Fitzwater, fifteen in connection with the "Comus" five died young. Of the twelve children of Richardson, the novelist, all died young except four. Three of Shakespeare's ten children died in two months, and later he lost his favorite daughter. Of the eleven children of Edmund and Catherine Nelson, parents of Lord Nelson, three died.

It thus appears that even in favorable circumstances children died in alarming rates. The heavy mortality was not always due to poverty. Dean Leto's father was a lord mayor of London, and quite able, therefore, to bring up a large family. In the case of Shakespeare's children, lack of proper sanitation was largely the cause.

Georgetown Professor Asserts Prohibition Law Was Originally Used as Blind

BALTIMORE, Md., March 11 (AP)—The eighteenth amendment was added to the constitution solely to the allegation of the United States Steel corporation and the Standard Oil company.

Dr. Henry Joseph A. Ayl, professor of sociology at Georgetown University told members of the Knights of Columbus at a luncheon here.

RIVER BED DROPS FROM SIGHT; DEEP LAKE FORMS

SMOKY MOUNTAIN, Tenn., March 11 (AP)—The bed of the Smoky River, near here yesterday, the earth sinking 300 feet in the area of about 100 acres.

The earth sank a cloud of dust, leaving a funnel-shaped opening. Rain followed the sinking, and all sides began caving in and early tonight the opening was 300 feet in diameter, with the earth still giving away.

Law of Distance

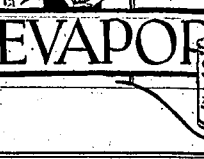
The fact that smoke near a smoke stack appears to be dark and then gradually lighter and clearer is a good illustration of the law of the inverse square of the distance. At one foot radius from the center of the smoke the smoke is very dark and the smoke particles very close together, and the passage of light through the particles is almost prevented. The smoke then appears black. At a two-foot radius the particles are twice as far apart and only one-quarter of the area is covered, allowing four times the light to pass through. This action is continuous and more and more light passes through the smoke particles, causing them to become of a much lighter color against the sky background. At some finite distance from the mouth of the stack, the appearance has been so great that there is practically no more interference with the light and the smoke disappears.
