Directors Call for Regulation of River to Eliminate Charge of Stored Water Loss and Give Credit for Inflow

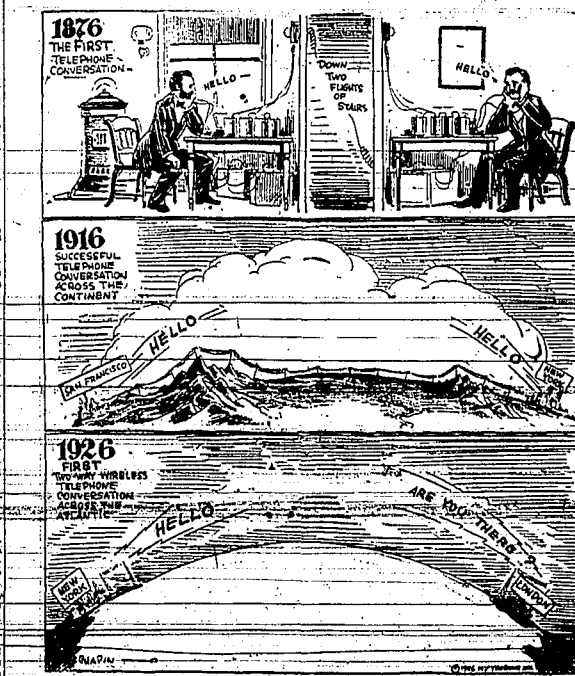

NEW OBSTACLE
IN TITLE BOUT

Fear of Race-Rioting Given as Reason for Prevention of Dempsey-Wills Fight.

NEW YORK, March 15. (AP)—Fear of rioting in the distance which apparently has eliminated any prospects of Harry Wills, negro heavy weight contender, against his long match with Jack Dempsey, says an article in this week's Liberty.

"The worst thing that could happen to the region of America would be to arrange a fight between Harry Wills and Jack Dempsey," the magazine quotes Tex Rickard as saying. "It would mean rioting all over the country and race war approaching civil war in some cities and some sections of the country."

Quiet Experience.

The promoter adds that he is convinced of this "from bitter experience" pointing out that he staged three bouts in which world's champions were run by negroes—George Dixon, Jack Johnson and Tiger Flores.

"One of these fights resulted in the killing of twelve negroes," Rickard went on, "and another resulted in seven killings within a few days after the fight."

Rickard today declined to amplify these statements, but it is generally understood they represent the main reason he has shelved all thought of matching Wills and Dempsey, at least this year, in preference to an attempt to pit these Tennessees against the champion in September.

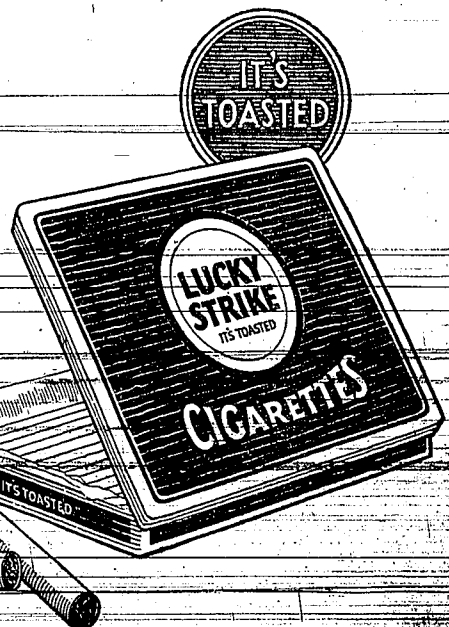
