## COUNCIL HEARS PLAN OF ACTION ON U. S. ENTRY

League Attacks Senate Reservations for American Adherence; Will Hold Conference of Delegates.

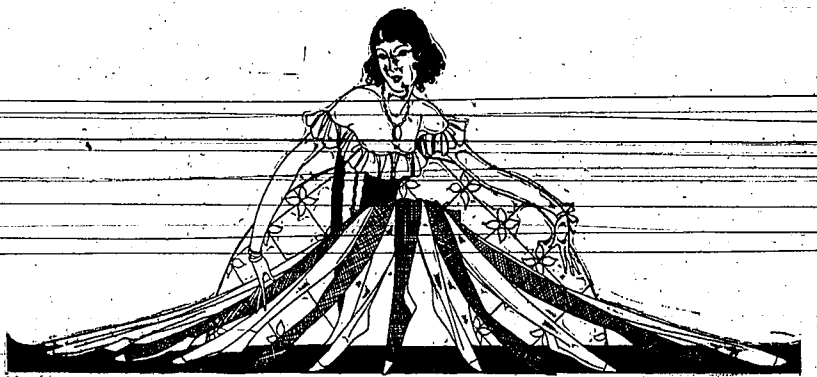

## COMMISSIONERS VOTE TO BUILD HOSPITAL WALK

County Board Authorizes Construction as Soon as Work of Securing Right of Way is Completed.

Authorization for construction of a sidewalk to the county general hospital as soon as right of way for the walk could be secured was voted by Twin Falls county commissioners at their last regular meeting last week. It was announced Thursday by C. C. Higgins, county auditor and recorder. At that time, Mr. Higgins stated, the necessary right of way had been secured except across one lot.

Injury of pedestrians who have been struck by automobiles on the highway to the hospital has occasioned demand on several occasions since the hospital was built for construction of a sidewalk to the institution. 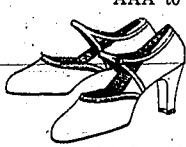

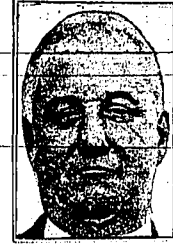
