

STORM FORMS GENERAL OVER GREAT PLAINS

Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma
and Texas Included in Grip
of Late Season Bluster: Low
Temperatures Prevail.

(By the Associated Press.)
KANSAAS CITY, Mo., March 29.—The blizzard conditions that lay grip on the Rocky mountains today, several days, accompanied by rain, snow, and wind, reached into the heart of the Plains today. Snow was reported from nearly all sections of Kansas and by tomorrow that state, most of Missouri, Northern Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle will be blanketed with white, it was predicted at the weather bureau here.

The storm reached western Kansas last night. Before noon today the ground was covered with a thick blanket of snow. In some places from four to six inches had fallen in this section, with the storm continuing unabated. Early this afternoon the snowfall had extended eastward into Missouri and late today reports came from southern Kansas towns of a heavy snowfall.

Continued low temperatures were predicted for tonight, with a minimum of 10 degrees above zero in the center of Kansas, 15 to 20 in the east, and 20 to 25 in the south.

At Kansas City and in this vicinity, the mercury hovered below freezing all day at Kansas City and registered 20 today.

COLDST POINT.

Somewhat more than one-half of Twin Falls' bonded indebtedness, that totals now approximately eight hundred twelve thousand dollars, would be retired within the next ten years without increase in tax levies for bond interest and redemption funds under terms of a financial plan outlined by J. S. Keel, commissioner of finance, at a regular meeting of the city council Monday evening at which the council approved the engineer's plan for a new addition to be known as the West Park subdivision, an independent subdivision, and the city attorney, a petition for showing cause on a defense, and then on its second reading an ordinance providing for the sale of an Oregon, short line spur truck 135 feet long for the standard oil company.

The finance commissioner's policy was outlined in the course of a decision that was invited by C. J. EARLY FRUITS HIT BY FROST

Winter's Return to Twin Falls Country Exacts Relatively Light Toll; Crops Benefit.

Winter's unreasonable return to the Twin Falls country Sunday with a cold blast of snowfall and more rain, seemed to be a minimum mark Sunday night at six degrees above zero, probably had not injured the fruit crop except possibly in the case of apricots and some peaches and early cherries, according to E. V. Olsson, district horticultural inspector. Fruit buds that had not developed well and the late varieties of these fruits probably have escaped.

The freeze came after snowfall that was of estimable value to field crops. The snow was not so deep as field crops showing above the ground were blanketed with snow so that the frost caused no damage, and the lighter covering in the snow will aid in the time for irrigation.

Cool weather following the frost of Sunday night, according to J. S. Felt, high school agricultural instructor, tended to reduce the extent of damage done to fruit crops, since it retarded thawing of frozen fruit buds and made the process a more gradual one.

First evidences of snowfall in the west appeared in the Hagerman valley, according to Mr. Felt, who returned Sunday evening from a trip to Boise, Shoshone in the Twin Falls country was heavy.

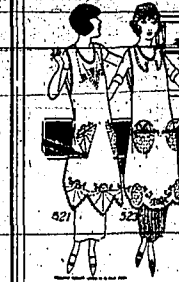
