NEW YORK STATE MAY VOTE ON PROHIBITION

ALBANY, N. Y., March 31. (AP)—Opportunity for the people of New York State to pass upon proposed modification of the Volstead act is being delayed today when the senate judiciary committee voted 10 to 9 to report favorably the early resolution calling for a referendum on the question.

The question which would be asked of the voters at the referendum election, set in the resolution for June 8, "Should the constitution of the United States be amended to prohibit the manufacture, sale, transportation, importation or exportation of beverages which are not in fact intoxicating as defined in accordance with the laws of the United States?"

Former Secretary of State Root, who is expected to have drafted the resolution, is expected to be in Albany today.

MURRAY TELLS PROGRESS WITH BRIDGE PLANS

Actual Construction of Bridge Lanes Span to Begin as Soon as Material Can Be Assembled, Engineer Says.

Actual construction work on the Twin Falls-Jordan County bridge across the Snake River canyon at Blue Lake, will commence as soon as the material can be assembled and plans for the structure are now rapidly nearing completion, according to the letter received yesterday by Shad L. Huggins of Twin Falls from R. M. Murray, bridge engineer, and head of the franchise for the new bridge.

The letter reads in part as follows: "We have our preliminary plans for the big bridge sufficiently far advanced now to get prices on our materials. We are getting along nicely, although it does require an immense amount of time."

"I just wanted to write you that we are working full time on the job and will be at the actual construction work as soon as we get the material prices, etc. collected and can contract let for the steel work. It may be of interest to you to know that because the larger part, by far, of the materials going into this structure is to be of steel, our first task will be to get all of the details for that completed."

"After we get all of the steel detail work completed and ready for it, we will still have plenty of time to build the foundations and have them set sufficiently by the time the steel begins to arrive on the job."

"This will give you some idea of how we are working and in our conversation with friends and citizens of Twin Falls, you can explain to them—about how the bridge is progressing and above all, to assure all of them that we are not 'loafing on the job' and as stated before, intend to have the bridge completed as soon as possible. Incidentally, I may state that there is no apparent rush at all at this time why we should not have the bridge completed on time."

CLOVER DITCHES TO BE CLEANNED

Twin Falls Canal Company Makes Agreement With Project Settlers; Suit Unaffected

Twin Falls canal company, under an agreement reached Wednesday by the company's directors and a delegation headed by H. C. Blaise representing hundreds of the high levee pumping project, a project, commencing some 2000 acres south of Huala, will clean the clover project's ditches this season provided the clover project's bondholders deposit with the canal company a sum of money sufficient to cover the expense of the work, estimate of the cost of the work is to be made by the canal company manager.

Litigation Not Affected.

Whether maintenance of the clover project ditches is a proper charge against the Twin Falls Canal company or whether it should be borne by the project's bondholders is a question that is at issue in litigation which has been instituted by the project's settlers against the canal company. It was made plain in the negotiations leading to the agreement reached on Wednesday that the agreement should not affect the issue involved in the litigation.

The canal company directors at their meeting Wednesday which followed an inspection trip to drainage projects under way in territory adjacent to Huala, adopted a policy which provided that no temporary transfers of water shall be made except in cases where the amount of the current year's maintenance assessment and all other assessments have been fully paid.

BUILDERS CALL FOR MONEY

March has been the most successful month in the history of the Mutual Building and Loan association, according to statement of James S. Hall, secretary of the local association, who stated that total loans up to last night amounted to \$15,000 for the month.

Prospective builders are becoming more numerous and many of the loans have been made for building purposes.

BREAK NARCOTIC RING—(CHICAGO, March 31.)—Federal agents claimed tonight to have broken up one of the largest illicit narcotic rings in the country with the arrest here of upward of half a hundred of its dealers and addicts and to have been doing a business of half a million dollars in more a week.

Factory Operation Boosts Tax Rolls

Operation of the Amalgamated Sugar company factory at Twin Falls last fall was an important factor in increasing total valuation of personal property in Twin Falls county for purposes of tax assessment, according to S. Child Stewart, county assessor. Sugar in the factory warehouses here this year has a valuation of \$182,000 according to the assessor's records, while sugar on hand last year following the season when the factory was not operated had a valuation of only \$15,000.

Assessment of the Utah Construction company's extensive land and livestock holdings in Twin Falls county was completed Wednesday, the records showing cattle valued at \$10,200 on the company's feed lots at the sugar factory, and more than 600 head of cattle on the company's House Creek ranch. Valuation of \$20,000 is placed by the assessor on the cattle.

MOVES FOR NEW HEARING

Notice of motion for new trial has been filed in district court here by defendant's counsel in the case of J. W. Peterson against A. L. Huggins wherein a jury last Saturday returned a verdict awarding judgment for \$400 for commission on a trade of sheep. The motion is based on allegations that certain instructions given by the court were erroneous and that the evidence was not sufficient to justify the verdict.

BEAN GROWERS SHARE PAYMENT OF \$100,000

Producers' Marketing Association Makes Fourth Distribution of Cash Among Members for 1925 Crop.

Southern Idaho Bean Growers' association distributed among its members in this district this week a fourth payment totaling approximately \$100,000 as account of members' 1925 bean crops sold through the association and its marketing agent, the Southern Idaho Wholesale company. The payment distributed this week makes the total amount paid by the association to its members for last season's bean crop approximately \$550,000. Payment for No. 4 beans has amounted thus far to four cents a pound. A fifth and final payment on account of last season's beans is to be made within the next 30 days, according to H. T. Blaise, manager for the association.
