MEXICO ISSUES FORMAL DENIAL OF LAND GRANT

Ambassador Tellez Declares Reports of Large Concessions to Japanese Government Are Absolutely False.

(The Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, March 31.—Formal denial of reports that the Mexican government had granted a 2,000,000-acre land concession in Lower California to a Japanese syndicate was issued here today by Ambassador Tellez.

The ambassador said that during the Diaz regime a land tract on the coast of Lower California had been granted to an American named Hild, who still holds it under a requirement that the consent of the Mexican government must be obtained before his rights could be conveyed to any foreign corporation.

The reports published in the press regarding the concession, "are therefore absolutely false," he said.

At the other end of the capital, the house foreign affairs committee continued hearings on the Mexican situation which would require withdrawal by the United States of recognition of the Calles government because of alleged political persecutions.

WASHINGTON, March 31.—Victor's attacks on Premier Mussolini marked center debate today in the Italian debt settlement.

Senator Harrison, democrat, Mississippi, declared the Italian premier threatened "the peace of the whole world" and that if this country assisted Italy by placing more loans in the premier's hands, he would make war on Germany and other European countries.

### MARS DRY AS SAHARA SAYS CHICAGO JOURNAL

CHICAGO, March 31. (AP)—One half of Mars is as dry as the Sahara desert, says a scientific study of the red planet revealed the University of Chicago's Astrophysical Journal said today.

It was spring on Mars when the spectrum was recorded by Walter S. Adams and Charles L. St. John at the Mount Wilson observatory. The quantity of water vapor in the atmosphere of Mars was found to be six per cent of that found over Mount Wilson and three per cent of that over Pasadena, California. The results said that the conditions indicate extreme desiccation over the greater portion of the Martian hemisphere toward the earth at that time.

PARIS, March 31. (AP)—The chamber of deputies today showed approval of the application of the oil monopoly for April 1, 1927. The matter will be referred to the committee for the study of details.

M. Porel, financial minister, pointed out to the chamber that the monopoly would give the government control of the oil market and that the finance committee had taken it up as a supplementary measure. He was previously fearful that the attempt to organize it now would lead to serious complications.

Recalls Negotiations.

M. de Monzie, minister of public works, recalled that negotiations were to begin soon at Washington for the settlement of the oil monopoly. He said that this was the first time for France to enter the world petrol oil fight.

M. Marguerite insisted the chamber should be notified immediately by an agreement setting the date some time in the future. With the proviso that the project should be carried out in the meantime.

### GOVERNMENT OF ITALY AIDS SCHOOL OF MUSIC

VIOLINI, March 31. (AP)—The Italian government has granted a partial subsidy to the "Minister School of Music for Americans" in recognizing its work toward strengthening the cultural ties between Italy and the United States.

The master school, which holds its sessions in the city of Rome, is devoted to the musical education of Americans by a corps of distinguished Italian professors. They are headed by Marco Carli, who is a professor at the Royal Musical academy of Mantua.

Students are given in singing, piano, violin, harp, composition, operatic coaching and Italian language and history of art. Each pupil is given direct and individual instruction.

### EXTEND OIL AND GAS PROSPECTING PERMITS

WASHINGTON, March 31. (AP)—Final congressional action is taken today on a bill to extend for two years oil and gas prospecting permits issued under the act of 1923.

The measure, reported a minor amendment by the house and the senate, is expected to pass.

Besides extending existing permits the measure would make valid any permits which have expired because of lack of publicly owned catalytic law to make further extensions.

# MURRAY TELLS PROGRESS WITH BRIDGE PLANS

Actual Construction of Bridge Lapses Span to Begin as Soon as Material Can Be Assembled, Engineer Says.

Actual construction work on the Twin Falls dam, county bridge across the Snake river canyon, will commence as soon as the material can be assembled and plans for the structure are now rapid by starting completion, according to a letter received yesterday by Shad L. Houghlin of Twin Falls from R. M. Murray, bridge engineer, and chief of the franchise for the new bridge.

The letter reads in part as follows: "We have our preliminary plans of the big bridge sufficiently far advanced to get prices on our materials. We are getting along nicely, although it does require a summe amount of time."

"I just wanted to write you that we are working full time on the job and will be at the actual construction work as soon as we can get the material prices, etc. collected and contract let for the steel work. It was of interest to you to know that because the larger part, by far, of the materials going into this structure is to be got out of the details for that summer. The contract for the delivery of it before we start the other work. Of course there will be a considerable amount of concrete work and timber work but these are quite small when compared to the steel work."

"As far as getting all of the steel, I can work completed and ready for it, we will still have plenty of time to build the foundations and have them set sufficiently far ahead of time the steel begins to arrive on the job."

"This will give you some idea of how we are working and in some conversation with friends and citizens of Twin Falls, you can explain to them about the bridge, its progress and above all, to none of all of them that we are not working on the job and are not before we intend to have the bridge completed as soon as possible. Incidentally I may state that there is no argument at all at all at this time why we should not have the bridge completed on time."

Producers' Marketing Association Makes Fourth Distribution of Cash Among Members for 1925 Crop.

Southern Idaho Bean Growers' association distributed among its members in this district this week a fourth payment totaling approximately \$100,000 on account of members' 1925 bean crop sold through the association and its marketing agent, the Southern Idaho Wholesale company. The payment distributed this week makes the total amount paid by the association to its members for last season's bean crop approximately \$350,000. Payment for No. 4 beans has amounted thus far to four cents a pound. A fifth and final payment on account of last season's beans is to be made within the next 30 days, according to H. T. Boske, manager for the association.


