DEBT QUESTION DRAWS FIRE OF SENATOR BORAH

Idaho's Senior Member Responds to Statements Made by Winston Churchill in Fiery Speech Before Senate.

(By the Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, April 1. (AP)—The strictures made against the United States recently by Winston Churchill, in connection with the British-American debt dispute, brought fire response to Idaho's Sen. Borah.

Senator Reed, Republican, Pennsylvania, referred to the chancellor's statement as "whirling," while Chairman of the Senate Committee on Relations with Latin America, back the recent history to show that the United States had sought to arrive at "just and full settlements."

Borah Plays Britain.

"A Great Britain is heralding to the world that we are a world power," thundered Senator Borah. "The world understood that the might of the world was gathered to itself at the close of the war is not to be compared to any amount that she could be called upon to do in the future."

He added: "I have been told that the world has been so disturbed by the

destruction of our country that it voted

unanimously that World War the inter-

national disputes of Germany, France,

Italy, Austria, Hungary, and Rumania,





HIGH PEAKS IN UNITED STATES

Sixty-One Mountains in Country Rear Their Heads More Than 14,000 Feet in Air.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 1 (UPI)—The recent naming of numerous high peaks by the United States Geographical Board has disclosed that there are 61 mountains in this country which rise more than 14,000 feet above sea level. Of these 17 are in Colorado, thirteen in California and one in Washington.

The Sierra club, a nationally known organization, recommended some 20 more mountains, and additional additional high-peaks in the country's mountains, and many of these have been accepted as official. The data compiled by the Geographical Board has brought out some interesting facts.

California, which has the highest peaks, Mr. Whitney, 14,500 feet, has the lowest peak, Mount Galena, 2,600 feet, above sea level. In California there are more than 90 unnamed peaks rising above 13,000 feet, according to the United States geological peak list. There are also 50 peaks touching more than 13,000 feet.

The mountains of Colorado, 17 of whose peaks top 14,000 feet, are rugged and more rounded, more difficult to climb than those of California, which are spire-like and contain more perpendicular small gneiss.

The state of Washington's one peak of extreme height—Mt. Rainier, 14,408 feet—is claimed by mountaineers to be the most dominating and beautiful in the Pacific Northwest.

The United States geological survey and the United States coast and geodetic survey gives the 14,000-foot summit of the United States, exclusive of Alaska, with their names on the map, Mt. Whitney, California, 14,501; Mt. Elliott, Colorado, 14,429; Mt. Spokane, Washington, 14,408; Mt. Massive, Colorado, 14,404; Mt. Harvard, Colorado, 14,396; Mt. Washington, California, 14,383; Grays Peak, Colorado, 14,341; Torrey Peak, Colorado, 14,336; and La Plata Peak, Colorado, 14,322.
