

GENERAL STORM CONTINUES OVER WEST COUNTRY

New Tempest Threatens California; Utah Is Center of Heavy Showers, While Wyoming Is Visited by Snow.

(By The Associated Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, April 6 (AP)—On the heels of the storm which struck the California coast, Saturday morning rain all over the state to relieve its drought, a new storm was predicted for the Pacific coast tonight.

The new storm is due to hit the coast Thursday on its eastward journey, the United States weather bureau reported.

RAIN HIT UP SALT LAKE CITY, APRIL 6

Precipitation in the northern part of the state is between 20 and 30 inches of rain, reported a rainfall of 70 inches of rain, ordinarily weather bureau officials estimated, southern Utah receives but little precipitation that the northern section receives of this order of conditions is believed to be caused by the reverse activity of the low pressure area that brought the storm.


