

## Mullins Approves Form of Oil Lease

TWIN FALLS, April 17.—Charles H. Mullins of Miles City, Mont., oil operator, has written his opinion of a new form of lease which was submitted to him by land owners of the Melon Valley district north of here.

According to the terms of the lease, Mullins will have 60 days in which to make a geologic survey and one year in which to drill a well. If he fails to do so, he must pay the landowners to complete a new well. He agrees to fall in each lease or within three and one-half miles of it within a year. He will pay twelve and one-half per cent royalty and wants leases for 5,000 feet.

He stated that the stock would reserve 20 to 30 acres for his company and would sublet the remainder to other companies. **BERLIN, April 17.** The coalition government has decided that President von Hindenburg merits a salary increase. Under the executive budget, which has passed, but has not yet been submitted to the Reichstag, he will get a salary of \$24,571 a year, an increase of \$1,57 over his previous salary.

Although the coalition's salary increase would be about \$3,000 less than Coolidge's, it is believed

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**CHINESE TYPEWRITER  
WILL REPRODUCE 5000  
LANGUAGE CHARACTERS**

**SAN FRANCISCO, April 17.** From out of the Orient with its mystic and singular ways comes a new invention—written in the form of a typewriter capable of transcribing the thousands of idioms of the old China. It is believed to be the first of its kind.

The machine, first of its kind, was designed by Teo Quan, a native of Shanghai. It is the product of years of labor and research, and is the result of a long series of foreign trials. In which was solved the tedious task of collecting ready all of the common characters required for the expression of Chinese.

There are 500 characters on the machine. These are transferred to paper through the medium of the familiar typewriter keys, the shifting apparatus being added when necessary.

Instead of 5000 character being mounted on an individual arm as is the case with American and European machines, however, the characters rest on a single base, which is the typewriter itself.

It is claimed that ordinarily educated Chinese with two months practice can acquire speed of 2000 characters an hour, which equals speed possible on typewriter machines, as such speed is not required for the typewriter.
