

WAR CLAIM BILL

Representative Mills of New York Will Cease to Act as Sponsor for German-American Adjustment Measure

(The Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, April 17.—The tentative course of the Mills bill to amend the Federal Reserve act, which took an unexpected twist today when its author, Representative Mills, Republican, New York, announced in the house that he would withdraw his support for the measure.

He had learned, he explained, that he was a director and stockholder in a company that would be affected by the bill. He would not vote for it, irrespective of house rules, he said he considered it proper to decline to further support of the bill.

Will Not Participate.

Mr. Mills informed the house he would not participate in considering the bill, but he would vote for it on the ways and means committee, insofar as it is, pending, or on the house floor. Information, which he contended was correct, was that the Federal Reserve act would be amended in one of the corporations affected.

By Representative Garner, democrat, Texas, who yesterday characterized the measure as "a stuporous after." Addressing the house after Mr. Mills had made his announcement, Mr. Garner said he doubted if 25 members, fewer house rules, had a right to make such a bill.

It was introduced several weeks ago by Mr. Mills after his provisions had been worked out by the treasury. It proposes adjustment of war claims between the German and American governments and citizens through issuance of bonds. It is estimated that overruled claims total about \$250,000,000.

It was indicated that some other republican on the ways and means committee would sponsor the bill instead of Mr. Mills while at the same time democratic members made plans to oppose the measure to the limit.

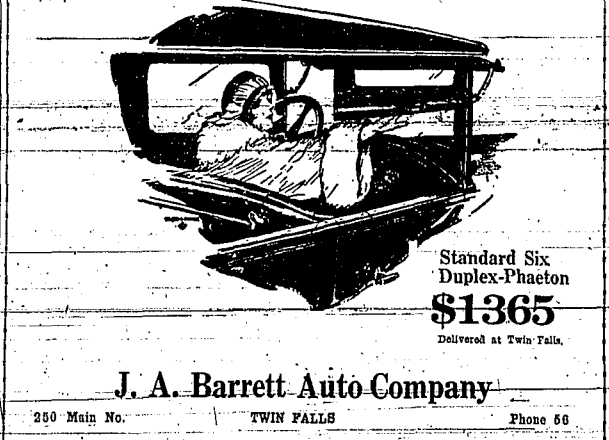

DISTRICT WILL EXPEND \$1500 ON SOUTH ROAD

Twin Falls Commissioners Make Appropriation for Improvement of Gap in Yellowstone-Yosemite Highway.

Twin Falls Highway district commissioners, in session here Saturday, voted an appropriation of \$1500 for improvement of the road south from Boise to the Nevada state line, which is a part of the new Yellowstone-Yosemite highway over which a great number of automobiles are expected to pass this season. The work for which the appropriation was authorized is to begin at the end of the present gravel road, about five miles south of Hagerman, and will be continuing toward the state line. Advances from Nevada are to the effect that extensive improvement work on the road in that state has been authorized.

Joint Enterprise

In joint session with the commissioners of the Rock Creek highway district, the Twin Falls district commissioners Saturday afternoon awarded contracts for grading three miles of road running west from the A. E. Mann corner south of Hagerman, two miles and three-fourths north of Twin Falls district in this project, awarded to Duffy Bros., Twin Falls, contract for grading two and one-quarter miles of the road, on his bid of \$2115, the district to furnish him with gravel.

Twin Falls district commissioners subsequently awarded to J. A. Young, Twin Falls, contract to furnish, haul and spread 1000 yards of Rock Creek gravel on one mile of road between Twin Falls and Kimberly, one and a half miles east of the sugar factory and parallel to the state highway. The contract price was \$1210. Six bids were received.

Seven Bridges Condemned

Seven bridges, deemed unsafe for heavy loads, were ordered condemned by the Twin Falls district board and signs are to be placed at each structure warning of the danger. The bridges thus condemned were described as follows:

Highway Canal, wood bridge, between sections 14 and 15, township 11 north range 17 east.
Low line canal, steel bridge, between sections 12, township 11 south range 17 east, section 7, township 11 south range 18.
Low line canal, wood bridge, between section 2 and 3, township 11 south range 17 east.
High line canal, wood bridge, between sections 9 and 8, township 11 south range 17 east.

Mullins Approves Form of Oil Lease

TWIN FALLS, April 17.—Charles H. Mullins of Miles City, Mont., oil operator, has secured the approval of a new form of lease which was submitted to him by land owners of the Mosco Valley district north of here.

According to the terms of this lease Mullins will have 60 days in which to make a geological survey and one year in which to drill a well. If he strikes a dry hole he has another year to complete a new well. He agrees to drill one well each block within three years and half-mile of it within a year. He will pay twelve and one-half per cent royalty and must leave on 5000 acres.

When he was in Dubi Mr. Mullins stated that he would finance himself and that there would not be any stock for sale. He also stated that he would reserve 80 to 100 acres for his company and would submit the remainder to other companies. He said there would be no difficulty about getting drilling if he should bring in a well.

The land owners held a meeting last Thursday evening at the Mosco Valley school house and organized by electing a board of directors consisting of J. W. Easton, J. H. Wetenskap, Mr. Easton, W. R. Hyde and C. W. Martin. J. W. Easton was elected president, and W. S. Hyde, secretary-treasurer.

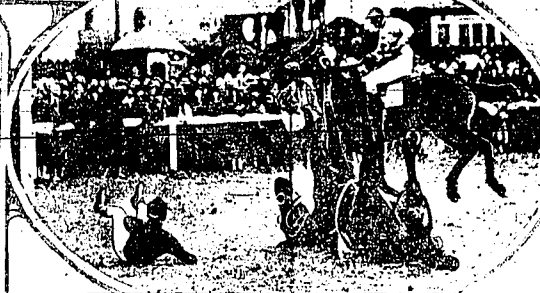
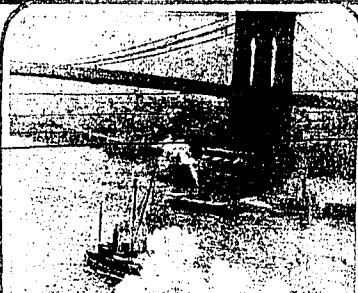

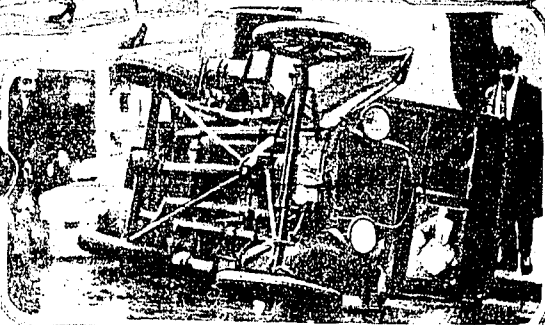

VON HINDENBURG WILL GET RAISE IN SALARY SOON

Coalition Government Decides
German President Merits In-
crease; Would Get \$33,000
Less Than Coolidge.

BERLIN, April 17. The coalition government has decided that President von Hindenburg merits a salary increase. Under the executive budget, which has passed the national assembly, he will get a salary of \$32,857 a year, an increase of \$15,000 over his previous salary.

Although the German constitution, it is noted, would be almost impossible to change, the government has decided to raise the salary of the president.

The total executive budget for 1926 is estimated at \$1,000,000,000, an increase of \$100,000,000 over that of 1925.

President Hindenburg's salary will be able to register at the top in salary tables of the largest nations, under a plan passed out by the national assembly.

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CHINESE TYPEWRITER WILL REPRODUCE 5000 LANGUAGE CHARACTERS

SHAN FRANCISCO, April 17. (AP)—From out of the Orient with the mystic and ancient here, has come an American-made typewriter which reproduces the thousands of ideographic characters of old China. It is being marketed here.

The machine, first of its kind, was designed by Yee Koon, a native of Shanghai. It is the product of years of toil and experiments with various machines of foreign make, in which was reached the tedious task of substituting every all of the common use characters for the expression of the Chinese language of commerce.

There are 500 characters on the machine. They are transferred to paper through the medium of the familiar rubber roller, line striking apparatus and ink ribbon.

Instead of seven's character, being inscribed on an individual type as is the case with American and European machines, however, the characters are on a sliding table and a single key will drop down, pick up the letter and after it is used drops the type back into its position.

It is claimed the ordinarily educated Chinese, with two months practice, can operate a speed of 2000 characters an hour which equals speed possible on American machines.

The new machine is said to be a great improvement over the old Chinese typewriter, which is a slow and tedious process.

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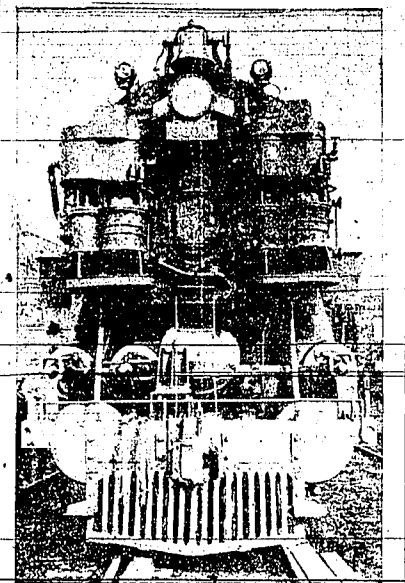

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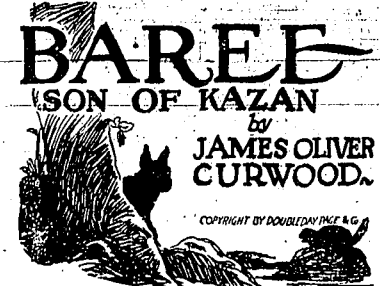
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Chapter I
