

**MORE ATTENTION
TO CITIZENSHIP
IS PRIME NEED**

President Coolidge in D. A. R.
Address Stresses Necessity of
Greater Interest in Civio
Duties

(By the Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, April 10.—Citizenship in America is not a private enterprise, but a public function, President Coolidge and in an address tonight before the thirty-fifth congress of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, during which he urged the people to exercise a greater interest in their government by going to the polls on election day.

"The whole system of government," he said, "rests on the ballot-box. Unless citizens perform their duties there, such a system of government is doomed to failure."

Making a passing reference to law enforcement officers in relation to the duties of citizenship, the president said that it is the duty of every citizen to secure the law.

"It cannot be disputed," he said, "that in too many quarters there is a lack of reverence for authority and of obedience to law. Such occurrences are sporadic and produce their own remedy. When society finds that its life and

is very quick to organize its forces for its own protection. That cannot fail to be done in our own country, for our

The president held, however, that it was not in violence and crime that the greatest danger lies, for these evils were quickly apparent and could not be suppressed. A far more serious danger, he said, lurks in the shrinking of those responsibilities of citizenship, wherever and howsoever they may be met, and evil may not be so noticeable, but is more insidious and likely to be more devastating."

The address was delivered on the anniversary of the battles of Concord and Lexington, and after referring to the form of government set up as a result of the revolution, Mr. Coolidge

"If we are to keep our representative form of government and to maintain the principle that the majority shall rule, it behooves us to take some drastic action to arouse the voters of this nation to a greater interest in their civic duties on election day. Many remedies have been proposed, from disfranchisement to criminal action.

WILL ARRANGE BIG MATCH

FORT WORTH, Texas, April 19. (AP)—Tex Rickard arrived here this afternoon to meet Jack Dempsey, heavy-weight boxing champion, here to arrange for a big match.

The heavyweight champion will arrive here from El Paso tomorrow night or early tomorrow. All arrangements for signing of articles were completed by wire and were completed before Rickard left New York. Dempsey endeavored to have Rickard meet him in El Paso Saturday, but the promoter asked Dempsey to meet him farther east and Fort Worth was chosen because Rickard's home was at Henrietta, near here.

Rickard said that it is probable he will give Dempsey opportunity of surprising the champion.

"I am in no opinion," said Rickard, "is the highest man to meet Dempsey. Dempsey is a better fighter than I am, and for that reason I expect to send him in."

EL PASO, Texas, April 19. (AP)—Jack Dempsey left here tonight for Fort Worth where he will meet Tex Rickard tomorrow and discuss terms for a fight with Gene Tunney. The champion is confident that the conference will result in a meeting with Tunney in New York next September.

"I am ready and anxious to meet Tunney and it looks as if the making of the match is only a question of a few hours," Dempsey said before his departure. "I understand that Rickard is prepared to talk business, and I intend to meet him more than half way."

He also understood that Rickard does not want the Harry Wills match, but should he change his mind and pick thirty to fight him instead of sixty, "I'll be ready to sign. I have been traveling around the country for six months trying to talk business with promoters who make overtures regarding a match with Wills, but when it comes to putting a guarantee on them, they seem to want it."

"I intend to fight in a title bout next September even if I have to promote the match myself."
