The new difficulty arose out of the question of whether the \$150,000,000 proposed for completing buildings already authorized is to be expended immediately or extended over a period of years at the discretion of the treasury department.

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WETS AND DRIES AGAIN ENGAGE IN WORDY WAR

Senate Leaders of Two Factions—Flay—Each—Other—in Long Discussion; Democrats Start Oral Battle.

(By The Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, May 4.—Prohibition and anti-prohibitionists flayed each other today in a long and bitter pending legislation was shunted to one side for a discussion that took up three hours and ended almost when it began.

The debate was all on the democratic side for the prohibitionists were not present. It ended nearly all seats on the republican side had been vacated and with many of the absentees. Senator Ferris of Michigan, and Sheppard of Texas, led the assault for the dries, while Senator Bruce of Maryland, replied with a speech which he urged the country to extend temperance legislation from the jungle of prohibition and get out onto more of the high road that leads to temperance.

Open Discussion
Opening a discussion with a long prepared address, Senator Ferris called both the wets and the dries; the former for seeking to break through the veto and the latter for laying down on their job of educating the country against alcohol as a beverage after that law went into effect.

Senator Sheppard contrasted himself with reality, testifying that he had suffered from education and cupidity over the country and encouraging those who would divert alcohol from the "thousand and one" uses to which it is put in industry and commerce into a beverage sanely and temperance.

Denouncing the wets
Denouncing the wets and the legalized liquor traffic in prevalent mind, dries as "villains," Senator Ferris said that occasionally or an emergency, those now seeking to amend the Federal act were not to be trusted that class. He described that situation as a tragedy.

Centuries Dries
Severely censuring the dries for abandoning their campaign of education, Mr. Ferris described the school of education now going on through the propaganda of the wets as "practices and destructive in the extreme."

The wets also were attacked by the prohibitionist as a result of the gradual—the constitution by bringing back beer and light wines. In that connection he said that in the past this was no time for them to "blow down and surrender their only program of law."

Replying to this address and that by Senator Sheppard which followed, Senator Bruce said the fact that prohibitionists now so eagerly repeat the assaults of the wets showed that the tide of public opinion was swinging steadily against them.

Urging that the dries to swing from looking on the senate's time with a "bitter" to the wets, he urged them to join the wets in a referendum on the prohibition question so the issue could be settled by the people.

"We welcome a contest of strength at any time," he said.
