SAN FRANCISCO, May 4. (AP)—Difference between labor organization and employers involving three strikes and some instances of ineffectual plotting attracted public attention in a number of Pacific coast cities today.

In this city several reports of attacks on non-union carpenters taking the place of union men on open shop jobs were received during the day.

In each instance the attackers had dispersed by the time the police arrived.

Vancouver, B. C., reported the stoppage of building at a number of points with approximately 275 men on strike.

The strike started when 200 of the men stayed at home Saturday in a campaign for better wages.

Four building trades unions called meetings at Portland, Oregon, to co-

submit a wage difference to the state board of conciliation. The unions involved are the building laborers, roofers, iron workers, and holsting engineers.

WETS AND DRIES AGAIN ENGAGE IN WORDY WAR

Senate Leaders of Two Factions—Play—Each—Other—in Long Discussion; Democrats Start Oral Battle.

(By The Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, May 4.—A prohibitionist and a prohibitionist's ally, each other today in the Senate, as pending legislation was shifted to one side for a discussion that took up three hours and ended since when it began.

The debate was all on the democratic side of the chamber, and before it ended nearly all seats on the southern side had been vacated, with many of the minority party of Senators. Perrie of Michigan, and Sheppard of Texas, led the assault for the drys, while Senator Bruce of Minnesota, replied with a speech in which he urged the country to tolerate itself "from the jungle of prohibition and get out some way in the high road that leads to temperance."

Open Discussion

Opening the discussion with a large prepared address, Senator Perrie said: "Both the wets and the drys; the former for seeking to break down the National act and the latter for laying down on their job of educating the country against alcohol as a beverage after that law went into effect."

IDAHO EXPORTS SHOW INCREASE

Department of Commerce Report Indicates Shipments Are Larger Than Ever Before.

WASHINGTON, May 4. (AP)—Such improvement was noted in the merchandise exports of Idaho during 1925, statistics released recently by the department of commerce showed, for each shipment for the year totaling \$1,012,207, well made compared with \$781,120 during 1924, reflecting an increase of \$231,087.

UTAH EXPORTS NEARLY DOUBLED DURING 1925

WASHINGTON, May 4. (AP)—Utah nearly doubled its 1924 exports during 1925, statistics released by the department of commerce showed.

The first in states in the order of their importance were New York, with exports valued at \$60,116,000; Texas, \$25,000,000; Pennsylvania, \$20,200,000; Louisiana, \$18,000,000; California, \$17,000,000; New Jersey, \$15,000,000; Illinois, \$12,000,000; Ohio, \$10,000,000; Virginia, \$8,000,000.

HOUSE APPROVES FRANCE IS NEW REPORT ON BILL

Measure Embodies Co-operation Between Interior Secretary and Various States. People of French Republic Complain Against Influx of Foreign Laborers.

WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP)—The house today approved the conference report on the interior department appropriation bill after Representative Cramer, republican, Michigan, in charge of the measure, announced the senate conferees had agreed on two controversial points, amendments regarding the Red Lodge, Montana, road, the other to increase from \$7,500 to \$10,000 the salary of the commissioner of reclamation.

The action foreclosed the possibility of Montana receiving an extension of the bill for use of its share of the federal and funds for construction of the Red Lodge road. As approved, the bill embodies the house plan for cooperation between the secretary of interior and states in the selection of settlers for the Spanish Springs, Idaho, dry lake, and San Juan reclamation projects. The secretary also would be authorized to work out plans for additional irrigation and reclamation projects.

The senate must pass on several points in the bill before it can go to the president.

PITCHED BATTLE LOOMS AT METHODIST SESSIONS

MEMPHIS, Tenn., May 4 (AP)—The first move in what is expected to be a pitched battle between the two branches of the Methodist church over the question of unification, took place today at the opening of the southern Methodist church general conference.
